China Claiming Best Crop Since Reds Came To Power

The following article is the result of a 4,000-mile trip through China by Ian McCrone, Reuter's Hong Kong correspondent.

NANKING (Reuters)—China's harvests this year are officially claimed to be the best since the Communists came to power 16 years ago.

This is totally credible if crops throughout the country are as good as they look this fall in Shantung, Kiangsu, Chekiang, Kiangsi, Hunan and Kwangtung provinces.

From the air and from the train, the traveler sees acre after acre of well-watered vegetable fields, orchards and heavily-irrigated rice paddies.

The weather has not been ideal and some parts of the country have suffered from the two historic agricultural contradictions, floods and drought.

The dry spell affected Shansi, Hopei and Inner Mongolia. The floods struck the central basin fed by the Hwai River.

AREA LACKS WATER
Hopei province and the north-east have been having one of the worst dry spells for years. Conditions are officially described as a "major and serious drought."

The bare, dry hills of Hopei and Liaoning give way dramatically over the Shantung boundary to abundant water and greenery around Nanking.

The countryside of Kiangsu, between Soochow and Shanghai, is lush with late rice, vegetables of all types, cotton and fruit.

The concentration on irrigation during the last decade has led to huge new canal systems. Individual communes make their own electric pumps, and boast of raising up to 90 per cent of their irrigation water by electricity.

But around the former Nationalist capital of Nanking and in the less sophisticated rural areas away from the coast, treadmill waterpumps worked by old peasant women, and human bucket brigades lifting water, a few gallons at a time from river to paddy-field, are common sights.

FEED CITIES
There now are 74,000 communes in nearly all parts of China. Some have the specific task of feeding an adjacent city or supply it with raw materials.

The China-Cuba friendship commune, 15 miles outside Peking, is charged with sending vegetables and milk to the capital.

Some pigs are raised on private plots, and 20,000 ducks—a small number—are sent to Peking markets each year.

Near Shanghai, the Ma Chiao (Horse Bridge) commune, one of 200 supplying China's biggest city, specializes in foodgrains and cotton for the textile factories.

Fall harvesting currently is under way in China, though little has been done yet in some parts of the southeast.

Wheat and first-crop rice has been better than harvests last year, and late-season rice is expected to produce more grain than last fall.

Foreign Minister Chen Yi has described this year's harvest as "very good indeed compared with previous harvests in history."

CITE ACHIEVEMENTS
Pleased agriculture ministry officials pointed to the following achievements on the farm this year:
—An increase of 3,250,000 acres under irrigation.
—More than 10,000 agricul-

tural scientists graduated and at work.
—Some 3,000,000 tons more chemical fertilizer used.
—"Tens of millions" of city dwellers and students helping out on the land.
The program for keeping cadres and high government servants in touch with the lot of the peasant continues.
Desk-bound bureaucrats have to do stints of up to several months in the fields of some remote community.
Experimental plots and demonstration stations are regular features of model communes and their findings are being shared.

DENY DOUBLE TIME
COLCHESTER, England (CP)—People who work on Sunday should not expect double pay, says Colchester vicar Rev. Malcolm Cherry in the parish magazine. He says workmen used to be paid double time on Sunday because they were deprived of the right to attend church, but now so few people worship regularly, the extra pay is unnecessary.
