

\$15,000 Contribution To S'ide Nurses Residence

An announcement of a \$15,000 contribution to the nurses' residence by Mrs. Sarah B. Schurman was made yesterday by Mr. Austin A. Scales, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Prince County Hospital, during the official opening ceremonies of the memorial nurses residence in Summerside. The gift is being made in memory of her late husband, Maynard F. Schurman, and her sister, Grace Browne Beatty, and is the most outstanding contribution ever made to the institution by any one person.

Mr. Schurman, of two plaques, — one to the memory of Maynard F. Schurman and one to the memory of Miss Beatty. Your board would welcome the opportunity to consider the acceptance of contributions of a like nature," he concluded.

Students Busy Writing Exams

—After a strenuous day with English and grammar exams, students of grades XI and XII were burning the midnight oil last night preparing for the second day of writing examinations set by the Atlantic Provinces Examining Board, and based on the Prince Edward Island course for those grades.

Today some 238 pupils are scheduled to begin their final grade X examinations, which will like the two higher grades, conclude on Thursday of next week. The examinations are being written in eight centers throughout the province, namely, Tignish, O'Leary, Summerside, Kinkora, North Rustico, Charlottetown, Montague and Souris.

In Summerside yesterday 97 students were writing the grade XI examinations, and these comprised 56 from Summerside, 26 from Kensington, 13 from Miscouche, and 2 from North Rustico.

The grade XII examinations at Summerside are being written by 44 students, all from Summerside. Some 10 to 15 others are expected to write examinations in certain subjects only.

Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, assistant director of education, of Charlottetown, is in charge of the examinations at Summerside, and assisting him yesterday were Miss Dorothy Auld, of the P.W.C. Staff and Miss Mary Johnson, principal of Kensington grade XI this past school year, and Messrs. Norman MacDonald, James Murphy, Elmer Pineau, David Lidstone and John Billard, of the Summerside High School; and they will be joined by other supervisors tomorrow when grade X begin their exams.

The grade XI exams at Kinkora were begun yesterday by 20 students under the direction of school inspector C. B. Jelly, of Summerside, and 31 other students are expected to start the grade X exams there this morning.

X O'Leary, students from Alberton and O'Leary schools began the grade XI exams under the supervision of school inspector Merritt Callaghan of Alberton and Mrs. Mae Palmer, teacher at O'Leary.

From these same centers 55 pupils are expected to begin the grade X exams today.

At Tignish 18 grade XI and 9 grade XII students began exams yesterday, supervised by Mr. Edward MacPhail, director of the Vocational Training School, Charlottetown, and Mr. W. W. Currie, principal of Alberton High School. An estimated 34 grade X students are expected at this center today.

WINNIPEG, (CP)—The Retail Merchants Association of Canada has asked Trade Minister Howe to restore public order in the cigarette business.

Association delegates attending the annual convention here this week charged cigarette manufacturers with "shameless discrimination" between their customers in such a way as to give rise to "unfair competition" among retailers.

The Association urged in a resolution that "Mr. Howe impress upon cigarette manufacturers that they must deal on equal terms with all retailers, giving the same discounts for equal quantities."

The School of Nursing is situated on the ground floor and the director of nursing education is Miss Flora Moroney, R.N. who has been assisted in planning this department.

Mrs. Sarah J. MacLellan, R.N. is superintendent of the Prince County Hospital.

The Memorial Nurses Home is second to none and an institution of which Prince County residents should be very proud.

Labor Income

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian workers earned more in the first quarter of 1955 than in the corresponding period last year.

Labor income for the three months, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday, rose to \$2,984,000,000 from \$2,855,000,000.

The payroll increased in all sections of industry.

Finance and services showed a gain of \$76,000,000 to \$759,000,000; the distribution industries were up \$26,000,000 to \$773,000,000; the primary group rose \$10,000,000 to \$193,000,000; construction went up \$9,000,000 to \$173,000,000; manufacturing \$6,000,000 to \$275,000,000, and supplementary labor income showed an increase of \$2,000,000 to \$108,000,000.

Income in March was \$997,000,000 up \$1,000,000 from February and \$47,000,000 more than for March, 1954.

U. S. Living Costs

WASHINGTON (AP)—U. S. living costs remained unchanged in May while worker take-home pay rose to a record high.

Labor Secretary James Mitchell said net spendable earnings were up in May by more than a dollar a week over the April level.

The take-home pay of the average family worker rose to \$70.12 in May and a single worker's to \$62.83. This is about 60 cents a week more than they earned in March of this year, when the previous peak was reached.

Tribute To Efficiency Of Prince County Member

OTTAWA, June 23.—(Special)—Tribute to the efficiency of J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., for Prince in the role of parliamentary assistant was voiced in the Commons chamber today by Fisheries Minister James Sinclair.

When presenting his estimates to the House, Mr. Sinclair said: "Unfortunately, I was detained in Newfoundland last year when a number of items in my estimates came before the committee for consideration, but my able parliamentary assistant piloted them through the committee."

Mr. MacNaught is one of the senior parliamentary assistants of the administration, having held the Elfin Huntsman, by Alex Rowley, Isabel Darby.
