NHL Oldtimers To Give Show

Oh to be in the Montreal Forum on the night of January 21st.

No, the Montreal Habs are not scheduled to play a crucial match against an onrushing opponent, nor are the Junior Habs hosting an international opponent. Old legs will be the ice on this Friday evening and there can be little doubt that the galleries will be packed for the tilt.

The Quebec Oldtimers, composed mostly of former stars on the Montreal Canadiens, will host their counterparts from the Detroit Red Wings. It sounds tame on paper but on the ice it should be a stunning spectacle. Some of the greatest players ever to lace on skates have been working out regularly for the past two months for the respective teams and there is a good deal of bantering and jesting being exchanged between the clubs.

The Canadiens famous Punch Line of Toe Blake, Elmer Lakh and Maurice 'The Rocket' Richard will be together and will face none other than the members of Detroit's fabulous Production Line of Gordie Howe, Sid Abel and Ted Lindsay. It should be good for a few chuckles to see two opposing coaches (Blake and Abel) dish out a few checks. Blake explained his appearance with a smile as he commented "who else have they got to check Howe?"

The great Gordie Howe will again meet his most formidable rival, Rocket Richard and it will be interesting to view these two in action. It will be Howe's stamina and all round ice magic against the great scoring punch of the master opportunist Richard. The Rocket has far from lost his ability to put the puck in the net for in a recent exhibition match he potted four tallies. The prospect of seeing two of the greatest lines and two of the greatest players in hockey meeting head on will be enough to literally pack Montreal, the hockey capital of the world.

Apart from these six stars are another select group who will play in the game and every one of them has earned his colors in battle. Jacques Plante, the man who revolutionized goalkeeping and of the role Harry Lumley will be attempting to thwart the ambitions of the Canadiens. Dick Moore and Dollard St. Laurent, will join former greats such as Bulch Bouchard, Floyd Curry, Ken Reardon, Ken Moadell, Pete Morin and Buddy O'Conner, and of course the Punch line and as all these names used to be daily figures of conversation in the average Quebec household the game is drawing a lot of interest.

Detroit will rely heavily on its Production line but will bolster their lineup with such former players as Leo Reise, Jimmy Orlando, Norm Smith, Stu Evans, Jimmy Peters, Joe Carveth, Marty Pavlich, Carl Liscombe and Rep Guldoin.

All in all it should make for an interesting match and the two clubs will move on to Detroit to play a return match a week later.

Wayne Carleton's future in the National Hockey League may hinge on how he comes out of tonight's exhibition hockey game between the Swedish national team and Toronto Maple Leafs of the Junior A Ontario Hockey Association. For Carleton, who played briefly but well with Toronto Maple Leafs in their NHL game last Saturday. It will be his first full game this season.

Carleton, tabbed as a hot prospect by the Leafs, wrenched a knee playing baseball two years ago and has had four operations since then trying to correct ailments to both knees. Carleton's performance prompted speculation that Leaf manager-coach George Punch Imlach might keep him with the NHL club rather than send him back to the Marlboro farm team.

New York Rangers of the National Hockey League swapped goalies with Baltimore Clippers of the American League sending Ed Giacomin to the Clippers and calling up Cesare Maniago. Maniago, the tallest goalie in pro hockey at six-foot-two had a 3.10 goals-against average in 26 games with Baltimore. He previously had brief stints in the NHL with Toronto and Montreal. Giacomin's goals-against average was 3.45 in 27 Ranger games this season.

Sherbrooke Beavers Capture Ahearne Cup

STOCKHOLM (CP - AP) - Sherbrooke Beavers, 1965 Canadian Allan Cup champions, defeated Sodertalje of Stockholm 7-4 Tuesday to win the Ahearne Cup, a major hockey tournament.

The Beavers ended the double round-robin tournament with four victories and two losses for eight points, two more points than Sodertalje and Leksand, another Swedish team. Djurgarden finished last with a 2-4 win-loss record for four points.

In previous years, the Ahearne tournament has involved several countries. The Soviet Union withdrew at the last minute this year. Czechoslovakia withdrew earlier.

Habs' Blake, Hawks' Reay Using Different Methods

By AL McNEIL, Canadian Press Staff Writer. With first-place in the National Hockey League at stake, coaches of the two top contenders provided a sharp contrast in their approach to tonight's key game.

Chicago Black Hawks, who arrived in Montreal late Tuesday,

were resting and had no practice scheduled. The Hawks hold a one-point edge over Montreal, but the Canadiens have a game in hand.

In contrast, Canadiens coach Toe Blake ran his team through a brisk 75-minute workout Tuesday, testing various combinations in an effort to nullify injuries to two key centres.

The Hawks arrived without centre Bill (Red) Hay and defenceman Al MacNeill. Coach Billy Reay said Hay was suffering from a sore shoulder and foot, while MacNeill had a bruised elbow.

BRUINS MEET WINGS. The only other mid-week action was third-place Detroit Red Wings as host to last-place Boston Bruins Thursday night. The Wings currently are in third spot, five points back of Chicago and one ahead of fourth-place Toronto Maple Leafs.

Canadiens, who hold a 4-1 edge in season games against the Hawks, will be without the services of one and perhaps two pivots.

Jean Beliveau suffered a pulled groin injury in practice Friday and missed most of last weekend's action. He skated Tuesday between wingmen Dick Duff and Bobby Rousseau.

TO DECIDE TODAY. However, Blake said he would not decide until today whether the rugged Montreal captain will take his regular turn against the Hawks.

Centre Ralph Backstrom has definitely been scratched from the lineup for the Chicago contest. He suffered a knee injury in Canadiens' win against the Rangers in New York Sunday. "Ralph's injury isn't as bad as we thought it was at first," Blake said. "But we still don't know how long he'll be missing."

With Backstrom out and Beliveau doubtful, Blake didn't know what his alignment would be against Hawks. "I don't know who'll take Ralph's place and I don't think (Red) Berenson will play. There's no sense calling someone up from the minors when some

Legalized Lotteries Suggested

WINNIPEG (CP) - The Criminal Code of Canada should be amended to allow lotteries for charitable purposes, Manitoba Attorney-General Stewart McLean said here.

"The situation is becoming increasingly difficult for the attorneys-general because there are so many charitable lotteries today as distinct from lotteries conducted for personal gain," he said in an interview.

Mr. McLean said there should be a procedure established for separating charitable lotteries and applying the law to the others. He suggested that a control for this procedure could include a special permit which would have to be obtained by an organization in advance.

Such permit, he said, would be similar to permits now issued to charitable appeals in metropolitan Winnipeg.

Lowly Edmonton Eskimos Announce Staff Alterations

EDMONTON (CP) - Changes in management personnel and the coaching staff were announced Tuesday by the Edmonton Eskimos Football Club. Joe Ryan, 64, Eskimo general manager since 1960, moves up to an advisory capacity to the president and board of directors. He also will assist in recruiting activities.

Assistant coach Len Younce will not return from Portland, Ore., and head coach Neill Armstrong, who has signed a new two-year contract with Eskimos, will select a new assistant coach early in the new year. Assistant coach Harry Buffington will remain with Eskimos.

With Ryan assistant to the president, the position of general manager of the Western Football Conference club is open.

SEEK YOUNGER MAN. The move is being made now to permit the club to locate and train a younger man, said president Hugh McColl.

"It will take a year or two for a new man to acquire the knowledge of league and club policies and regulations."

"Several important changes may develop this year at league level. For this reason, and in order to plan ahead, we believe the change should be made now."

"Joe has given us excellent service for several years and we appreciate his past efforts on our behalf and his understanding of our plans and his willingness to co-operate."

Taylor Not All-Star

NEW YORK (AP) - Jim Taylor, who helped carry Green Bay to victory over Cleveland Browns in Sunday's National Football League championship game, is lifted at being omitted from the Pro Bowl game roster.

"I feel as though I should have made it," the crew-cut packer fullback said Tuesday. "It's the first time in six years that I wasn't picked. The 1965 season was Taylor's eighth in the NFL."

The Pro Bowl between star players from teams in the NFL's Eastern and Western conferences will be played in Los Angeles Sunday, Jan. 16. Players were selected by the league's coaches.

"I don't know if I could have been ready physically for the game," Taylor said. "But it would have been an honor to have been selected."

Ken Willard of San Francisco '49ers and Bill Brown of Minnesota Vikings were the fullbacks chosen from the Western team.

Taylor was named the most valuable player in the NFL final, won by the Packers 23-12.

MANAGED WINNIPEG CLUB

Ryan, who has been connected with Canadian football for more than 30 years, managed the Winnipeg club in 1955 when it became the first western team to capture the Grey Cup. He also was one of the founders of Montreal Alouettes.

The responsibility of general manager in the interim period will be assumed by the president and board of directors, assisted by Ryan.

The club has signed 10 new import recruits for the 1966 team although no names have been released.

Younce was line coach for the Saskatchewan Roughriders from 1960 to 1962, and served the

next three years with the Edmonton club.

He was also line coach from 1949 to 1955 at Oregon State University. His future plans were not announced, although he is expected to consider a job closer to his Oregon home.

The club has no immediate replacement but Armstrong said he has several prospects in mind.

Armstrong, a native of Tishomingo, Okla., signed his new contract Monday. It includes an option to extend the pact to 1968.

Armstrong joined Eskimos in 1964, fresh from an assistant's role with Houston Oilers of the American Football League. Previously he was an assistant coach at Oklahoma State and a former player at Winnipeg.
