

P. E. I. Rifle Team Retains Maritime Title In Shoot At Debert, N. S.

TRURO, N. S., June 18—A Prince Edward Island team Saturday at the nearby Debert ranges won the annual Inter-Maritime Rifle Championship, defeating teams from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The Island team scored a total of 755. Nova Scotia was second with 738 and New Brunswick scored 735.

It was the fourth consecutive year that the P. E. I. team has won the championship, and the first time that any Province has won the Inter-Maritime Trophy that many times in succession in the fifty-one times that it has been competed for. Nova Scotia has won it 22 times, P. E. I. 15 times and New Brunswick 14 times.

Ralph E. Jenkins of the P. E. I. team was the highest scorer of the match with a total of 100 out of a possible 105. He also scored the only perfect scores of the meet, making them over the 200 and 500 yard ranges. C. Parks of the New Brunswick team was the second leading scorer with a 93, while Major Cyril Kennedy was the high scorer for the Nova Scotia team with a 97. Major Kennedy shoots with only one arm as the result of an amputation while serving with the Canadian Army overseas during the last war.

Coached by P. J. Landrigan of Charlottetown and captained by Capt. E. R. Burke, the Island team made up their winning margin of 17 points by leading by five points at the 200 yard range, increasing it five more at the 500 and adding seven more for their full total at the 600 yard range.

Following the shoot, all three teams were the guests of the Nova Scotia Rifle Association at a special banquet at the Scotia Hotel at Truro, presided over by the president, Major Cyril Kennedy. Coach Landrigan of the P. E. I. team was complimented highly at the banquet by members of the other two Provincial teams, who stated that one of their main reasons for losing to the Island team was because it had the best coach in Eastern Canada and one of the best in the whole Dominion.

Jerry The First Is Winner Of Golden West Pace

ARCADIA, Calif., June 18—(AP) Jerry the First, taking charge of the race in the drive down the stretch, captured the \$50,000 Golden West Pace for the second straight year Saturday at Santa Anita Park.

The six-year-old chestnut, owned by Eddie Cobb and Jerry Burdick of Washington court house, and driven by Cobb, finished 1 1/2 lengths in front of the California-bred Patchen Axworthy, while the popular Dr. Stanton faded back to third place in the field of 10 standard-breds.

The winner, clocked at 2:32 1/5 for the 1 1/4 miles, paid \$4.30, \$2.60 and \$2.50. Long-shot Patchen Axworthy paid \$14.60 and \$3.20, and Dr. Stanton \$2.70.

Jerry the First collected \$22,500 for his owners, bringing his lifetime earnings up to \$101,510. Dr. Stanton owned and driven by Lindy Fraser of Forest, Ont., grabbed the early pace, with Jerry the First moving into the second spot and then lagging back in the third. Driver Joe O'Brien of New Glasgow, N.S., brought Guest Star into contention, challenging the nine-year-old Dr. Stanton at the mile.

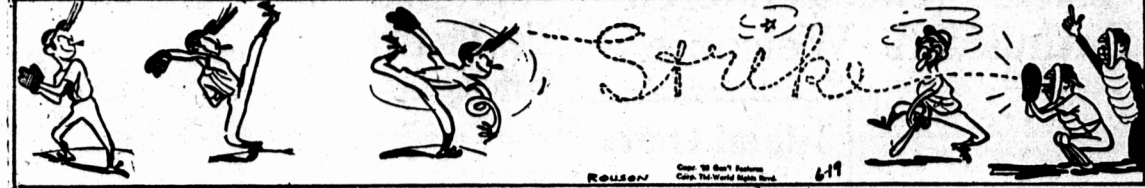

The Provincial Rifle team, under coach P. J. Landrigan and captained by Captain E. R. Burke, distinguished themselves and the Province they represent at Debert, N. S. on Saturday, when they captured the Inter-Maritime Rifle Match and Trophy for the fourth consecutive year the only time it has been done in the history of the event.

Competing against the top-ranking rifle teams from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, the Island representatives amassed a total of 755 points to lead the event over their nearest competitors, Nova Scotia, by a margin of 17 points. They not only distinguished themselves as a team, but as individual marksmen as well. Lt. R. E. Jenkins of Charlottetown, was the highest scorer of the meet with a total of 100 out of a 105 possible and also scored the only perfect scores of the meet by ranges, when he chalked up 35's on both the 200 and 500 yard ranges. Lt. J. S. Moore, also of the local team, was among four others who tied for third place with 97 each.

It was not only the shooting members of the team who distinguished themselves at the meet. At a special banquet held in Truro after the match was concluded, Coach Landrigan of the Island team, was highly honored when members of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick teams credited him with much of the team's success by stating "he is the best coach in Eastern Canada, and one of the best in the whole Dominion."

On their return to this Province yesterday afternoon, members of the local team stated that it was a highly successful meet, but that a changing wind, known as a "fish-tail" made the shooting, particularly over the long ranges, extremely difficult. One member of the team stated last night that the wind changed so quickly at times "that it allowed for a left wind while taking sight, it would shift to the right before you could pull the trigger." They also stated that they were very lucky with the weather otherwise. Clear skies prevailed all through the shoot, but that only 15 minutes after it was over, the range was deluged with a terrific downpour of rain that would have made shooting near impossible.

Well, local racing fans got plenty in the way of smart racing and exciting track duels at the Exhibition track on Saturday night in the opening feature of the Provincial Exhibition Association and Charlottetown Driving Park's night racing program for this summer. Although the weather was anything but perfect, with strong winds and showers, which was against very fast times being made, but what the meet lacked in speed was made up in really close, keen racing that brought the photo finish camera into play on a number of occasions to determine the winner.

Probably one of the most prominent features highlighting the opening performance, was the new and bright atmosphere of the whole plant, and the fine improvements that have been carried out there to the best possible advantage and betterment of the site. So many changes to the track and its surrounding grounds have been made that it is almost necessary to go and see it to appreciate it fully. With a perfect racing surface, the track has been widened to facilitate better racing conditions to the utmost. The centre field area has been cut down so that the horses can be seen by the spectator at any point on the track from any seating angle, and the lighting and other conditions are perfect. If there is any doubt about it having been called "Canada's finest race track" in the past, there is certainly no doubt about it now.

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Warrington Recaptures Light-Heavy Title In Decision Over Zastre

KENTVILLE, N. S., June 18—(CP)—Tiger Warrington, 36, of Mahone Bay, N. S. recaptured the Canadian light-heavyweight title here Saturday night earning a decision over Eddie Zastre of Montreal in a 12-round bout. Warrington went into the ring at 174 pounds, one pound heavier than Zastre.

Referee Clyde McGinnis of Halifax called it a draw, and judge Donald St. John of Ottawa gave five rounds to Warrington, four to Zastre and three even. Cameron McNeill of Kentville said four for the Tiger, three to Zastre and five rounds even. The fight drew 1,200 fans.

Warrington opened up fast and set the pace in the early rounds, but the Tigers, who relinquished the title in 1939 and claims to be

36, slowed considerably toward the end.

The veteran Tiger fell twice, in the first and eighth, but was on his feet before the count started. In the eighth Warrington drew the only blood when he gashed Zastre's upper lip.

After falling in his effort for an early knockout, the veteran Tiger went on the defensive in the seventh, when his long experience paid dividends.

Low Wyman, Zastre's manager, said after the bout he thought the Montrealer should have had a close decision. The title bout was recognized by the Canadian Boxing Federation. There has been no Canadian light-heavyweight title holder since Warrington retired in 1939.

Keen Contests As 1950 Harness Racing Season Gets Underway Here

The 1950 harness horse racing season got away to a successful start over the Exhibition Track on Saturday night when some 2000 racing enthusiasts turned out to witness eight keenly contested one-mile dash events despite inclement weather conditions.

Performing under lights, a total of 46 trotters and pacers faced the official starter in the first night racing program of the season.

In the opening event on the card Just Brenda, owned by Dr. R. F. Seaman of Charlottetown and driven by Don Seaman, led a field of five over the mile route and although pushed closely by British Guy Hal for second place, was a winner by a good margin all the way. Lusticia, owned by C. H. Chandler, City, and driven by A. Tierney, was the winner of the second race in a tightly bunched field of Bonnie Dale, Buddy Budlong, Baron, and Wait N'See who all finished close to the order.

Lusticia covered the route in 2:17 3/5, the fastest mark of the night which was also shared by Rhodola D. in winning the number four event on the card in a really driving finish that called for a photo finish with Dale B. and Billy Conn who placed second and third respectively.

Lee Brewer was leading the five-horse field by eight lengths at the three-quarter pole of the fourth event but was overtaken by the other three in a drive
