

# Canada's 'Flying Saucer' To Be Tested This Spring

OTTAWA (CP) — Any persons in Toronto or vicinity who think they see a flying saucer in the next few months may well be right.

Informants said Thursday Canada's flying saucer, under development for six years, is scheduled to take to the air for the first time in May or June.

"Flying saucer" is not a misnomer because the Buck-Rogers-ish machine is round, about 18 feet in diameter and carries two or three men.

Avro Aircraft Limited of Malton, near Toronto, the company developing the unique vehicle, is not yet sure it will function.

Principles embodied in the secret project cannot be proven until flight trials are undertaken. If the machine does work, there is a good possibility it will be mass-produced for the United States Army and perhaps for the Canadian army.

The U.S. took over financing of the project when Canada withdrew after spending \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000 on it.

The flying saucer is designed to take off and land vertically. It would be able to hover like a helicopter or dart off in any direction at subsonic speed.

Avro wants to find out whether a transonic version will work before it tries it hands at a supersonic model.

Sir Roy Dobson, chairman of A. V. Roe Limited, said in London last month that his company has under development in Canada an "aerocar" or flying jeep. This was the first reference to the project since 1955 when former Liberal defence production minister C. D. Howe referred to the amount of money Canada had put into it.

He said at that time the project, if carried through, would cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000,000.

## THE WEEK AT S.D.U.

### Queens M.P. Tells S.D.U. About Canada At The U.N.

Another in a series of lectures was heard in the Alumni gym on Friday evening, January 9. Rt. Rev. J.A. Sullivan, Rector of St. Dunstan's, introduced the speaker, Heath Macquarrie, M.P. In his introduction, Fr. Sullivan mentioned the fact that the speaker was born on the Island at Victoria by the Sea, just off the Trans-Canada Highway a short distance from here. A graduate of Prince of Wales, Mr. Macquarrie went to the University of Manitoba where he did graduate work and received his degree in Political Science. Since entering the field of politics, he has served as a Canadian representative to the United Nations and, also, as one of the committees which handle the work of the General Assembly.

Mr. Macquarrie opened his talk with an explanation of the two prevalent aspects existing in regard to the U.N. — the idealistic viewpoint and that which maintains that there is no communitarian and, consequently, nothing of importance is being accomplished. He continued to exclaim that there are seven committees which handle items on the agenda of the General Assembly, the first of which is that which deals with major political questions such as: disarmament, the open question, Cyprus, and the CANADA'S ROLE.

The speaker mentioned the important part which Canada plays in the Economic Development Fund, which exists for the benefit of underdeveloped countries which need monetary aid in starting industry and taking advantage of their respective natural resources. He said that Canada is watched with hopeful eyes by much of the world as she contributes a great deal to this Fund.

The most appropriate name for the last session, in his opinion, would be the African Session, since this country came into the limelight many times and since the most success was achieved in its regard. No longer is it called "darkest Africa" because the various states are fast becoming recognized and are in line for admission to the United Nations. Several have been admitted and, according to Mr. Macquarrie, there exists a fine relationship between these new entrants and Canada, a relationship which is important to Canada.

**MANY QUESTIONS**

During the question period which followed his address, the speaker answered questions from the faculty members and the students present. These questions covered a very wide area and included: the Berlin and Algerian situations, the African admission procedure, the possibility of another Suez crisis, the future of the United Nations, and whether or not the Soviets have changed their tactics over the past several years.

In regard to the latter, Mr. Macquarrie said that their tactics have indeed changed but that their ambitions have remained the same. During his answers, he also stated that the U.N., during the Middle East Session held in 1957, when economic programs were the main issues, and during other sessions, has accomplished enough to justify its existence.

Fr. Sullivan thanked the speaker on behalf of the students and expressed the hope that he would consent to see fit to return in the near future to give another such talk. In so doing, Fr. Sullivan expressed the desire of the entire audience as it was readily admitted that Mr. Macquarrie is a very able and interesting speaker. One person put it very well when he said that he "has every sentence loaded with facts and with plenty of food for thought". Thank you, sir, for a very informative evening and may you return soon for another such lecture.

**HOCKEY**

Game time is 8:30 and the contest will be followed by another of the popular sock-hops.

Back to the Second Team again as we see that they lost to the very team that they defeated in the first game of the year. Wednesday night, they visited the P.W.C. gym and came out on the short end of a 45-37 score. Once again, Callaghan paced the lads with 10 points while Mahar had 8 and MacWade and Tingley had 6 apiece.
