Two Sherwood Boys Hurt In Tumble Down Pit Face

Following a tumble of about 50 feet from the face of the Dennis gravel pit, located some distance off the Norwood Road, Sherwood, two brothers, Willard, 12, and James MacLennan, 15, were taken to hospital shortly after 2 p.m. yesterday.

Admitted to the Prince Edward Island Hospital, where they were taken by MacLennan's ambulance, they were placed under the care of Dr. T.A. Laird.

Examination revealed that Willard had suffered a cut on the forehead and a shaking up. Following treatment he was released to his home. James was detained in hospital. The boys are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Spurgeon MacLennan, 22 Brackley Road, Sherwood.

The accident was investigated by Cst. Jack Norton, Sherwood.

Summons Increases Court Fine

City motorists not paying overnight parking tickets are due a shock when they receive a court summons to pay the fine.

The offence now calls for only a \$1 fine. When a summons is issued, however, the rate increases considerably. Chief of Police C. W. MacArthur would say exactly how much the fine would be after a summons was issued, but said it was a lot more than the original ticket.

The difference is accounted for by the extra work involved in collecting the fine. The unpaid tickets must be checked and sorted, a summons issued for each individual owner is made out and sent. The extra work required from the court to process the original ticket is paid for when the owner appears in court.

Parkdale Announces Dump Problem Action

Positive action about the condition of the old dump is being taken immediately by the Village of Parkdale, to end the nuisance of flying garbage landing on lawns and homes nearby — and so no near.

New signs have been erected to advise the public that dumping may be done only on the southeast corner at the direction of the caretaker, only.

Parkdale police will not issue summonses and stiff fines against those who do not comply with the village by-laws regarding dumping.

CONCERNED ACTION
Commissioner Frank MacDonald said it is hoped to get concerted action regarding village operations, with the village, Charlottetown and Sherwood all participating. Hoped for is the placing of a combination bulldozer operator-caretaker on duty, with frequent spot checks being made by police to check violations.

Mr. MacDonald stated that a lot of people leaving garbage taken immediately by the village on entrance roads made it impossible to dump in the area named. However, he said this excuse would not be accepted by police as it was possible to reach the selected site via the lower, or 'hail', road.

GARBAGE SERVICES
He added that for those people who maintained they could not get to the proper section, there were garbage collection services readily available. These firms operating the services have properly equipped vehicles which do get to the prescribed areas for dumping, and the Commissioner stated that if individuals will not comply with the new regulations they will not be permitted to dump at all, and would be thus forced to use the collection services.

Storm Signals Flying At NBP Camp In D.C.

VANCOUVER (CP)—The political storm signals are flying in the provincial New Democratic Party camp over the defection of party member going to Cuba as the guest of Fidel Castro.

In the face of criticism from the party hierarchy, Cedric Cox, 50-year-old, legislative member for the party, reported by a phone from Cuba that the party had "minded" its member and termed "ridiculous" criticism of the trip by provincial party members.

Cox's comments raised the ire of party officials. Some said he should be expelled from party ranks. Others declared he would be expelled if he again seeks nomination in Burnaby come the next provincial election.

Cox reported he went as a member of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, not a Communist, that the NDP should "get off the Red-baiting bandwagon" and that he would make a report on his trip after the opening of the legislature Jan. 24.

GRAND FALLS, Nfld. (CP)—Town council has voted to buy the Grand Falls Stadium and Hartwood Hall from the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company at a cost of \$185,000 to be paid over 20 years. The stadium will be operated by a seven-man commission. The hall will be converted into a town hall. Both will be taken over June 1 if the sale is approved by the municipal affairs department.
