

May Ship Munitions From Thinly - Populated Areas

OTTAWA (CP)—Federal authorities are studying the possibilities of using thinly-populated eastern points as centres for shipment of munitions overseas, it was learned yesterday.

Main areas under consideration are Gaspe harbor, near the east tip of Quebec's Gaspe Peninsula, and the Port Hawkesbury area, and the Port of St. John's, south of the Canso Causeway linking Cape Breton Island with the mainland.

One experimental shipment of Canadian munitions going to Canada's NATO forces in Europe already has been made from Gaspe, officials said.

REDUCE DANGER
The study was launched, one official said, with a view to reducing the danger of shipping explosives through existing harbors in populated areas.

In the background is the disastrous munitions ship explosion of Halifax during the First World War, which killed more than 1,700 people and devastated much of that port, and a couple of potentially dangerous incidents in Halifax during the Second World War.

One munitions vessel, after in Halifax harbor just off the downtown section, was sunk by navy gunfire during the last war while residents evacuated the waterfront. Another was towed to a remote outer section of the harbor and beached, with the fire later extinguished.

SHIPMENTS SMALL
Halifax and St. Lawrence River ports now are the main shipping points for Canadian ammunition going to Canada's forces abroad and NATO allies. The amount is not large at present.

Should the change from these major ports be made, Gaspe would replace other Quebec harbors in the summer and the Strait of Canso location would be a winter-time shipping spot.

Works Minister Winters, Nova Scotia's representative in the cabinet, said Thursday in reply to questioning that his department has been asked by the government to make a general survey of the Strait of Canso area south of the causeway.

"As a result of this," he said, "a recommendation will be made as to the most suitable place to build a wharf to accommodate ocean-going ships. Estimates also will be made of the costs involved."

Racial Disorders Flare In Southern United States

CLINTON, Tenn. (AP)—Racial disorders flared across the southern states as millions of children trudged to schoolrooms to start the third school year since the United States Supreme Court ruled segregation unconstitutional.

But the outbreaks were sporadic and confined to small communities for the most part. Crowds dispersed early today even in troubled Tennessee.

Despite the disturbances, more Negroes than ever before were expected to attend integrated classes.

Exact figures were not available immediately, but the Southern Education Reporting Service at Knoxville, Tenn., estimated recently that about 300,000 of the 2,500,000 Negroes in 17 states and the District of Columbia now live in integrated school districts.

"DEEP SOUTH" HOLDS FIRM
Most of the areas where Negroes and white persons went to school together were in the states bordering the Mason-Dixon line. With a few exceptions, the "deep south" generally was holding firm against the high tribu-

al's integration decision of May 17, 1954.

Law and order, supported by Tennessee National Guardsmen with tanks, appeared today to be winning out at Clinton. Nine of 12 eligible Negroes attended classes Tuesday and then walked to nearby homes in this east Tennessee town. They were taken home in cars previously. Only 257 white children out of the total enrollment of 806 attended classes, however.

At Oliver Springs, 12 miles west of Clinton, a crowd of about 400 broke up soon after arrival of a National Guard reconnaissance patrol. Fred Giles, night police chief at Oliver Springs, said plans to march on Clinton to "get those Negroes" were abandoned.

Two Negroes were arrested on charges of felonious assault in the wounding of a white man and 15 white persons were arrested during a riot at Oliver Springs Monday night. National Guardsmen from Clinton finally broke it up.

HANG EFFIGIES
At Knoxville, Tenn. two Negro effigies were hanged from a flag tower at Fulton high school Tuesday night. No Negroes had attempted to register when Fulton classes opened Tuesday.

At Mansfield, Tex., a lawyer for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People said efforts to enroll 12 Negro pupils in the high school there have been abandoned for the present.

"We could not take them in there while that mob is standing there to do violence," he said. For three school days crowds maintained racial barriers despite a court order for the high school

to integrate.

Earlier Tuesday a young Episcopal priest who sought to shame the crowd at the high school was rescued by a Texas ranger. Rev. C. W. Clark of Fort Worth was led away when persons in the crowd became loud and unruly.

CROWD STOPS PUPILS
At Sturgis, in Kentucky, about 170 miles west of Louisville, a milling crowd of about 500 persons prevented nine Negro pupils from attending classes at the previously all-white high school.

Several other Kentucky schools were integrating without trouble, however.

In another "border" state, West Virginia, integrated schools opened Tuesday without incident in two southern counties. The state school superintendent estimated that 75 per cent of the Negro children in the state will attend integrated schools this year.

In Maryland, 182 men, women and children jammed the Poolesville town hall Tuesday night to plead for continuation of a pupil strike which halved integrated classes at the joint elementary-high school.

TROUBLE SPOTS
There were several other potential trouble spots.

At White Stone, Va., three Negroes, including an NAACP officer, attempted unsuccessfully to register a group of Negro children at a white school.

In West Palm Beach, Fla., the county board of education rejected the application of a Negro boy to attend an all-white elementary school.

On the other hand a school at Hot Springs, Ark., another at Roland, Okla., and a third at Hillsboro, Ohio, all began integrated classes without difficulty.
