Liberal Candidates Address Party Rally

Liberal candidates Daniel J. MacDonald and Bruce L. Stewart joined their leader Alex Campbell at a bumper meeting in Souris Regional High School last night to urge voters of 1st King's "to move with the demonstrated trend in the rest of the province" and elect two Liberals on Monday.

"Island voters on May 30th," Mr. Campbell declared, "clearly rejected the Shaw government's efforts to remain in office. The voters stungly repudiated the premier and his government. They gave him and his followers the greatest shock of their political lives. But they didn't do it quite decisively enough."

Stressing that the decision now rested directly with the electors of 1st King's to finish the job of giving birth to a new and virile administration, the Liberal leader declared that he was "ready and eager to accept the responsibility of heading a new government dedicated to carrying out a program formulated by the people for the betterment of all."

There was spirited applause when Mr. Campbell referred to the appointment to the Senate of Thomas J. Kiekham of Souris West, announced earlier yesterday.

"If and when you elect me on Monday to lead a new regime in this province," said Mr. Campbell, "it will be a privi-

Director Margaret Hall has selected a program of light music, with emphasis on folk tunes. The choir will sing several novelty numbers, and wind up the evening with a medley from Rogers and Hammerstein's "The Sound of Music."

Interspersed in the choral program will be several piano selections by Lynda Drake of Millview. Miss Drake is a student at The Mt. Allison Conservatory of Music.

Pianist Suzanne Brenton of

Charlottetown will accompany the choir.

Soloists in tomorrow's concert will be Nancy Rackham, Leith Thompson, Jim Baldwin, William Weale, David Hall, Al Breedon and Sandra Carson.

The Confederation Centre Choir has given concerts in a number of centres in P.E.I. since its formation, sang at the Royal Command Performance here in the fall of 1964, and is currently preparing a concert for Expo '67.

Originally formed by Royston Muford, the choir came under Mrs. Hall's direction in September, 1964, when Mr. Muford moved to another province.

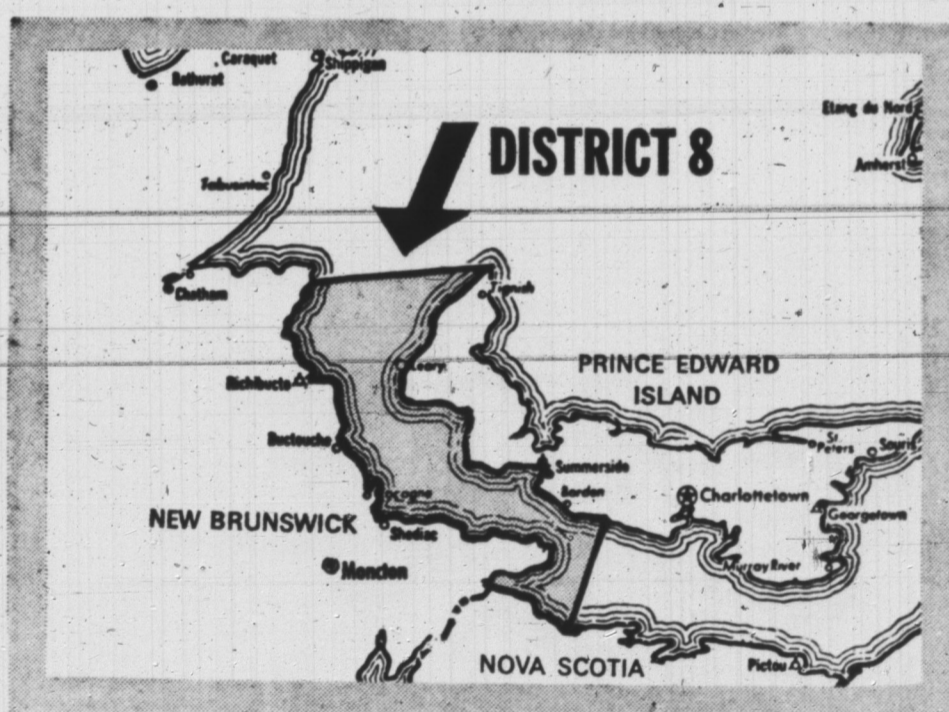

IMPORTANT NEWS FOR ALL LOBSTER FISHERMEN IN DISTRICT 8 IN NORTHUMBERLAND STRAIT

To protect the future of the Atlantic Lobster Industry, the Federal Government has selected District 8 for an experimental program in trap limitation and vessel control regulations.

YOUR CO-OPERATION IS URGENTLY NEEDED. HELP PRESERVE THE LOBSTER AND PROTECT YOUR OWN FUTURE!



During the 1966 Lobster season, (August 10th to October 10th) Fishermen in District 8 will be limited to setting a maximum of 250 traps per boat.

All fishing boats above 15 tons net must be registered. Those below that tonnage may be registered voluntarily at regular fees or licensed without charge. For Department of Transport registration and licensing boat owners can contact the Registrar of Shipping at a recognized port of registry. These ports include: Charlottetown, P.E.I., Chatham and Moncton, N.B., and Pictou, N.S.

For the licensing of fishing boats below 15 tons apply in person or by mail to the nearest Collector of Customs and Excise. Offices are located in Charlottetown

and Summerside, P.E.I., Chatham, Moncton, Newcastle and Sackville, N.B., Amherst, Pictou and Truro, N.S., and at other locations within this district.

Fishermen must apply for a Lobster Fishing License as usual from the Federal Department of Fisheries. Fishing Licenses will not be issued unless your boat has been properly registered or licensed.

THE FEDERAL DEPARTMENT OF FISHERIES WILL PROVIDE ALL FISHERMEN WITH SPECIAL NUMBERED TAGS. ONE TO EACH LOBSTER TRAP. THIS WILL ENSURE THE FAIR DISTRIBUTION OF TRAPS FOR EACH BOAT. CHECK WITH YOUR NEAREST FISHERY OFFICER.
