Britons Worry As Still Unmarried Margaret Nears 22

LONDON, Aug. 17 (AP)—Princess Margaret, Britain's No. 1 bachelor girl, will be 22 years old Aug. 21 and apparently in no hurry to plunge or be pushed into matrimony.

But the hesitancy of the dainty and lively princess, while her list of eligibles shrivels, is worrying lawmakers who hold her purse-strings and taxpayers who foot her bills.

The latest name struck off Margaret's once long list of "possibles" was the Earl of Dalkeith. He announced his engagement this week to Jane McNeill, daughter of a Hong Kong lawyer.

In the House of Commons, a member asked bluntly: "Who is Princess Margaret going to marry?" Margaret's 22nd birthday is set for a week from Thursday but not even the hint of a date is set for the altar.

Her friends say Margaret will marry when she falls in love and not until then.

The tabloid Sunday pictorial has already appealed to Buckingham Palace to stamp out a Riviera-born rumor that Margaret might wed Prince Nicholas of Yugoslavia.

The society worriers have nothing against the 24-year-old nephew of the Duchess of Kent, it's just that he's not British.

Margaret has the widest freedom to choose her escorts but court usage dictates that her escorts must be financially well-heeled, come from the best or better families it want to without foreign royalty, be morally beyond reproach and young. Most important, Margaret has to like 'em.

Margaret, who now gets from parliament an allowance of £6,000 a year, will get £15,000 a year when she marries.

One of the leading eligibles is Billy Wallace, 25, stepson of Herbert Agar, former editor of the Louisville, Ky., Courier-Journal.

The Princess is often a dinner guest in the home of Billy's folks and the couple are frequently seen around London.

water. Never use soapsuds, as this dulls the colors. Rub over with a mixture of 1/2-beeswax, melted, and while warm stirred into a saucer of turpentine. Apply with a flannel cloth and polish with a dry flannel. Or, wash as above and oil with sweet oil or butter. Polish. Mildew on Leather Rub pure Vaseline jelly into mildewed leather until it is quite absorbed; then polish carefully with chamois leather.
