WAR NEWS.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16. Gold 105 1/2. Exchange 82 1/2 to 84 1/2.

LONDON, Feb. 16. It is stated that since Tuesday the Russians have been advancing towards Gralipoli.

Germany ineffectually remonstrated at St. Petersburg, in regard to the threatened infringement of Austrian interests.

The Russian troops have entered Constantinople—no disturbance reported.

The Turkish army headquarters have been removed to Stefanos.

The Turks are hurriedly erecting earthworks on the Kudjuk Chekmedge line of defence.

Russo-Turkish peace negotiations are at a stand-still, since the appearance of the British fleet.

The Turks declare complete autonomy of Bulgaria inadmissible.

OUR OTTAWA DESPATCH.

(Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.) OTTAWA, Feb. 16.

After the first paragraph of the Address had passed, Dr. Tupper pointed out that Jones had put in no defence against the charges brought against him.

Jones replied, but brought out nothing new.

Sir John observed that if Jones denied that he had ever said "he would cheer were the British flag hauled down," then, Sir William Young, Judge DesBarres, William Thomson, General Doyle and the lamented Vail—all of whom had said that Jones uttered these words—were liars.

Mr. McKenzie replied, stating that not only had Cartier raised the flag of rebellion, but had run away from the fight.

The French members broke into loud cries of "slander," accusing McKenzie of "slandering the dead."

The excitement was intense. The House adjourned at ten minutes to five.

MONTREAL, Feb. 13.

The citizens' ball to the Governor General and Lady Dufferin last night was a great success. At least fifteen hundred people were present, many having come from New York, Boston, and other points in the New England States, as well as from the remotest places in Canada.

His Excellency and Lady Dufferin entered the Ball room at 10 o'clock, the Band of the 6th Fusiliers, stationed in the balcony, playing the national anthem. The Ball-Room being densely packed, dancing was almost an impossibility.

The toilets of the ladies were magnificent, many having been imported especially from London and Paris. Low-necked dresses prevailed.

The arrangements in the Hall were good, but the overcrowding made it rather uncomfortable to begin with. However, as the night progressed and people began to leave, there was more satisfaction. None of the Parliamentary representatives from Ottawa ventured down, and there was not a single Minister of the Dominion Government present.

The military were out in full force, and their brilliant uniforms blending with the exquisite colors of the ladies' toilets, presented a scene that was charmingly beautiful.

The Governor General was dressed in the uniform of the British navy and decorated with the numerous orders which he possesses. The splendor of Lady Dufferin's dress is past description. Their Excellencies occupied a dais on the south side of the ball-room. The ball may be considered a grand success.

Hamilton & Papenau, dry goods, have assigned. Liabilities, \$16,000; assets, \$18,000.

Charles Alexander, confectioner, called a meeting of his creditors to-day. His liabilities are \$150,000, and assets show a surplus of \$65,000, but cannot be realized at present.

J. B. Winters, stock broker, has failed; liabilities \$40,000; assets small.

The Anglican Synod, now meeting in Toronto, has decided, by a majority, to elect a Coadjutor Bishop. The struggle is between High and Low Church.

Archdeacon Whitaker, who heads the poll so far, is an extreme High Churchman.

John L. Taylor, eldest son of Alderman Taylor, of this city, took an overdose of morphine last night, and died shortly after.

The mails arrived at Cape Traverse at 5 o'clock this afternoon. They will probably arrive in this city at 9 o'clock, p. m.

The members of the Salvage Corps will please not forget to meet on next Monday evening, at the appointed hour.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL received the degree of L. L. D. at McGill University, Montreal, on the 13th. The students unhorsed his sleigh and drew it. The address and reply were in Greek. Much enthusiasm was exhibited. The day was the grandest in McGill annals.

The Moncton "Times" says: "The report circulated yesterday that the rubber coat worn by the late Timothy McCarthy the evening of his death, has been secured, may or may not be true. The City Marshal of Charlottetown, P. E. I., has in his possession a coat which it is thought may prove to be the one, but full particulars will be known in a day or two.

A Terrible Calamity.

A WHOLE FAMILY BURNED IN THEIR BEDS.

CAMBRIDGE, Feb. 13.—On Tuesday morning the inhabitants of Big Cove, Wickham, Q. Co., discovered a smoke rising from the ruins of Mr. Daniel Reardon's house, and, on visiting the spot, were horrified to find the remains of Mr. and Mrs. Reardon and their four children—the whole family. It is supposed that the fire had caught while they were asleep, and gained such headway before they awoke as to cut off all chance of escape. The remains of the parents were near the door, and, though shockingly charred, seemed as if they had died in each other's arms. The bodies of the children were beneath the bed-room in which they slept. An inquest was held before Dr. M. C. Macdonald, Coroner, and a verdict of "accidental death" returned. The deceased were aged respectively 51, 44, 13, 9, 5 and 2 years. Mr. and Mrs. Reardon, the latter a daughter of Mr. Robert McKay, of Wickham, were highly respected in the community in which they lived.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this morning, Albert Hertz and Hugh McNeill were fined 50 cents each for loitering at the street corners; Henry Duffy and Hugh Stewart, for the same offense, were fined 25 cents each; Thomas Burdett was fined \$3, or 10 days, for furiously driving his horse through the streets; Wm. Carpenter, who appeared on the same charge, was acquitted.

In the case of the Queen vs. Thomas McCloskey, a jury was obtained at 3 o'clock, after which the Court adjourned until Monday.

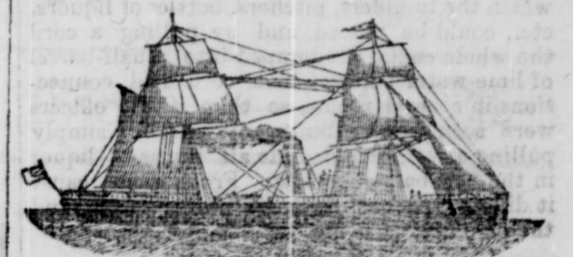

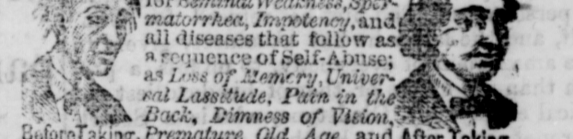
