"But we can say we saw tiny phosphorescent glimmers, which appeared surely to be the signs of some form of living creatures—even if embryonic—there in the terrific abyss."

S'ide Planes To Help As Air Search Resumes

HALIFAX, (CP) - Maritime air command announced Wednesday night that search will resume today for a Mont Laurier Airways plane with seven men missing in northern Quebec since Aug. 25. Two extensive searches covering more than 170,000 square miles already have been carried out without result. The third attempt is a last-ditch effort before the autumn freeze-up.

Let's Talk It Over

The officials in charge of giving licenses to car operators in Prince Edward Island are making it a little more difficult to obtain these "go ahead" slips. A candidate must now show more knowledge of the rules of the road, and of the potentialities of the machine, he proposes to drive. Few will deny that this is a step in the right direction. A person who sits behind the wheel of a modern car has a mighty lethal weapon in charge, and the second he throws the car in gear that weapon is loaded, and capable of wreaking terrible casualties both to the car occupants, and to others who are using the highway. For a good many years the examination that preceded the granting of a license was undoubtedly much too casual and superficial. Not only in Prince Edward Island, but also in other Canadian provinces, people were sometimes able to obtain licenses with ridiculous ease.

Now that more care is being exercised in the granting of car licenses, might it not be a good idea when the 1954 bicycle licenses are being issued by towns such as Summerside, to give the young drivers a quiz on the proper manipulation of their vehicles, and to require that they be acquainted with the rules of the road as it affects them, and have an idea what their obligations are in the mainstream of modern traffic which gets more congested and complicated as the years go by? For we have a few irresponsible bicycle drivers among the small fry who are careless driving endanger their own lives and the lives of others, and at the very least, prove a "headache" to motorists who are exceeding every care to prevent an accident. Such a quiz or examination would serve to emphasize to the young bicycle driver that he must also exercise care, as he travels along the highway.

Communists Release Bishop Of Danzig

VATICAN CITY, (Reuters)—Polish Communists have released Msgr. Carl Maria Spliet, Roman Catholic Bishop of Danzig, after nearly eight years imprisonment, a Vatican source said Wednesday.
The 55-year-old prelate has been forbidden to return to Danzig and has retired to Vienna, the source added. Msgr. Spliet was arrested by the Communists in December, 1945, and charged with collaboration with the Germans.

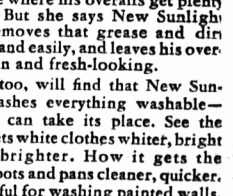
