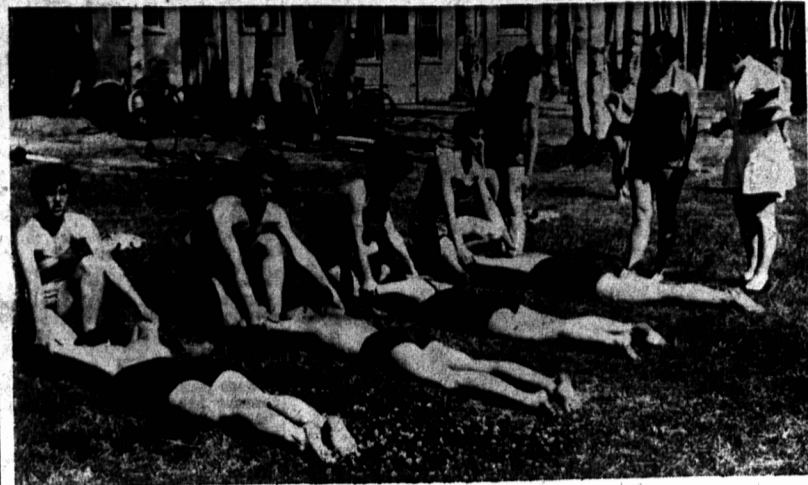

Girl Undergoes Operation At Sea

NEW YORK (AP)—An American
girl who underwent an emergency
appendicitis operation at sea July
16 was removed from the transport
Callan to a hospital at Argentina,
Nfld., the U.S. military sea trans-
portation service said Thursday.
The girl, Nancy Sue Cordell, 14,
daughter of air force Lt. Col. Wil-
liam F. Cordell, of Chattanooga,
Tenn., became ill during a trans-
atlantic voyage from Casablanca.
Her father had just completed a
tour of duty in the Mediterranean
and was returning to the United
States with his wife, daughter and
son, William Jr.
Early Wednesday the girl's con-
dition became worse and the Cal-
lan put into Argentina for the trans-
fer to hospital. The navy said a
report today from Argentina indi-
cated her condition had improved.

FULL COMPREHENSION BEYOND HUMAN SCOPE

Every day we are warned to
beware of cheap imitations and
are told that we really have not
seen anything until we have ex-
amined the genuine article.
Sometimes we actually come
across something genuine and ori-
ginal and it not only explains
itself to us, but it also shows us
to what extent the imitation is a
good imitation. If we had been con-
tented merely to examine the imi-
tation, we would never have known
the extent to which it is true to
the original and how far it falls
short of it.

Now, everything that God has
made bears some resemblance to
Him. Since God is absolutely sim-
ple in His nature and operation,
He could not know or create some-
thing which He does not some-
how know in knowing Himself, af-
ter the manner in which one knows
a copy in seeing the original. On
the other hand since we do not
have a vision of God in this
life, we do not know to what ex-
tent creatures resemble God, nor
do we know how far they fall
short of their original.

It might occur to us that even
though one creature cannot carry
us far in knowledge of the Crea-
tor, perhaps if we were to con-
sider the great and minute won-
ders of the universe all together,
we could attain a much more
adequate knowledge of God.

In a sense, a man who was an
artist had to express himself in
the works he actually did produce;
but this is not true in the case
of the Creator because no crea-
ture or sum of them is an ade-
quate expression of what He wan-
ted to express, that is Himself; and
so the Creator could have refrain-
ed from trying to express Himself
or else He could have done it in
countless other ways which could
have been just as adequate — or
rather, just as inadequate.

VIEW AS FATHER
Thus, our approach toward God
should not remain wholly intellec-
tual. We cannot come very near
Him at all if we search for Him
merely as the Supreme Reality,
the Creator of all we see around
us. Far better it is if we approach
God as person to person, and es-
pecially as a child to his father.
We may admire a Supreme Reality,
but we can love a person.
We are as children with regard
to God, and this means that we

the creatures bear a very defici-
ent likeness to their Creator but
we are in no position to know
the extent to which that likeness
is deficient. A random remark is
not enough to let us know what
a man has in mind; even less
does all creation tell us about the
nature and purposes of its Crea-
tor.
However, if we are supposed to
know something about the nature
and purposes of our Creator, we
must know without the help of the
Creator. Even so, we must bear
in mind that if God gives us a
knowledge of Himself so long as
this knowledge is expressed in
terms of things created, it is not
an adequate knowledge of God.
We do not really know God until
all created representations of Him
have been removed and He has
lifted us up to behold Him face to
face.
By faith, and in a dark manner,
we recognize the goodness of God
in creating us; in the realm of
faith and not in that of vision,
we recognize His generosity in
giving us an opportunity to be
generous toward Him. We are
given an opportunity to co-operate
with God in making ourselves
more Godlike through the growth
and development of our love of
God. To the extent that the love
of God increases in our hearts,
our blind certainty of faith is
supplemented by an understand-
ing of what God is like, that is
based on our greater likeness of
God.

hit by the continued dry weather
according to information received
from the Fruit and Vegetable

would be in plentiful supply
until the middle of next week and
this sudden curtailment has left
many housewives without the usual

Quell Forest Fire On Georgina Island

GEORGINA ISLAND, Ont. (CP)
A forest fire which has raged for
two days through poplar, cedar and
elm stands on this sparsely-inhab-
ited island was reported out-
mid-day Friday.

Ontario provincial police said
light rain this morning capped ef-
forts of 600 fire-fighters mobilized
from as far away as Toronto.
Georgina island, 55 miles north
of Toronto, is in Lake Simcoe and
part of the Simcoe Indian reserva-
tion. It is inhabited by 200 Ojib-
way Indians, mainly farmers.
