Minor Leagues Would Restrict TV, Broadcasts

HOUSTON (AP)—The minor leagues voted Thursday to ban commercial broadcasts or telecasts of major or minor league baseball games on stations outside their home territory. Home territory was defined as that within 50 miles of ball park. Non-commercial broadcasts or telecasts would be permitted. The major leagues still have to approve this amendment to the major-minor agreement at their meeting next week in New York. It was considered doubtful that the majors would concur. The minors also voted in favor of cutting player limits from 25 to 23 men in the majors and corresponding reductions in the minors. The action was taken at an executive session of the annual minor league convention.

Richard Fires 398th Goal As Canadiens Win 4-1

DETROIT (CP)—Maurice Richard fired the 398th goal of his career Thursday night and Montreal Canadiens whipped Detroit Red Wings 4-1 in a National Hockey League game of taut tempers and 60 minutes of penalties.

The victory increased Montreal's National Hockey League lead over Toronto to seven points.

Canadiens were in complete command from start to finish in the riotous game in which referee Bill Chadwick dealt out 20 penalties, 10 to each team. Richard was handed a misconduct penalty in the first period, and with two minutes left in the session, a free-for-all broke out in front of the Detroit bench and both teams had to be sent to the dressing room to cool off. 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Cheer Up Chuck Campaign Catches On In Montreal

MONTREAL (CP)—The cheer up Chuck campaign has caught the fancy of football fans Thursday that the sponsoring radio stations lagged behind in the count and the staff was in a dither.

"At the moment there must be at least 6,000 responses, at a conservative estimate," said station manager Jimmy Tapp of CJAD Montreal. "I wouldn't be at all surprised if the number hits 10,000 some time tonight. We have three employees trying to get caught up with the deluge."

By mail and in person, fans are supplying their names and 10 cents each towards cost of a telegram that will go to Chuck Hunsinger, Montreal Alouettes' halfback. Hunsinger was the goat in the Grey Cup game last Saturday when Edmonton Eskimos beat out Alouettes 26-25.

The cheer-up telegram will go to Hunsinger at his home in Harrisburg, Ill.

"Not only are people mailing and bringing in their letters and dime," said Tapp, "but they're telephoning to say a new interest in football has been created."

The board of trustees and others connected with the annual award of the trophy to the outstanding football player in Canada sent a telegram applauding the idea and stating a cheque to cover 25 names would follow. Hunsinger's teammate Sam Etcheberry received the award this year.

Native Dancer Acclaimed Champ A-P-C League

NEW YORK (AP)—Native Dancer, Alfred G. Vanderbilt's powerful grey four-year-old who was retired in August because of a foot injury, was acclaimed "American champion" race horse of 1954 Thursday night at the annual dinner of the Thoroughbred Racing Associations.

Although the great son of Polyesian-Geisha started only three races in the past season, winning them all, the TRA board of selections gave him 19 votes out of a possible 39. The King Ranch's High Gun, previously named the three-year-old champion, received 11 votes.

Other votes in the balloting for American champion went to the Belair stud's Nashua, the two-year-old champion; C. V. Whitney's Fisherman, winner of the Washington, D.C. International at Laurel; and William G. Helis, Jr.'s Helioscope, victor in the recent Pimlico Special.

Wimpy Jones Paces Islanders To 7-3 Victory Over Capitals

FREDERICTON (CP)—Four goals by Wimpy Jones led Charlottetown Islanders to a 7-3 decision over Fredericton Capitals Thursday night as the Island team lengthened its Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League lead to five points over the second place Caps.

Dr. Fallowfield Addresses Rugby Followers At PWC

Dr. Bill Fallowfield, secretary of both the English Rugby League and the Rugby International Board, addressed a large enthusiastic group of local rugby supporters at Prince of Wales College last evening, winding up his three-day visit to Prince Edward Island, concerning the rugby situation in the Maritimes and how the Island fits into it.

Mr. Fallowfield was personally introduced to many of these in attendance before and after the meeting. Dr. Frank Jelks, coach of the Charlottetown Novas, during his short visit here Mr. Fallowfield had addressed approximately 600 players and backers of the sport which in Great Britain draws as many as 150,000 fans to a single game in the huge stadium in Glasgow, Scotland.

Both he and Dr. Jelks stated that rugby has been recently overshadowed by football here in Canada but that this is only temporary and that the Maritimes get a bit of co-ordination into their effort to keep the game in the fore. Already Canadian Football has gained a hold in the Maritimes with the organization of the Nova Scotia Canadian Football League, but the cost of the equipment and the danger to a player is far greater in football, so that if rugby was organized here it would definitely be preferable to the Grey Cup game as far these two elements are concerned.
