United States Fishing Interests.

The Fishing interests of the United States are preparing to kick against the renewal of reciprocity with Canada.

Additional Indemnity.

This is the view of members of the House of Commons and of the Montreal Gazette,—but not of the country.

The question of an increased indemnity this year, in view of the inordinate length of the season, is said to be a prominent topic of conversation at Ottawa.

The opinion of the country is that an increase to the indemnity of members would be a premium on obstruction and a vicious and dangerous precedent to set.

The Pension Order.

An order-in-council has been passed fixing the gratuities granted to parents or relatives of those who were killed or died on active service in the Northwest after March 20th, and fixing the pensions to be granted.

The Russian War Cloud Again.

Russians on the March!

Determined to Force on War

Afghans to the Rescue of Herat.

LONDON, July 16. The London Times of yesterday received information that the Russians have advanced in force to Zulikar Pass, and are treating Persian territory as though it were Russian.

The British Frontier Commission is moving nearer Herat. Reinforcements are arriving at Askabad.

It is believed that General Alikhanoff, commander of the Russian advance, is determined to force on a war, and that he is deceiving the Czar as to his real intentions.

In the House of Commons yesterday, Lord Randolph Churchill stated that the Government has heard of the movements of the Russians. He also said that the Frontier Commission was at Herat, and that it was reported that a large number of Russian reinforcements had arrived at Merv during the past fortnight.

Eight Afghan regiments are en route to Herat.

Winnipeg En Fete.

Grand Review of Canadian Troops.

WINNIPEG, July 16.

The grand review of the troops engaged in the suppression of the Northwest rebellion, came off yesterday. The men presented a fine appearance, and the whole city was en fete.

Edgar Stuart Wrecked!

PASSENGERS AND CREW SAVED.

HALIFAX, July 16. The steamer Edgar Stuart is a total wreck at Lockport. The crew and passengers have been saved.

Supplementary Estimates.

OTTAWA, July 16. The Supplementary Estimates for over three millions submitted to Parliament include:

Northwest war expenses, two millions six hundred thousand dollars.

Extension of the Interoceanic from Stellarton to Pictou, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

To make good to persons in P. E. Island the amount of duty paid the United States by them on fish and fish oil in 1871, twenty thousand dollars.

Additional subsidy for steamers from ports in New Brunswick and P. E. Island to Europe, two thousand five hundred dollars.

Mrs. McInnis Again.

OTTAWA, July 16. Yesterday an unusual occurrence took place. A woman, whose husband died three years ago from injuries received on the railway in P. E. Island, rushed through the corridor and into the Common Chamber to the bar, and there called out, "You killed my husband; give me back my husband."

The Government had given her \$2,000 in consequence of her loss. She was removed by the doorkeeper before she got very far into the chamber.

Another Wrecked Bank.

DUBLIN, July 16. The Bank of Munster has closed its doors. Apparently it is completely wrecked. A large number of people will be ruined.

Halifax Contingent Leave for Home.

WINNIPEG, July 16. The Halifax Battalion left last evening, after the review was over, for home.

Supreme Court, Queen's County.

THURSDAY, July 16.

Buchanan vs. Panting—The Jury last evening found a verdict for the defendant.

This morning the prisoner, Alexander Gillis, indicted for the murder of Patrick Callaghan, was placed in the dock in order that a day might be fixed for his trial.

The Court (Palmer, C. J., Peters and Hensley, J. J.) ordered that the trial should stand over till next January, or until the next Court should open in this County, at which Gillis could be tried.

This enables the Crown to call a special sitting of the Court before next January. O'Connor vs. McKinnon & McLean—This case is now being tried before Mr. Justice Peters. Davies, C. C., for the plaintiff; Peters & Peters for the defendants.

CURRENT NOTES.

About \$10,000,000 worth of corsets were sold in America last year.

The banking capital of the United States is estimated at \$738,000,000.

Thirty-six persons are reported to have starved to death in London last year.

A severe shock of earthquake, lasting several minutes, was felt at Calcutta on the 14th.

Geologists says that the coal beds of the earth will be exhausted in the 10,875 years.

The palace which the city of Marseilles presented to Napoleon III, is now used as cholera hospital.

There were three murders and five murderous assaults in the streets of Paris on Sunday night.

Sir Charles Dilke and Mr. Chamberlain will start on their Irish tour about the beginning of August.

Tucson, A. T., the inhabitants claim is the oldest city in America. It was originally an Indian village.

The long continued drought in the southern provinces of Russia has completely ruined the crops in that section.

There are at present in the United States 116 medical schools, and there is one physician to every 585 inhabitants.

Riel in his diary claims to have been divinely inspired. The indictment against him charges that he was "instigated by the devil."

Storms continue to destroy life and property in hundreds of parishes of Austria. There is a gloomy prospect and heavy loss of crops.

The British Government is ignorant of the reported offer of El Mahdi, through M. Billing, to release Gen. Gordon for \$5,000.

The number of communicants in the United Presbyterian Church in 1885 is reported at 88,871, being a gain over last year of 1,234.

Empress Augusta of Prussia offers a prize of \$1,000 for the best portable hospital tent for war or epidemic use. Competitors are to exhibit the tents at the Antwerp exhibition.

Nine times out of ten the woman who is worth her weight in gold marries a man not worth his weight in scrap iron. So only 10 per cent. of gold men marry ironing women.

James Russell Lowell has been mentioned in connection with the vacant presidency of Cornell University. He has headed off the movement however by stating that he is not a candidate for that or any other place.

Lord Randolph Churchill, Secretary for India, states in the Commons on the 14th inst., that the government had no intention of negotiating with Abdurrahman Khan, Ameer of Afghanistan, for the defence of Candahar.

A renewal of the report of the coming coronation of the Czar as Emperor of Central Asia, produces anxiety in Central Asia. The courts of the Khans of Bokhara and Khiva are uneasy, fearing Russian annexation. The general populace is prepared by Russian agents to hail the news, and hope it will end in the freeing Mahomedanism from the Chinese yoke.

The Opposition Press have been striving to make some capital out of the fact for three days after to the sixth instant, no tobacco or spirits could be taken out of bond at any price. An explanation has been made by the Minister of Customs to the effect that on the evening of the 5th inst., the officers, both of customs and excise, throughout the country were instructed by telegraph not to allow spirits to go out of bond on and after the 6th, pending readjustment of the duties.

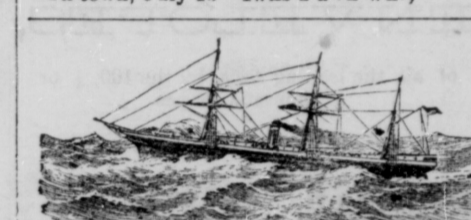
