Anglican Bishop Announces Appointment Of Rural Dean

The appointment of Rev. Canon G.E. Moffatt, M.A., B.D. as Rural Dean of P.E. Island was announced by Rt. Rev. R.H. Waterman, B.A., D.D., Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia on Monday and followed by his installation by Venerable Archdeacon G.R. Harrison, Rector of St. Mary's Church, Summerside, and St. John's Church, St. Eleanors. The appointment was in succession to Rev. G.R.F. Ebsary, Rector of Crapaud-Springfield, who has been transferred to Tangier Deanery, Nova Scotia.

Rev. Canon Moffatt has been Rector of St. Peter's Cathedral Charlottetown since Sept. 1952 when he succeeded Rev. Canon E.M. Malone, D.D. on retirement. Was Active In Many Fields

A pioneer in countless Island enterprises, Gurthrie Ballingall, died Tuesday in hospital following a short illness. He was eighty-one. A native of Paris, Ontario, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Ballingall who emigrated from Scotland in the last century. The first map of this province since Confederation was published by the late Mr. Ballingall in 1903. He also published the first directory of Charlottetown in 1908, and six years later issued Ballingall's Fox Directory. This booklet gave tourist information on summer resorts and also provided the government with much valuable publicity on the fox and oyster industries. Mr. Ballingall also was the first man to build a diesel tug here and with it did much dredging in shallow bays connecting them with the sea. He established the early pattern of overnight cabins here by building those known as the Glen Alden Cabins — the first to have a circulating hot water system. He was for many years connected with the monument works of Chandler and Bell, a business he took over in 1921. For many years he was an active member of the Loyal Orange Lodge.

Three U. S. Warships To Visit Charlottetown In May

Local Naval officials announced yesterday that three United States warships are scheduled to arrive in Charlottetown for a two-day courtesy visit at twelve noon on May 10. The U.S.S. Ely, U.S.S. Farmington and the U.S.S. Portage will comprise the three-ship squadron. They are designated as patrol craft, 180 feet in length with a tonnage of 900 tons. Each of the ships have a complement of seven officers and 100 other ranks. It has been arranged for the ships to secure alongside the Railway Wharf, at the present time it is unknown whether or not they will be thrown open for public inspection. In addition to the usual official calls on the Lieutenant-Governor, Premier and the Mayor of Charlottetown, a full program of entertainment is being arranged by the staff of H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte. The present schedule calls for the trio of ships to sail from this port at seven a. m. May 12th. On May 12th Rear Admiral Roger E. S. Bidwell, C.B.E., C.D., R.C.N. (Retired), former Flag Officer Atlantic Coast, will arrive in the province, and that evening he will carry out the annual inspection of the Summer-side Sea Cadet Corps. Arriving in Charlottetown the following day, he will then inspect the local corps, R.C.S.C.C. Kent at the local Naval Division. Another big event in the Naval program takes place on May 4th. That day is being celebrated as "Battle of Atlantic Sunday" in commemoration of the sacrifices made by Canadian seamen on that greatest of battle grounds during World War II. The program for the appropriate observance of that day is presently being prepared by local officials.

Ottawa Optimistic But Road Plan Poses Problem

By DAVE OANCIA Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP)—The Conservative government is optimistic its accelerated program of road construction in the north will spur mining and other development in a region covering more than a third of Canada. Transportation is described as one of the keys to expanded economic activity in the region. But northern experts warn a multitude of other obstacles must be overcome before private investment can be attracted on a scale large enough to spark developments comparable to those in more southerly latitudes in the last decade. One problem in the immediate future, although considered a passing phase, is to find markets for production resulting from increased resource development. Over the long pull, as the more accessible resource reserves are used up, this obstacle should disappear.

been solved in the construction of such mammoth projects as the Distant Early Warning line, the Alaska Highway and the Canal Roda—all defence projects where costs were secondary considerations. Private enterprise, on the other hand, is forced to be cost conscious. If the value of the ore produced by a mine isn't great enough to offset higher production expenditures, the mine is forced to cease operations. Mines brought into production in the Yukon and Northwest Territories during the last half century invariably depended on comparatively rich ore deposits. Scores of mineral deposits, which proved after drilling and other exploration not to be rich enough, now are undeveloped in the rugged north. In spite of these obstacles, exploration is expected to continue at a brisk pace in the Yukon and the N.W.T. this summer. Geological parties will probe iron ore deposits on Baffin and the Belcher Islands. But exploration for oil in the Mackenzie River lowlands of the N.W.T. and the Peel Plateau of the Yukon are expected to overshadow all other mineral activities in both areas this year. Companies have permits to carry out geological and geophysical work on more than 25,000,000 acres of the northern bush and muskeg country. The federal government's road program is designed to help open up the most promising resource regions to exploration. The aim of the program, enunciated by Resources Minister Hamilton, is to have eventually a grid of roads linked to existing road systems to provide access to such regions.

Magistrate Hears Cases

A Parkdale service station operator, charged with offering lottery tickets for sale, had his case adjourned for consideration to April 30. Arresting officer, Peter Borys, at the previous sitting last Wednesday, displayed 25 articles that he confiscated from the service station at the time of the accused's arrest. These are being used as exhibits in the case by the crown. Included in the exhibits are a jar containing 1,366 tickets and an amount of money totalling \$6.05; mostly in nickels and dimes. A list of the articles offered in the lottery was also used as an exhibit.
