### Our Book Table.

What publisher Bryce, of Toronto, styles  
his "Home Series," and by Number 110,  
though highly spiced with sensationalism  
is evidently agreeable to what is considered  
as historically true of the early career of  
the Czar Peter of Russia. "The Gun-  
maker of Moscow" is its title, and the  
author (Sylvanus Cobb, jr.) has managed,  
all through his narrative, to show the  
superiority of soul-nobility over the grand-  
eur and power of the patented article.  
Most readers of sensational fiction are dis-  
appointed if the "all's well that ends  
well" idea does not mould the story, but  
no one in the outcome of Valdimir's mys-  
tery in these adventures of the gun-maker,  
will be able to say that the Black Monk was  
not a "regular brick" at the finish.

"The Life and Love of an Actor," by  
an actress, is another issue from the press  
of William Bryce, of Toronto, and as the  
title "Star Crossed" would suggest, is a  
personal yarn of crookedness trying to  
straighten out, and straight lines continu-  
ally acquiring a crook. The career of the  
heroine ends by concealing the stage trick  
of dying by a heart puncture, into a cer-  
tain newspaper recently received the fol-  
lowing unique proposal: "Sir—I will write  
you a poem for every issue of your paper for  
a dollar and fifty cents a week, said poems to  
be of any length required—but I wouldn't  
want to go over a column—and on any sub-  
ject you like, and written in blank verse,  
regular rhyme or sonnet style, although I think  
rhymes take best with the general public.  
But I can write one as easy as the other. Let  
me know if you want me to begin.

WANTS TO BE PRESIDENT.—The New York  
World's Paris correspondent sends that paper  
a three column interview with Gen. Boulanger,  
which the World sums up as follows: The  
General frankly admits he would like to be  
president of France and is confident that he  
will be some day. He denies that he is plot-  
ting war or a coup d'etat. He says there is  
corruption in the Chamber of Deputies and  
trouble in the Senate; the former he would  
dissolve and the latter abolish. Half of  
France, he says, is at his back in the move-  
ment to revise the French constitution.  
General Sheridan was his ideal of cavalry  
general. He also speaks enthusiastically of  
Generals Sherman and McDowell and other  
memories of his trip to the United States in  
1881.

IN THE PROBATE COURT.—The estate of the  
late Mrs. H. N. Paw is being settled in the  
probate court. Mr. Paw claims by his at-  
torney, Graham, Q. C., and Fielding, that  
Patrick Connolly, father of the late Mrs. Paw,  
made all his real estate and personal property,  
including the hotel St. Elmo, over to his son-  
in-law, (H. N. Paw) whose father paid all the  
debts of Mr. Connolly. Mr. Connolly, by his  
attorney, W. W. McLeellan, claims half of the  
property as next of kin, and also claims the  
personal property under a bill of sale made by  
his daughter and alleged to have been executed  
just previous to his daughter's death. It will  
be some time before the matter is settled—  
Halifax Mail.

STILL AFTER THE REWARD.—One of the  
counsel for Detective Power, of Halifax, said,  
at Biddeford, Me., Saturday, that in his  
opinion the suit brought by Mr. Power against  
the Saco and Biddeford Savings Institution for  
the McNeely reward would never come to  
trial. The bank is disposed to settle and so is  
Mr. Power, if any reasonable sum is offered.  
It is understood from good authority that the  
bank officers have several times tried to settle  
with the detective by offering to give a por-  
tion of the \$2,500 offered for the arrest of the  
defaulter, but Mr. Power claims not only the  
\$2,500 but also the \$5,000 for the return of the  
bonds. He thinks that the arrest of Frank  
was the direct instrument in the hands of the  
bank by which the bonds were secured, and  
that if the case had been left in his hands he  
could have effected a return of the securities  
as well as Harry did.

Christmas Market.

There was an unusually large attendance  
at the market to-day, and sales were brisk.  
Messrs. Blake Bros' display of Christmas  
meat, etc., was splendid. Their beef in-  
cluded the carcass of one of the Galloway  
heifers imported by Hon. Donald Ferguson,  
which killed well, tipping the scales at  
something over 500 lbs; also Mr. Ferguson's  
shorthorn steer which weighed 930 lbs.,  
as well as three handled—which averaged  
the best they ever handled—which averaged  
77 lbs each. The displays in some  
of the other stalls, although not fully  
up to the standard of former years, was
