

Marked Progress In TB Testing Survey In Prince

The Island-wide Tuberculin Testing Survey sponsored by the Provincial Department of Health and the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League continues to be extremely successful in the western end of the island, Dr. M. Lorne Bonnell, Minister of Health, stated yesterday.

The survey, which has been in operation for two years, has tuberculin tested well over 30,000 adults and children of school age or over one third of the entire population of the province. Approximately 12,000 x-rays have been taken.

The centres most recently completed are Tignish, Palmer's Road, St. Lawrence and Alberton. Fourteen hundred people attended the two day clinic at Tignish and a total of over 3,000 individuals came to clinics held at the four centres.

Dr. Bonnell pointed out that the project was under the supervision of Dr. E.M. Found, Superintendent of the Provincial Sanatorium and Director of the Division of Tuberculosis Control. Miss Hannah Turner, P.H.N., is in charge of the clinics while Garth C. Crockett, Public Health Educator is responsible for the community organization carried out before the clinics are held in a particular community. Mrs. John Cameron of Summerside is working directly with the people in each district.

WILL CONTINUE

The survey will be continued in Prince County for the remainder of the summer, Dr. Bonnell said, and the project should be completed by fall of 1939 with every resident of the province having been given an opportunity to attend the clinics.

The Minister again pointed out that much of the success of the clinics was due to the important work carried out by volunteers from the districts concerned. The volunteer ladies and gentlemen carry out a house to house canvass in each district see that everyone in the community is provided with transportation to the clinic if necessary, and help in the clinics. This involves a deal of work, but contributes greatly to the excellent turnout at the clinics and this survey has already gained national prominence in the tuberculosis control field.

In Charlottetown they visited Confederation Chamber where they heard the story of Canada's birthplace from Commissioner Robert Craig whose accent brought delighted smiles to several of the cadets from Glasgow and Dundee, Scotland.

A brief "free time" walk about the city was followed by a visit to Government House where they were warmly welcomed by Lieutenant Governor F. Walter Hyndman and Mrs. Hyndman and served mid-meal refreshments.
