Instruments open at the moment are: 2 cornets, 2 trombones, 1 alto saxophone, 1 alto horn, 1 "E" flat bass.

It's steadily improving every day, and someday Summerside, with the financial aid which the Legion and the Town of Summerside have given it, the perseverance of its members, and the continuous encouragement of you ("John Public"), there is no reason why it shouldn't be the finest band on the Island.

If you don't believe it, here's a list of the instruments which, to date, have been purchased at a cost of approximately \$3,000.00:

- 4 alto horns, 4 bass horns, 2 clarinets, 4 cornets, 2 saxophones, 4 trombones, 1 bass drum, 2 snare drums, 1 cymbal and 1 triangle, 2 euphoniums; and several other instruments owned by the players of them.

However, anyone who has studied music will readily understand and appreciate that a full fledged band cannot grow into maturity in a day, or a month, or sometimes even a year or two, especially when some of the bandmen have to be developed from "scratch", as is the case here.

Lack of facilities in the past for specialized instrumental training, has been a bar to otherwise potential musicians.
