TORONTO

TORONTO (CP)—Amid the slowest trading in three years, the stock market staged a minor rally near the close Tuesday to pull prices up from this lows for the session.

For most of the session profit-taking cut into the stocks which had scored big gains in last week's three-day rally. But a few minutes before the close some fresh buying, spurred by a moderate rally on Wall Street, appeared and many of the losses were reduced by more than half and some were eliminated altogether.

The general level of the market at the close, however, was lower with all indices down, with the exception of golds which managed to add a few decimal points. Western oils had the largest index gains, off 1 1/4 points. The Hudson Bay gained 1 1/4 points at 5 1/4 to lead base metals winners. Other seniors, however, were lower. Lower-priced metals gain but in general price were easier in a 20-cent range.
