The Governorship.

THE news of the appointment of the Hon. A. A. McDonald will, we feel sure, be received throughout the country, as it has been received in the town, with unmingled satisfaction by almost every one.

Mr. McDonald was for many years in politics, and all the while took an active part in the deliberations and consequent measures which led to the settlement of the great questions concerning our lands, our railway, and our union with the great Dominion.

He is also, and has long been, a representative Catholic layman. The question of religion or creed should not, of course, be considered as of any weight in an official appointment, and it is not probable that the Government gave it much consideration in this instance.

Mr. McDonald was one of the best, if not the best, officers who have had the management of the Post Office in this Province; and as a public servant who has done well, it is but right that he should receive his reward, and be invited to go up higher.

There is, however, another consideration, which will be satisfactory to a large and very rapidly increasing body of men and women in this Province. Mr. McDonald is a strict teetotaler, and a prominent advocate of the temperance movement; and as the head of society in this Province, will, no doubt, exert his influence in the promotion of his principles.

And while doing so, we must not forget to acknowledge the able administration of the retiring Governor. The most important of the gubernatorial duties have been performed by Mr. Haviland with care and dignity, with satisfaction to the Government and the country.

It is rumored that Mr. Brecken is to take the important office made vacant by the promotion of Mr. Macdonald. As a politician Mr. Brecken has had a long career, and it is not wonderful that he now desires to retire.

The Patriot is already sounding the tocsin for a Convention to select the Grit candidate for the vacancy which Mr. Brecken's possible acceptance of office will make in Parliament; and it will be well if supporters of the Government allow no time to be lost in taking the right step to put the right man in the field.

Bradlaugh is still full of fight notwithstanding the crushing defeat he lately received in the Court and is seeking consolation in preparing a long list of exceptions to the charge of Lord Chief Justice Coleridge on which to base an appeal.

Editorial Notes.

The St. John Telegraph reports that the Masonic Celebration of Dominion Day was a grand and imposing display, well fitted to impress the general public with the strength and standing of Masonry in New Brunswick, and the high character of its membership.

Another testimony comes from the Northwest agent the crop prospects, and pleasantly out of joint with the Toronto Globe's sad editorial predictions.

Mr. C. J. Brydges, Commissioner of the Hudson Bay Company in the Northwest, arrived in the city today. He stated to your correspondent that he had made an extended tour throughout the chief agricultural districts of Manitoba, and found the crop looking remarkably well.

Asiatic Cholera.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE RAVAGES OF THIS TERRIBLE DISEASE.

True Asiatic cholera, a virulent form of septic cholera, always originates in Hindostan. The year 1756 marks the recognition of periodically returning twelve yearly epidemics connected with the great twelve yearly Hindu festivals at the temples. These epidemics recurred in 1758 and 1781, in which latter year 5,000 English troops, after camping on foul pilgrim grounds and drinking polluted water, were attacked.

In India the epidemic spread in every direction, being conveyed in ships south to Ceylon and also west and east to Africa and from there to Muscat, at the foot of the Persian Gulf; thence down again southeast to Bombay.

In 1826 another pestilence appeared in the north of India and epidemic cholera broke out at Hurdwar. Thence it was carried back to Caboll. It spread over the Asiatic caravan route, extending to Moscow and was distributed all over Northern and Western Russia, whence it was conveyed to Berlin and Hamburg and over to London. After it had prevailed in England and Ireland it was carried over to Canada in 1832 by emigrant ships, and one regiment in Quebec lost 200 men in a week.

Canada in England.

The degree of M. A. was last week conferred upon the Marquis of Lansdowne, at Oxford.

The Canada, Captain Durrant, is expected to return to England at the beginning of August.

Sir Charles Tupper was amongst those present at Mrs. Gladstone's reception on Wednesday last.

It is stated that Captain Nash, R.A., has been appointed Professor of Military History in the Royal Military College at Kingston.

We understand that the Dominion Government have decided to continue for another year to pay the bonus of \$10 upon all actual settlers in British Columbia.

Dr. Barnardo is to go to Canada this autumn, with the view of extending the facilities for removing to Canada suitable children from his well-known homes.

We are glad to learn that there is every prospect of the visit of an English team of artillerymen to Canada this year being satisfactorily arranged. At the annual meeting of the National Artillery Association the Marquis of Londonderry stated that of the sum of £1,000 required to defray expenses of the visit the Common Council had contributed 100 guineas, and he himself would give £50, and he thought there were good hopes that the full amount would soon be subscribed.

The detachment will consist of twenty-three officers and men. We also note that in the annual report of the Association a very complimentary reference is made to the Canadian team who were at Shoeburyness last year. The report states that "this fine detachment fully sustained the reputation for soldierly bearing, discipline, and good conduct gained by their predecessors."

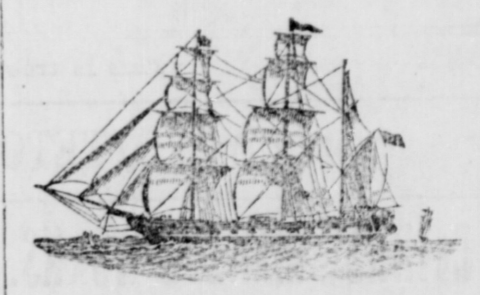
