OTTAWA, Aug. 31.—The first place on the Bisley Team was won by Capt. Thom. Mitchell, of Toronto, who also takes the Harold Borden Memorial Cup and medal. The eastern men who are sure to go to Bisley and their aggregate are:—W E Forbes, Chatham, 8th place, 459; O S Wetmore, Sussex, 12th place, 459; Tim Burns, Halifax, 14th place, 458; H C Blair, Truro, 21st place, 455.

#### DYING LIKE FLIES.

#### The Cholera in India Plays Havoc Among Natives.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—The epidemic of cholera, says the Simla correspondent of the Daily Mail, is one of the worst outbreaks on record. The bubonic plague is child's play compared with it. The natives are dying like flies at the rate of 3,000 a week. The epidemic is undoubtedly due to the pollution of the scanty water supply during the famine.

GLASGOW, August 29.—Three persons, father, mother and child, who have been certified to be suffering from bubonic plague, have been placed under the care of the medical authorities here.

## ANOTHER RELEASE OF PRISONERS

### They are Marching to Join Roberts

#### KRUGER AND HIS OFFICIALS IN A NEW PLACE.

#### Destructive Cyclone Does Damage at Mafeking.

LORENZO MARQUES, Aug. 30.—The British prisoners at Nootgedacht have been released by the Boers and are marching to join Lord Roberts' forces at Watermaal Hoven near Machadodorp.

Kruger and his chief officials are at Nelspruit.

MAFEEKING, Aug. 30.—A cyclone that visited Mafeking last night did more damage than seven months bombardment. It blew down or unroofed numerous buildings and leveled the military camp hospital, causing much suffering among sick and wounded. One person was killed and two injured.

#### GENERAL WARREN SPEAKS.

#### He Explains the Spion Kop Episode.

NEW YORK, August 29.—The Tribune's London special on the South African situation is as follows:—

"Sir Charles Warren has just arrived in London from South Africa and is in a communicative mood. The gallant general is by no means inclined to sit down quietly under the criticism passed upon him, and opened his campaign by speaking freely about Spion Kop, on which he has already addressed a long and detailed explanation to the war office. He does not admit responsibility for the occupation of that position, which, he said, he did not approve, but on the contrary, suggested to General Buller an alternative plan, which was the one eventually adopted by that general. At the same time, General Warren says, when ordered to seize Spion Kop he did so, and the troops could have maintained themselves there till the Boers abandoned the attack had not Colonel Thornycroft unaccountably given the order to retire during the night. "For this movement General Warren contends that he was himself in no way to blame. It is evident that there is likely to be a rather sharp controversy on this as on several other points, between some of the rival generals and their supporters, when the campaign is finished, or, possibly before."

"The British public, however, is less interested in these matters than it would have been recently. In the early part of the war a tremendous trade was done in bone buttons with portraits of South African generals, which were sold in the streets at a penny each. Now there is a slump in these mementoes. Nobody wants to buy the buttons, which are sold ten for a penny, or given away for nothing."

#### On the Verge of War.

LONDON, August 30.—As a result of the friction between Roumania and Bulgaria over the latter's delay in complying with the demand of the former for the suppression of the Macedonian revolutionary committee, the Bulgarian diplomatic agent at Bucharest, Dr. Thodereff, has been recalled. According to the Vienna correspondent of the Express the Wiener Abendblatt asserts that Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria has threatened to abdicate unless the quarrel with Roumania is amicably settled.

#### A Complaint Investigated.

BERLIN, August 29.—The delegation of German subjects who recently arrived here from the Transvaal to lodge complaint with the German Foreign Office in regard to the treatment of Germans there by the British has already been received by the foreign office. After investigating the grounds of complaint the foreign office will bring the matter to the attention of Great Britain.
