TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

O'Brien's Movements.

NIAGARA FALLS, May 23. Mr. O'Brien left here for Hamilton to-day. He was so weak as almost to be unable to stand, but said that his friends expected him and he could not disappoint them.

HAMILTON, May 23. The most enthusiastic reception O'Brien has received in Canada was given here to-day. The evening meeting held in the Palace Rink was a complete success. There being about 2,000 people present, Mr. O'Brien was in much pain and spoke briefly. He said, unfortunately, flesh and blood are not proof against the arguments of paving stones and bludgeons, the only arguments Lord Lansdowne's admirers had addressed to us. His allusions to Lansdowne at Kingston and Toronto were received with hisses and groans.

Smallpox Epidemic. SANTIAGO DE CUBA, May 24. Owing to the neglect of the Government in not enforcing vaccination, isolation and disinfection, smallpox has become epidemic in the city. It is estimated that there are 500 cases, apart from those outside. The death rate is estimated at about 60 per cent. Steamers and other vessels sail daily to Havana, New York and other ports. The epidemic in Jamaica is not over. Last month 400 cases existed. The death rate is heavy.

Results of a Strike. BRUSSELS, May 24. The men on strike in the mining districts possess arms and explosives. Many outrages have been committed, including the destruction of machinery, and blowing up of abodes of the managers. Several arrests were made. A riot occurred, arising from strikers compelling German colliers to stop work. The Charleroi strikers attempted to-day to march on Brussels. They were charged by Gen. D'Armes and dispersed without bloodshed.

The Czar's Movements. VIENNA, May 24. A telegram from Odessa states that the Czar returned to St. Petersburg three days earlier than he intended to. This was due to an attempt made Wednesday night by students to kill him at Novo Tcherkask Festivities.

More Dynamite. LONDON, May 23. A dynamite bomb exploded under the Police Court at Hebburn, Durham County last night, partially destroying the building. The outrage is attributed to strikes.

Clergymen Released. DUBLIN, May 24. Judge Boyd to-day ordered the release of Father Ryan and Father Slattery who were imprisoned for refusing to give testimony in relation to the plan of campaign.

The French Crisis. PARIS, May 24. M. Floquet has met several rebuffs in his endeavors to form a ministry. He saw President Grevy late to-night and it is believed abandoned the task.

Mr. Masson's Resignation. OTTAWA, May 24. The resignation of Lieut. Governorship of Quebec by Hon. Mr. Masson, through ill health, causes considerable talk.

Strike Ended. LONDON, May 23. The strike of the Northumberland mines has ended.

She arrived in Souris with 700 tons water ballast. She is now loading oats, and will arrive in Charlottetown in a few days with complete cargo. The officers are a gentlemanly set of men, and altogether, the crew, numbering about twenty men, are most obliging to visitors.
