Library Patrons Not Reading Canadian-Authored Books

With Canadian Library Week taking place throughout the country from April 12th to 18th, Miss Jean Gill, librarian at the Charlottetown Library, said yesterday afternoon that their appears to be a noticeable lack of enthusiasm on the part of the public, to read the large number of books that have been written by Canadians and with a definite Canadian background.

Among those worthy of mention are: "Looking at Architecture in Canada" by Alan Cowans. This gives a delightful introduction to the general principles of Canadian architecture. This book is widely considered to be unique in its class.

A complete coverage of the historic geography of settlement and agriculture in Prince Edward Island is contained in the book entitled "Three Centuries and The Island" by Andrew Hill Clark, professor of geography at the University of Wisconsin.

Two excellent reference books are: "Atlas of Canada" published by the geographical branch of the department of mines and technical surveys, Ottawa. Of loose leaf form the readers can remove any of the sheets he or she may require for a closer detailed study. Between the covers there are a total of 110 detailed map sheets.

The second publication is "The Encyclopedia Canadian" which is contained in 10 volumes. Compiled under editor-in-chief Dr. John E. Robbins, this work provides much needed reference material, a need that has been long felt.

In addition to the foregoing, a visit to the public library will give the public full opportunity to become better acquainted with books that cover a wide range of subjects, which include, biographical works, history, travel, the fine arts and music.

For those who at times seek lighter relaxation, there is a vast field in the works of the writers

of fiction, humor, adventure, romance, mystery or any other subject which may fall into the prospective reader's desires and mood.

In addition there is available to library patrons, books and pamphlets on current affairs, along with a wide range of daily and weekly newspapers and periodicals, which provide information with events and situations that occur in all parts of the globe.

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Police Warn Bad Cheques On Rounds

Charlottetown's merchants were warned yesterday by Police Chief C. A. MacArthur to check more closely on the identity of persons cashing cheques.

Chief MacArthur issued the warning following several complaints from citizens that thieves are removing their government cheques from mail boxes and home entrances.

The chief said merchants should use "extreme caution" in determining the identity of the cheque bearer before cashing the cheque. If their should be any doubt, he said, police should be notified immediately.

The thieves have been attracted particularly to family allowance cheques. The names of the proper owners are then forged. In several instances the forged cheques have been issued for payment by juveniles.

In cases where children try to cash cheques, the chief said, the cashier should request a note from parent or guardian.

In all cases it is the storekeeper who cashes the checks who is liable for the loss.

Heavy Ice Causes Delay In Shipping

Heavy ice conditions which continue to exist in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Cabot Strait area may delay the shipping season from Charlottetown. It is thought that despite recent improvements in ice conditions, navigation will be set back possibly two weeks.

The CGS Brant, awaiting an all clear to place buoys at Wood Islands and Cariboo, cannot get through the locks at the Canso Causeway. In any event, Maritime Agent E. K. MacNutt points out that the ship will have to have assurance of freedom from drift ice before setting out the markers.

The start of the shipping service between the Island and Gulf

and north shore points will depend on ice conditions, P. A. Murnaghan, deputy minister of industry and natural resources, said yesterday.

Buonain and Bell Co., operators of a service with the Magdalen Islands, said they hoped to start their regular service Wednesday, but felt the bad ice conditions would cause a delay.

Tourist Queries Highest Ever, Travel Bureau Head Reports

Accommodation queries regarding campsites and trailer parks on the Island are the highest in the history of the bureau, A. A. Nicholson, director of the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau said yesterday.

Atlantic Provinces campaign enquiries are up 65 percent over last year and local enquiries are doubled. This is expected to result in an increase of at least 15 per cent in the number of visitors to the province.

The Island's beaches are still considered to be the main attraction of visitors to the Island and the 150,000 tourists who visited the province last year spent at least \$7,500,000.

It is expected that at least 60 more motel units will be made

available to tourists this coming season than in 1958.

One feature of last year's tourist season was the increase in the number of chartered bus tours. There were approximately 60 of them with each having about 60 persons.

With the volume of enquiries only getting into stride, 630 letters were received by the local bureau yesterday. Last year the greatest number for any one day was about 500.

This month and next are the top months for tourist inquiries, Mr. Nicholson said. Since it is not yet the middle of April, it is expected the volume of mail asking for tourist information and literature will increase considerably.

Club Work On P.E.I. Tops In Canada

Prince Edward Island leads Canada in having the highest percentage of its United Church parishes organized in men's club work. This was pointed out at the annual meeting of the United Church of Canada which concluded at Toronto Saturday.

It was noted that 22 of a total of 33 charges are organized in active men's work. The Island also led Canada in the attendance at its annual conference and schools for elders and stewards. Last year 84 men attended the annual conference of United Church men held at Stanhope and 150 attended the school for elders and stewards held in January in Charlottetown.

The report on men's club work was given by Ralph Wilson, associate secretary of the board of men. The meeting was attended by Allison MacKinnon of Charlottetown, a member of the interim committee of AOTS United Church Men's Clubs and immediate past president of Maritime United Church Men.

Rt. Rev. Angus J. MacQueen, DD, moderator of the United Church of Canada, addressed the board during the three-day meeting.

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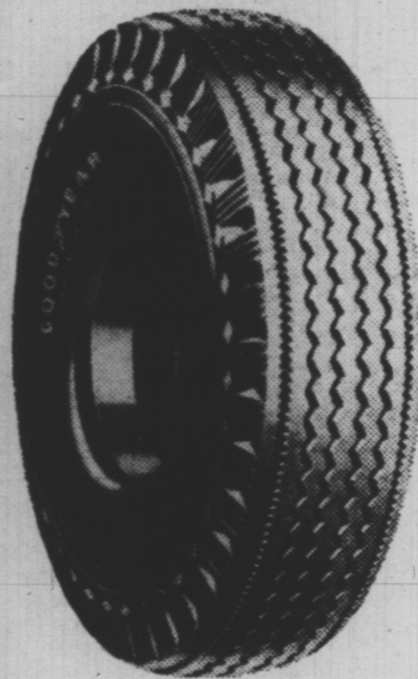
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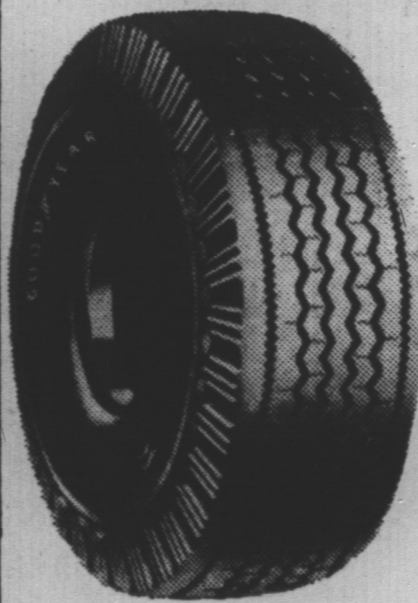
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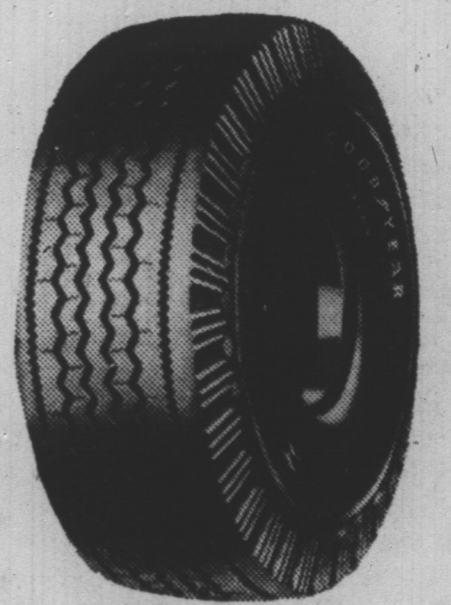
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
