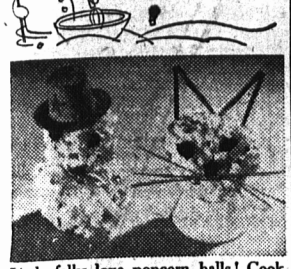
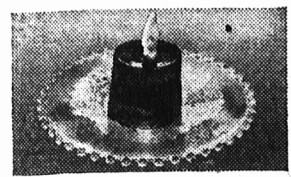


The cathedral at La Paz, Bolivia, where 12,000 persons can worship, was started in 1835.

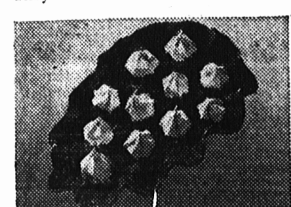
Christmas IN THE KITCHEN

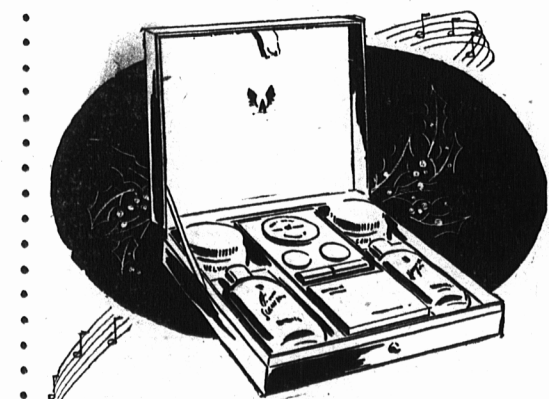

PEANUT BUTTER PINWHEEL LOAF

Mix and sift into a bowl, 3 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 2½ c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 5½ tsp. Magic Baking Powder, ¾ tsp. salt. Cut in finely 7 tb. chilled shortening. Combine ½ c. milk and ½ tsp. vanilla. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly with a fork. Knead for 10 seconds on lightly-floured board and roll out to 3½" thick rectangle, 8½" along one side. Cream together 1 lb. butter or margarine, ¾ c. peanut butter and ½ c. lightly-packed brown sugar; sprinkle on rolled-out dough. Beginning at an 8½" edge, roll dough up like a jelly roll and place in a greased loaf pan (4½" x 8½"). Bake in a hot oven, 400°, about 45 minutes. Serve hot, cut in thick slices, or cold, cut in thin slices, lightly spread with butter or margarine.

The demand for chicken and fowl remains strong, but the market for ducks, geese, and turkeys is in a state of fluctuation. Dealers are buying to fill only immediate orders or demands. There appears to be a disinclination on the part of dealers to store turkeys due to the apparent heavy supply in both Canada and the United States. The following are paying prices being quoted producers of P. E. I. for poultry products by the principal dealers in the Province. Chicken dressed 6 lbs. and over Grade A 40c, 5-6 lbs. 38c. Poultry over 5 lbs. Grade A 28c, B 26c, C 18c. Ducks Grade A 32c, B 27c, C 22c. Geese Grade A 30c, B 25c, C 22c. Turkeys Grade A 14 lbs. and under 48c, 14-18 lbs. 44c, over 18 lbs. 34c. Grade B 14 lbs. and under 38c, 14-18 lbs. 30c. Turkeys graded and box packed Grade A are wholesaling at: Under 14 lbs. 58c, 14-18 lbs. 54c, and over 18 lbs. 44c. If the prices quoted above are checked with prices quoted across Canada one will find they are the equal or better than the national price. Western Canada is landing carloads of turkeys in Montreal, graded, boxed, and at the required weights at 48c-49c per lb. It costs approximately 10c per pound to assemble, grade, box, ship and handle turkeys. Add this to the price being paid locally and it about equals the price at which turkeys are being sold on the open markets in a wholesale way.

Taking Canada as a whole, there is a surplus of turkeys over consumptive requirements. In Western Canada, producers are receiving 38c-40c a lb. for turkeys weighing 18 lbs. and under and 28c-31c for those over 18 lbs. These same turkeys are being offered in Western Canada for 48c-49c per lb. according to weight. It is reported that two or three cars have already arrived in the Maritimes. The majority of turkeys produced in P. E. I. are exported therefore, to sell, must be bought at a price to meet the open market price, the price at which they can be purchased elsewhere.

Potatoes
Potato movement during the past week has been somewhat lighter especially on tablestock. However, 160 cars were moved by rail for the week ending December 9th and shipments from Island ports continue heavy. Several cargoes are also being assembled for shipment from St. John and Halifax.

The tablestock market in Central Canada has been very dull but this condition is not uncommon at this period of the year. It is hoped that as soon as the Christmas season is over demand will again strengthen. Generally speaking values throughout the Province are right down at floor levels. It is understood that the December American Crop estimates will be released on December 17th, and that will have some bearing on future market prospects. There is a feeling that this may be increased over the 349 some odd million bushels of the last report. The following are the prices at different centers on the Island today:

ing at floor-prices. Very small movement in tablestock. Morell: Tablestock \$1.90 per 75 lbs. delivered. Movement slow. Sebago Seed \$2.85 per 100 lbs. at the farm. Cobble Seed \$1.96 per bus. at the farm. Fairly good movement in both varieties seed. Souris: Tablestock \$1.90 per 75 lbs. delivered. Sebago Seed \$1.90 per bus. delivered at boats in Charlottetown. Cobble Seed \$2.00 per bus. delivered. Movement slow. Elmira: Sebago, Katahdin seed \$1.80 per bus. at car. No. 2's \$1.80

per bus. at car. Cobble Seed \$2.00 per bus. at car. Fair movement. Murray Harbour: No movement in seed or tablestock. Borden Line: Tablestock \$1.90 per 75 lbs. delivered. Movement slow. No seed moving. Charlottetown: Floor prices being paid on Tablestock and Seed. Seed movement fair, tablestock slow. Turnip market is very dull and overloaded—35c per bushel.

Feeds
Gross supplies of feed grains in Canada are the highest this year in our country, while supplies of feeds in the United States are lower than last year. There is a very keen demand for Canadian feed grains, not only in the United States, but in Western Europe and in Japan, and it is not anticipated that prices will materially change as long as this demand continues. We are pleased, however, to report a surprising and welcome reduction in present quotations on feeds. In bulk, carlots, landed, the price is \$2.85 3-4 for No. 1 feed as compared to \$3.14 last week. Oats is at \$2.69 1-2. All other feeds are steady at prevailing prices.

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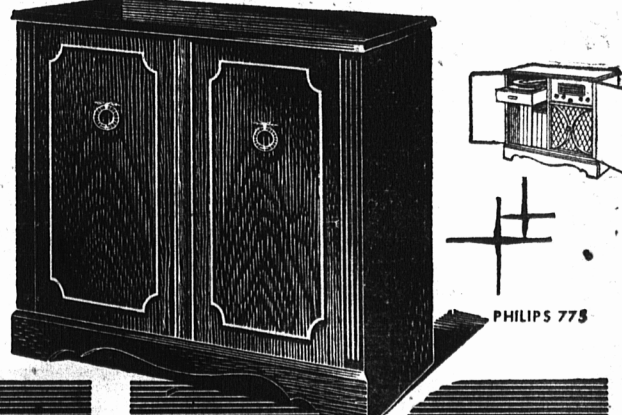
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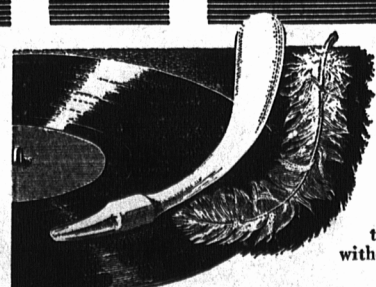
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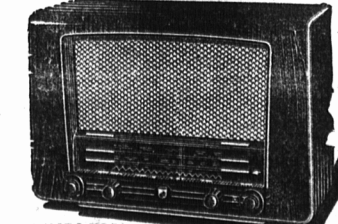
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
