The cold weather and the wind played their part in making the game one of the poorest of the season but it was the series of walks and errors in the first inning that put the Abbies behind seven runs and cost them the ball game.

The Curranites now lead the best of seven series two games to one. The fourth game will be played in Summerside on Wednesday afternoon.

Donnie Simmons, Summerside's right-hander of their one-two pitch-

ing staff, probably won the easiest victory of his career. Given a 7-0 lead in the first half-inning, Simmons came on to pitch a six-hitter and held the Abbies to a run which was unearned.

Lead or no lead Simmons would have been tough to beat yesterday. All the six hits he gave up were singles and all of them were well spaced. He struck out six men and walked only one as he showed good control in giving the best pitching exhibition of the series.

Young Tom Harper started on the mound for the Abbies but could not find the plate. He was lifted with one out in the first after he had walked three men, hit one and forced one to fly out.

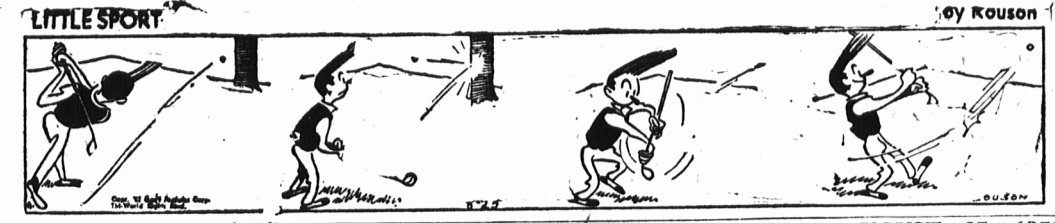

Halifax Man Wins Canadian Junior Golf Championship

VANCOUVER, Aug. 24 (CP) — A crew-cut kid from Halifax Saturday won the Canadian junior golf championship by keeping his nerve when everything started to go wrong in the stretch.

Lea Windsor, 18-year-old Blue-nose competing in the Dominion event for the first time, shot rounds of 75 and 77 in the 36-hole medal tournament for a 152 total, three better than John McCullough of Edmonton and Jerry Knechtell of Kitchener, Ont., who tied for second.

Windsor's 152 was better than any score turned in by Nova Scotia's four-man squad in the inter-provincial Willingdon Cup team matches, won by British Columbia.

Windsor took the lead at the 18-hole mark with his three-over-par 75 on the Capilano course. He was then three strokes up on Frank Brakn of Saskatchewan.

He turned on the heat on the first nine of his second round and cut out a 35, two under par and bettered only by two Willingdon Cup players all day.

Then he slipped to one over par on the 10th, 11th, 12th and 13th. But he refused to blow up.

"My putter left me on the last nine," he said afterwards. "It's the kind of course where if you foul up one shot, you have to scramble to get it back."

Windsor didn't know it at the time but he needed only a seven on the par-5, 582-yard 18th to win. He was on the green in three. His first putt went seven feet past the cup but he calmly tapped in his second for a par five and victory.

His chief rivals had finished ahead of him and Windsor didn't know how he stood, though he figured that that hot 35 on the first nine would come in helpful.

"Gee, that's great," he grinned, when a reporter told him he had won the championship. There wasn't a spectator within driving distance.

Windsor, who placed second in the Nova Scotia amateur, had travelled the Capilano course only four times previously in practice.

"I'm going to enter the Canadian amateur this week and give it all I've got," he said. "Then I'm going to visit my uncle in Los Angeles."

(Windsor, who was born at Saint John, N. B., is a son of Vince Windsor, formerly of Charlottetown. His mother was the former Helen Howatt of O'Leary, Dr. R. L. Lea of Charlottetown is a cousin.)

WILLINGDON CUP PLAY

VANCOUVER, Aug. 24 — (CP) — Gritty Bill Mawhinney collapsed and had to be carried from the 18th green Saturday after he helped British Columbia win the inter-provincial golf championship.

Nine strokes behind defending champion Ontario after the first 18 holes, B.C.'s four-man team finished the 36-hole medal play tournament for the Willingdon Cup with a total of 587, six better than runner-up Ontario. Quebec was third with 599.

Hoose, who signed a promising Saint John lefthander in the Cleveland chain two years ago, is interested in Maritime ball players. He made the trip from Upper Canada to view the Island junior players in action yesterday.

The Cleveland scout, whose headquarters are in Toronto has two dozen assistants working under him in the Dominion. Among those scouts are Max Bentley, Toronto Maple Leafs centreman and George Hayes, N. H. L. linesman who conducted the hockey school here last winter.

Young American's tend more to ape Big League players and have much more style than their Canadian counterparts when they are breaking into pro ranks, he stated.
