Ancient Treasure Reported In Dead Sea Scrolls, Is Report

MANCHESTER Eng. (Reuters) By ADRIAN BALL. MANCHESTER Eng. (Reuters) Two of the 2,000-year-old "Dead sea scrolls," unrolled by specialists here, have been found to contain a list of the hiding places of a fabulous ancient treasure hoard, it was disclosed Thursday night.

The two scrolls mentioned 60 hoards of treasure, including 200 tons of gold and silver, hidden in a 50-mile area near the Dead sea. An official report said some of the treasure "may still be there."

The hoards are believed to have been buried by the mysterious Jewish sect known as the Essenes, hitherto known as people who regarded life in the desert as unimportant. The disclosure of the secrets of the scrolls was made by Prof. Henry Wright - Baker, of Manchester University, who supervised their unrolling here.

He read a report on the translation of the two copper scrolls by the director of the department of antiquities of the Kingdom of Jordan.

The scrolls were taken to Jordan for translation by experts there after the unrolling at Manchester. Results of the translation then were communicated here.

MIGHT STILL BE THERE. The official Jordan report, disclosed by Wright-Baker, said that some of the treasure might still be in the original hiding places, but added "The exact localities are of course difficult to identify now, as days as the topography of the country has changed considerably since the first century A.D."

Asked by reporters whether a treasure hunt already had begun or was contemplated, the professor said he did not know but he thought it very likely that the Jordan authorities would have started hunting by now.

Wright-Baker told reporters one theory about the preparation of the scrolls was that they were made quickly by the Essenes as a guide to their treasures because they feared the Romans were about to destroy their settlement.

The settlement is believed to have been overrun by Roman soldiers in the year 68 A.D. WRITING HURRIED. The poor quality of the writing and the rough, hurried way in which they were rolled strengthened this theory.

The writing on the scrolls—originally part of a large single plaque eight feet long and 11 inches wide—told of some gold and silver treasures and boxes of incense buried in the area between Hebron and Mt. Gerzim near Nablus, but mostly about treasures near Jerusalem.

The report expressed some caution over the validity of the treasure trove story, which it noted resembled other Biblical and Arabic accounts. It said: "The total amount of gold and silver listed amounts to nearly 200 tons, obviously a fantastic figure, and coupled with the depth at which some of the hoards are alleged to lie—16 to 18 feet—makes one doubt the authenticity of the stories."

But it added that this was "The first ancient document of its kind—a guide to treasure trove—ever to be found and it also is the earliest known text in colloquial Mishnaic Hebrew."
