Report Gravel Washing Plant To Be Moved

The dredge 115, which has been engaged for the past two years in the Montague River, is at present being fitted to resume and complete operations here this year. It is understood that only certain points, particularly those at the beginning of the second and third courses will be dredged, since the remainder of the work was completed last fall. It was thought possible that two months at the most would complete the work. It has been the suggestion of some fishermen who have boats based here, that the small dock and old wharf east of the Stevens Wharf might be dredged out while the 115 is here. Doing this would provide a relatively large and sheltered boat harbour at minimum expense, which would be a boon to the many fishermen and also nautical sportsmen who make use of the present small dock area.

Dredging To Be Resumed

It was unofficially learned yesterday that the County Construction Company may be moving their gravel washing plant from the Valleyfield stream, where it has been located for the past two years, to the district about Surry. Sportsmen will be particularly happy should the rumor prove true, since it has been the feeling in many quarters that the fishing possibilities of this stream have been almost ruined by the clay drain-in into this stream, a runoff which at times colored the water to a heavy red, and left by last fall a heavy clay silt covering the whole of the stream bed. Whether or not such material going into the stream may be classed as deleterious provides considerable argumentation; however, all fishermen are in agreement that the stream no longer has the run of trout which prevailed prior to the gravel washing era. Even with the removal of the gravel washing equipment, some fishermen estimated two to three years will be required before the stream will regain its former productivity which at that time existed it as one of the most popular fishing streams in the province.

KINGSTON, Ont., May 1—(CP)—Very Rev. K.C. Evans, Anglican Dean of Montreal, today was elected Bishop of the Anglican diocese of Ontario. He succeeds Most Rev. John Lyons, who retired recently because of ill health.

Most Rev. R.J. Renison, Bishop of Moosonee and senior Bishop of the Ecclesiastical Province of Ontario, presided over the election. Sixty-one clergy and more than 175 lay delegates from parishes and missions in the diocese took part. Voting was by secret ballot.
