Charge Small Group In U.S. Seeks Higher Fish Tariff

SHIPPEGAN, N.B. (CP)—Major New Brunswick fish exporters said Wednesday that a "very small group" of Massachusetts lobbyists are responsible for the proposed increase in tariffs on imported fish.

H. L. Haines, secretary treasurer of Robichaud and Co. Ltd., here, told The Canadian Press lobbying is being done by "a very, very small group in Boston, Bedford and Gloucester" determined to protect their own markets.

"The fish brokers and consumers are against it," he added. "Most of the large fish companies in the United States have subsidiaries here."

His remarks came on the heels of an optimistic statement in Ottawa by Immigration Minister Pickersill Tuesday who said he hoped the U.S. will not go ahead with an American tariff board recommendation to increase tariffs by more than one cent.

HOPEFUL NO INCREASE

Roger Pichette, New Brunswick minister of industry and development, said from Campbellton, N.B., he had always been hopeful the United States would leave tariffs untouched.

He said he had hoped increased tariffs wouldn't come in force "but this year it looks as if they might."

The minister said that "Eisenhower or Stevenson or somebody" has until Dec. 12 to decide whether to approve the increase recommendation.

"Eisenhower has been known in the past to turn it down," Mr. Pichette said. "But don't forget they're on the eve of an election." The U.S. elects its president Nov. 6.

HAVE BAD EFFECT

Mr. Haines said it was impossible to underestimate the "severe" effect such an increase would have on Canadian fishermen.

He said it was likely the fishermen would absorb the greater part of the loss "if every Canadian family would eat 15 pounds more of fish a year, we wouldn't have to worry about exporting."

The \$20,000,000 New Brunswick fishing industry exports "millions of pounds" annually to the United States. Proposed tariff hikes would raise the duty by 1.25 cents a pound on groundfish which includes cod and haddock.

The increase on the annual 35,000,000-pound import quota from Canada would be to 2.8 cents and above the quota, to 3.75 cents.

A spokesman for a major exporting firm on the north shore, who asked that he not be identified, said he personally thought the increase "won't go through." He also blamed the move on a small group of Massachusetts lobbyists who have "lined up some of the labor groups."

Heavy Docket In Magistrate's Court

Before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet yesterday seven charges laid previously were withdrawn against five men involved in the possession of a quantity of liquid and powdered Perfection Brand milk, the property of Central Creameries Ltd., Charlottetown. The original charges, which were withdrawn at the request of the Crown, represented by Mr. John Nicholson, were replaced with ten more defined charges.

Given an option of three methods of trial, Allison Gillis, appearing for the defense, advised the Court that the accused had elected trial by judge without a jury. The cases were all adjourned until Tuesday next at 7:30 p.m. for preliminary inquiry. The bail which was previously issued was allowed to stand valid by the necessary changes to be made concerning the new charges.

The counsel for the case of the sixth man involved in the incident, was not present and the case was adjourned until Tuesday evening also, with the bail allowed to stand. There are two charges in this case.

In traffic violation, speeders again led the list of offenders with five pleading guilty to the charge. Two who had received convictions on a similar charge already this year appeared, with the first being fined \$25, and costs, and the second \$35, and costs.
