Bomb Probe Pinned in Jet Plane Crash

CENTREVILLE, Iowa (AP)—Federal investigators met for 90 minutes Sunday amid growing indications they were concentrating on the possibility a bomb was carried aboard a Continental Airlines jet which broke up and crashed Tuesday night killing 49 persons.

W. Mark Felt, head of an FBI team on the scene, said the FBI is "conducting a full and extensive investigation to determine whether there had been violation of the aircraft destruction law."

Several passengers were heavily injured.

The Civil Aeronautics Board said Saturday an unknown explosive force from within ripped apart the \$5,500,000 plane five minutes after its last radio contact, and after it had passed some thunderstorms.

Felt would not say the FBI believed a bomb or other device was carried aboard the big 707 jet. But one source who declined to be identified said it appeared unlikely the explosion could have resulted from any other cause.

Six said in Denver, the airlines' headquarters, there was "sufficient evidence to indicate a man-made explosive had been set off within the aircraft."

Authorities indicated that a complete and detailed study is under way into the background of all 37 passengers and eight crew members who lost their lives.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter rejected any idea that he was tired or confused on his third orbit of the world last Thursday.

"On the third orbit, south of Hawaii, there were six things going on at one time," Carpenter said Sunday during a televised press conference from this spaceport.

He said he was looking for the fireflies which astronaut John H. Glenn Jr. reported seeing during his orbital flight last Feb. 20. At the same time he was trying to "photograph the sunrise," and get ready for the retro-firefall firing that would bring the Aurora 7 spacecraft back to earth.

"I understand that I was a tired and confused astronaut," Carpenter said. "In my opinion is worth anything to you, I would say this was not true, was preoccupies me."

TRAIL, B.C. (CP)—Five women of the radical Doukhobors of Freedom met and stripped naked in the Trail arena Saturday night in the middle of a speech by Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

The prime minister's political tables on the doukhobors, however, with some of the quickest wit in the history of Canadian public speaking.

"That is so lovely to me," he said as he saw what was going on, and the crowd of some 1,000 roared with laughter.

"I was raised on a homestead in Saskatchewan and that's why I know what those girls are," Mr. Diefenbaker noted most of the reporters rushing over to the arena seats where the women stood.

"Some of the press boys have never seen this before," Mr. Diefenbaker cracked, and that's why they're so excited."

One reporter paused in front of the platform to write down the words of Mr. Diefenbaker saying: "The prime minister said to him: 'You'd better get into line, you're too far away.'"

All but one of the women were crying as they stood naked in the arena.

"We want an end to discrimination," one of them said.

"The Bill of Rights applied to us, too. We are proud of our families and our children and we want to be Canadians like everybody else."

Laotian Gains By Communists Are Reported

UBOL, Thailand (Reuters)—New reports Sunday said the southern Laotian provincial capital of Saravane fell to Communist Pathet Lao troops Saturday following a three-day siege.

The shakety reports, reaching this southwest Thai border listening post, said right-wing government troops were driven out of Saravane by a heavy mortar and artillery barrage.

The reports were immediately confirmed but it verified would mark the first resumption of Communist military operations in Laos since United States troops began arriving in Thailand earlier this month.

Children Suspected in Quebec Explosion

ARRESTOS, Que. (CP)—Children at play may have caused the worst explosion in the history of Quebec, police suspected Sunday.

Eight people, five of them children, were killed when the explosion blasted its way to a two-story house belonging to Raymond Lambert, a baker in this mining town 90 miles east of Montreal.

Mrs. Lambert's next door and other neighboring buildings were badly damaged by the blast. Killed were his wife, 44, his son Yves, 2, and daughter Danielle, 6. Mrs. Arthur Paradis, 40, and her 10-year-old son, 10, were injured.
