MONTREAL (CP)—The Montreal and Canadian stock markets were still gaining strength at closing time Wednesday.

Some losers were Canada Steamship Lines down 1 to 36, Dominion Bridge down 1 to 2 1/2, Union Gas slipping 2 1/2 to 78 and Trans - Mountain Pipeline losing 2 1/2 to 56 1/2.

### Evidence Concluded In Case Involving Attempted Break

Evidence in the trial of Patrick Victor MacInnis, Borden, charged with an attempted break at the Retail Vendors Store, Borden on the night of November 15th., 1957, was concluded in Supreme Court, Summerside yesterday and the case adjourned until 10-15 this morning when presiding Judge, Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy will charge the jury.

Five Crown witnesses gave testimony yesterday while the defence called no witnesses.

Mr. George Ceretti, a diver with the Canadian National Railways in Borden, who resides in an apartment located in the same building as the liquor store, stated in his evidence that he saw the accused at the door of the liquor store, after a noise of hammering on metal made him curious enough to attempt to locate the origin of the sound.

He said he opened his front door and saw a man in front of the liquor store door wearing a parka, and when the man went around to the side of the building because of an oncoming car, Mr. Ceretti said he identified the man as MacInnis.

Mr. Ceretti telephoned the RCMP and Cst. R.L. Coombs arrested MacInnis, a few minutes later, after giving chase and catching him about 75 yards from the liquor store. MacInnis had been lurking in the darkness behind the building when Cst. Coombs drove up and spotted him in the headlights of the police car.

Evidence revealed that a U-shaped lock on the door had been broken and three C.N.R. brake irons located near by.
