

Archie Moore, Yvon Durelle Declare Themselves Ready

MONTREAL (CP) — Archie Moore and Yvon Durelle have begun tapering off training for their light-heavyweight championship fight here Wednesday night.

Both men went through light workouts Saturday in the east-end gym they have shared for the past two weeks. The Canadian challenger, weighing 176 pounds, did a little road work Sunday but did not go to the gym.

Archie, preparing to defend his championship for the eighth time since 1952, went two rounds with Canadian sparring partner Ted Doncaster, then stepped rope and worked on the light and heavy bags.

He was expected to do a little more light work today and perhaps "break a sweat Tuesday," said manager Jack Kearns.

Durelle, getting his second crack at Archie's crown, was expected in the gym today too, but, so sparring. His handlers fear old cars in his eyebrows might open up.

Tuesday's workout would go just according to how Yvon feels," said his manager Chris Shaban.

The champion has ruled as a 3-1 favorite to retain his title. Moore was a 5-1 favorite last Dec. 10 when the fisherman decked him three times in the first round, only to be knocked out in the 11th.

Both camps have pronounced themselves fit and ready. Moore weighs about 178, three pounds over the light-heavy limit.

"We'll have no excuses," said Kearns. "We've had plenty of time. Moore is in just as good shape as a man his age can be."

WELL-PUBLICIZED SECRET
Moore, whose age is a well-publicized secret, is believed to be 43. Durelle is 29.

Shaban said Durelle's legs should be in better shape than in the first fight against Moore.

"After the sixth round in that Yvon's legs were gone," he said. "Sheer courage kept him up for the following five rounds. But we've been working on his legs this time."

So far no referee has been named for the bout. The Montreal Athletic Commission is expected to name one today. The commission is also expected to rule on whether six- or eight-ounce gloves will be used.

Kearns said he would like to see Jack Sharkey, former heavy-weight champion who handled the December fight, referee again.

"I like to see former boxers in the ring," he said. "They know what they're doing. But it's up to the commission."

Shaban said he will protest if Sharkey is named—"for one thing he broke them to quickly last time."

He would like to see Harry Kessler or Ruby Goldstein take the fight, he said.

Both fighters say they want six-ounce gloves. They used eight-ounce gloves last time. The Montreal commission permits only eight-ounce gloves although the National Boxing Association of the United States allows the lighter gloves for championship bouts.

Chicago White Sox and San Francisco Giants came through when the chips were down Sunday and widened their leads in the American and National Leagues.

The White Sox picked up 1 1/2 games on second place Cleveland as they downed Washington Senators 4-3 and 9-0 while the Indians were dropping a 4-3 decision to Baltimore, the results boosted Chicago's lead to three games.

The Giants posted a 4-3 tenning triumph over Cincinnati on Orlando Cepeda's 10th inning homer. That victory coupled with Milwaukee Braves 8-7 triumph over second place Los Angeles increased the Giants margin over the Dodgers to 1 1/2 games. The Braves remain a neck and neck race with the Dodgers.

TIE FOR THIRD
New York Yankees moved into a tie for third with Baltimore in the American League by taking over a time game from Kansas City Athletics. They won the first 4-3 in 14 innings on Gil McDougal's bases full two-out single and the second some 7 1/2 hours after start of the day's play when Elston Howard homered in the 11th for a 3-2 decision. Yogi Berra

had sent the game into overtime with the 300th homer of his career in the ninth. It was a pinch hit.

Other games saw Detroit thump Boston 7-3 in the American League and Philadelphia sweep two from St. Louis, 8-3 and 4-2, and Pittsburgh down Chicago 5-3 in 10 innings in the National.

Cuban Defeats His Brother To Capture Single's Crown

QUEBEC (CP)—Reynaldo Garrido, hard-hitting 24-year-old Cuban, Sunday took the singles title at the Canadian tennis championships by beating his brother Orlando 6-4, 1-6, 6-1.

Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., and Don Fontana of Toronto, the only Canadians left in the tournament after the quarter-final round, paired to take the doubles title 6-3, 1-6, 6-3, 2-6, 6-1 over Orlando Garrido and Ecuador's Eduardo Zuleta.

A gallery of about 450 persons brought out blankets and topcoats. Chilly 25-mile, an hour-long gusting to 40 miles an hour and made play difficult.
