Giants Whip Dodgers; Yankees Set Record

The National League champion New York Giants rubbed it in on the ex-champs Tuesday, whipping the Brooklyn Dodgers 5-2 on the five-hit pitching of Ruben Gomez and Jim Hearn.

In the American League the second place New York Yankees set a record by winning their 101st game, 3-1 over Washington. No other runner-up in the junior circuit ever won more than 100.

Bobby Hofman put the Giants in front to stay in the first inning with his first grand slam home run of the season. Johnny Podres, who owned a 2-0 record against New York this year, was the victim.

Bob Grim became the first Yankee rookie since 1910 to win 20 games. The Yanks pulled it out in the eighth when Gil McDougald walked with two out. Mickey Mantle singled and McDougald scored from second when Pete Runnels bled Jerry Snyder off second base with a high throw on Yogi Berra's hot grounder. Bill Skowron singled home Mantle.

Grim gave up only four hits, all singles. He struck out seven and walked two in running his record to 20-6. Although they lost, the Dodgers maintained their two-game edge over Milwaukee in the battle for second place. The Braves were beaten 5-2 by Joe Nuxhall and the Cincinnati Redlegs. Nuxhall gave up six hits in winning his 12th game and his first shutout.

CUBS' DOUBLE WIN

Chicago Cubs whipped St. Louis twice, 4-3 in 10 innings and 3-2 in 6 1/2. The second game was called because of darkness at Wrigley Field, the only major league ball park without lights. Gene Baker singled home Frankie Baumholtz with the winning run in the first game. Steve Bilko and Ralph Kiner homered against loser Harvey Haddix in the nightcap. The sweep was the sixth in 30 doubleheaders for the Cubs this season.

S' side Boy To Attend Frontenacs' "School"

Vance Harris, 17 of Summerside, well known in Island hockey circles for his aggressive style of play, is leaving this morning for Quebec City to attend the Quebec Frontenacs hockey school, which will be held during the next two weeks.

Vance received an invitation to attend the school last July 25th. Depending on the outcome of the tryout, Vance will be placed in a Junior "A" or "B" hockey league, commensurate to his ability, as assessed by Coach Phil Watson, former N.H.L. great. Last year Harris was a member of the Summerside Aces, Maritime Intermediate "B" champions.

After being recommended by Guy Gignac, one of the members of last year's Charlottetown Islanders, after his performance against the touring New York Rangers team last spring, Harris, one of two junior players from Summerside playing with the Islanders, scored a goal against Ranger net minder Johnny Bowers in the first exhibition game.

Its a long time in the realm of boxing since the days of the Great John L. but as yet they are still waiting for a former heavyweight champion of the world to regain the title. If this feat is to be achieved in Marciano's time, it will quite likely have to be Rocky who does it.

Last Friday, in what Rocky calls "his best fight," he dropped former champion, Ezzard Charles to the canvas with a smashing left hook to the jaw which left Ez still on his knees at the 10 count. The 30-year-old Marciano was defending his championship for the fourth time. Rocky first won the crown by kayoing Jersey Joe Walcott on September 23, 1952.

Marciano, who was a 6-1 favorite at fight time, achieved his 47th straight professional victory and his 41st knockout to add lustre to the first perfect record ever possessed by any heavyweight champion. Rocky, with blood streaming from a gashed nose and cut above his left eye, had floored his opponent three times before having his hand raised in victory by referee Al Berl at Yankee Stadium.

For the 33 year-old Charles it meant practically the end of his boxing career in which he held the title from June, 1949 till July, 1951. At that time the stream-lined Cincinnati negro lost the crown to the Cinderella of the squared circle, Jersey Joe Walcott. Ezzard is the first heavyweight to get three chances to regain the coveted crown.

The dark-skinned challenger, who surprisingly clear-headed and jovial for a fighter who had just felt the explosive fists of the champion, stated gamely that he planned to continue boxing and still thought he could beat Marciano. But when age and several consecutive defeats start catching up with a man his days of dominance are pretty near over, and the risk of severe injury for little honor becomes much greater.

With the dissolution of the Maritime Big Four — Halifax, Sydney, Glace Bay and Charlottetown — at a recent meeting in New Glasgow, came the end of Major League Hockey in Canada. When the Quebec Major League broke up last year it left the Maritime League as the only group in active competition for the once coveted Alexander Cup. It meant that from start to finish fans saw nothing but the same four teams night after night, week after week and month after month. When the end of the season came the same Big Four played off by themselves and that was the end. The crowds got smaller and travelling was expensive, so that when last year's season was over all four teams were reported heavily in debt.

However, things weren't quite the same with one of the youngest senior hockey leagues in the Maritimes, the New Brunswick Senior, which while in the bounds of Allan Cup hockey finished the season fairly well in the chips. In its bid for play in the East-West Allan Cup finals, the Fredericton Capitals, winners of the league playoffs, were defeated by the highly rated Matane Red Rocks.

CHICAGO (AP)—Stan Hack will be given a new contract to manage the Chicago Cubs in 1955 after the world series club owner P. K. Wrigley said Tuesday.

Hack, who finished his playing career with the Cubs in 1948 and then spent five years in the club's farm system as manager at Des Moines, Springfield, Mass., and Los Angeles, succeeded Phil Cavert as skipper of the Bruins last March.
