**THE CENTURY FUND.** The Methodist Twentieth Century Fund is now \$643,852. It increased in March \$22,924.

**A LONG SESSION.**—The Quebec Legislature prorogued a few days ago, after a two months session, the longest in years.

**DOMINION EXHIBITION.**—Toronto will hold a Dominion Exhibition during the early fall of 1901 while the Pan-American exposition is in progress at Buffalo, N. Y.

**MUST GIVE UP ITS EXHIBIT.**—The World's Woman's Christian Temperance Union has been compelled most reluctantly to give up its exhibit at the exhibition in Paris. The war has brought about so many complications that it was impossible to proceed with the arrangements.

**FOR MOUNTED POLICE.**—Among the passengers by the Stanley this morning were five young men from Wheatley River, Arch Gregor, Kenneth Matheson, Wm. Matheson and others. It was their intention to have joined the Northwest Mounted Police here, but finding themselves too late left for the West via Boston for the purpose of enlisting.

**DOUBLE BEREAVEMENT.**—A very sad case is reported from Stoney Creek, New Brunswick. Mrs. John Scott and Miss Esther Hopper, her sister, were attacked by a cold which developed into pneumonia. The latter, aged 65, succumbed to the disease. Mrs. Scott also died a few hours after hearing of her sister's death. She was 74 years old.

**SUMMERSIDE VOLUNTEER COMPANY.**—In the House of Commons a few days ago the proposed organization of a volunteer company in Summerside was brought to the notice of the Government. The Minister of Militia said that an application for its establishment had been received and would receive due consideration when the Regimental Establishments for 1900-1 are under revision.

**AT KELLY'S CROSS.**—The entertainment at Kelly's Cross last evening is described as "a great success" by those whose privilege it was to attend. The popular drama, "The Irish Agent," was presented in a splendid manner, and there were interesting and entertaining specialties between the acts. These latter included a duet by the Misses Monaghan, vocal solos by Mr. Geo. Hennessey, a cornet solo by Mr. W. J. Brown and recitations by Messrs. Eggleston and Macgowan.

**ENCOURAGING.**—The friends of the work of the Young Men's Christian Association will be glad to know that the Executive Committee are being encouraged in their effort to raise \$800 toward the securing of a trained secretary. In a letter from J. H. Crocker, Physical Director of the Halifax Association last night, referring to the secretary the committee have in mind he says, "He is the very best man I saw at the Training School, and is all right, not afraid to take off his coat, and I am sure he will make a success of Charlottetown or any place he may go." He is all right in the physical department as well. Mr. Crocker has just returned from a Conference of Secretaries and Physical Directors of the New England States that was held at Springfield, Mass., where the International Young Men's Christian Association Training School, with 100 or more students, is carried forward. It is hoped that Mr. J. J. Chappell, who left for a trip across the line last night, will be able to meet the Secretary the committee hope to secure.
