Reviews Activities Of S'side Board Of Trade

Following is the text of the report of President Fred Bell delivered at last night's annual meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade:

"As President of the Summerside Board of Trade for the past year I have come to the end of my term of office and now wish to bring you my report of the activities of this Board for the year.

"This completes the fifty second year since the inauguration of this Board of Trade and it may be said of its founders as it was said of the Fathers of Confederation, 'They builded greater than they knew'.

"In the year 1898 a group of public minded citizens of this town grouped themselves together to promote the welfare of our town, our Province and the country as a whole. These men by their foresight and inspiration laid a foundation which later generations who often at great personal inconvenience and unselfish effort have assisted the betterment of our town and Province until today we may be justly proud of Summerside with its beautiful homes, its business establishments, churches, public buildings and last but not least the fine co-operative public minded spirit of our citizens. For all this improvement the Boards of Trade of the last fifty years can take no small amount of credit.

"(7) A resolution asking that the highway from Summerside to Cavendish be improved has been forwarded to the Public Works Dept. along with a request that the highway from Reads Corner to Summerside be widened.

"(8) Matters relating to Saturday evening of the local freight shed as well as an improved shunter service has been taken up by your Board and it is pleasing to report that these two services have been greatly improved.

"(9) The Tourist Bureau at Reads Corner has been maintained throughout the season and many favorable comments have been received as to its service and operation. The P.E.I. Government's support to this Bureau is hereby acknowledged.

"(10) During the present term we have welcomed the completion of the new Federal Building, a monument to the zeal, foresight and accomplishment of all who have worked for its construction.

"Mr. Silas MacFarlane and our secretary Mr. Rodd attended the Maritime Board of Trade meeting at Sydney and both brought back very interesting and instructive reports.

"During the summer Mr. Rodd attended the secretarial course at McMaster University, Hamilton. We are very fortunate in having such a well trained and efficient secretary as Mr. Rodd.

"I would like now to bring to your attention the fine measure of co-operation and support which I have received from all the members of this Board. You have made my duty as President very pleasant and your earnest desire to promote the welfare of the Town and Province has also made it very easy to undertake our various endeavors. I can only say 'thank you' and may I also extend the same thanks to the various committees of this Board, to Radio Station CJRW and to the press for the fine co-operation and the impartial manner in which you have reported our proceedings. Also to the Mayor and Town Council of Summerside for their co-operation and to the various Government departments for their compliances and courteous replies to our several requests.

"In closing: Let us as a Board of Trade remember our purpose—let us do our part as real leaders, not followers in that great period of expansion and development which is taking place in Canada today. It was truly said 'The twentieth century belongs to Canada'. Though war clouds may hang low, Canada's future is most bright. Let us as a Board of Trade continue to exert our very best efforts to promote the welfare of our Town, our Province, and thus Canada as a whole.

"I now pass over the mantle of office to my successor and wish with a fine membership and his ability to guide the destinies of this Board I am sure you are entering a year of great development and accomplishment."

"A grab bag was passed around and proceeds from this were \$1.50. A silver collection will be taken at future regular meetings. The next meeting will be held on February 12 at the home of Mrs. Peter MacLellan and roll call will be answered with 'What should I do for the school this year?'

"Lunch committee will be Mrs. William Hickey, Mrs. Bernard A. MacLellan and Mrs. Peter MacLellan. Program committee, Mrs. Louis Rogers and Miss Grace Easter. Ways and means committee, Mrs. Dan Noonan, Miss Mary Cameron and Mrs. L. G. Rainey.
