The following letter from Col. Swabey, received as we were going to press, corroborates the view we have taken of his consistency.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE EXAMINER.

DEAR SIR.—I see the Islander has relapsed into its former evil course of substituting personal abuse for sound argument and facts.

Now, though as usual I am made the object of this train of writing, I should not have taken any notice whatever of the mention with which I am honored, being well aware that, if of any consequence, these attacks serve only to elevate those against whom they are directed, and magnify their importance; but I have a reason for troubling you with this, which is to correct a misrepresentation in which many others are involved. It is this: I am held up as inconsistent in my deeds and opinions about proprietary matters. Now the truth is simply this, and easily discovered—in common with many others I never could see any benefit to be reaped from the escheat of lands to the Crown. To the tenantry it would have been only a change of masters. But now that the Island Government has the title to lands liable to forfeiture and arrears of Quit Rents, I conceive it to be the duty of its Government, controlled by its Legislature, to realise all it can claim.

The same fundamental principle of honesty which gives the proprietors a title to their rent guides the Crown, that is its assignee, a title to theirs. Is there any inconsistency in this? Your obedient servant,

EMIGRATION.

SHORTLY after the Liberals came into office, a few years ago, the Tories were so disgusted with this Island, that every one of them who had any means, and was able to go elsewhere, was continually disparaging the country as a place not fit to live in. The Islander, week after week, proclaimed that a general exodus was taking place, and insisted that no respectable person ought to remain here. A few did go away, but some of them returned, even while the Liberals were in office. Now, when trade of all kinds is duller than ever it was, and money infinitely more scarce with persons of all ranks and conditions, a disposition to go away and better their fortunes is felt and expressed by a great many people. There is no doubt the disposition would be promptly gratified if the parties who are discontented with their lot in this Island could dispose of their effects without a ruinous sacrifice, or obtain money sufficient to carry themselves and their families to a more favoured country. The Islander is now very much distressed at the prospect of an emigration to New Zealand—warns its readers against being influenced by the accounts from that country, furnished by individuals who left here some months ago in the brig Prince Edward, and represents this Island as being one of the fairest and happiest spots in the universe. The following passage concludes the editorial written as a warning to intending emigrants:—

"We have in Prince Edward Island cheap land; a soil productive and most easily worked; and a remunerative market for all the produce that can be raised; and, although our climate is rigorous, and there are difficulties to be contended against, yet even these are not without their advantages—they serve to develop the mental and physical character of our people, and impart to them that indomitable energy, perseverance and hardihood which enable them to overcome all difficulties and obstacles, and which are seldom found the characteristics of inhabitants of warmer climates."

There being cheap land in Prince Edward Island now, is not the case. It is not near so cheap as it is in the adjoining provinces of New Brunswick, Canada, or Nova Scotia; nor anything like so cheap as in the Western States of America. Here the landlords will not sell to their tenantry under 30s. or 40s. an acre, and in very many cases a higher sum is charged; while good lands can be had in the countries we have enumerated for five or six shillings an acre, and in New Zealand for nothing. When the Liberals were in office here they laboured to carry out a measure that would enable the tenantry to purchase their farms at prices varying from five shillings to ten shillings an acre; but in all their efforts they were opposed by the party who are now in power, in order to promote the interests of the proprietors who are well represented in the Government, by keeping up the price of lands at an exorbitant rate. As to there being a remunerative market for all the produce that can be raised, the price current tells a different tale. Oats from 1s. 9d. to 2s. a bushel, potatoes 2d. and 1d.—and all other agricultural produce in proportion, while there is very little demand for any description of it—are facts that do not indicate a very prosperous time for the farmers.

WRECK OF THE BRIG MAGGIE, OF St. Peter's, P. E. ISLAND, AND FEARFUL LOSS OF LIFE.—News reached Charlottetown, on the 24th that the above named vessel left St. John's, Newfoundland, on the 5th of October inst., for this Island, having on board, besides her crew, some twenty passengers. The day after she sailed a fearful gale swept along the coast of Newfoundland, and that on the 10th the stern of the vessel was washed ashore at Prepass Bay, with the name "Maggie, of P. E. Island," printed on it.

Capt. Close, from N. W. on Monday, we are informed, arrived in Georgetown on Saturday last, who reports that the substance of the above statement was telegraphed to St. John's, just previous to his sailing.—R. Gaz.

The Rev. H. Lind, Episcopal Clergyman at St. George's Bay, N. F. Land, at the request of Mr. Richard Curran, communicates to us the following interesting particulars:—

"The 'Mary Anne,' Alexander Nicholson, master, left Belfast, P. E. Island, in the month of June last for the Labrador. She arrived in safety at Battle Harbour on the Labrador coast. On the 4th of Sept. she left that place laden with codfish, herring and oil, and encountered heavy weather after her departure. On the 3rd of October the Captain found it necessary to run for a place of safety, and reached the head of the Bay (Sandy Point), where he remained until the 5th, when he again put to sea, but meeting with a terrific gale returned, but such was the violence of the wind, that the vessel stranded on a place called Black Bank, on the 6th inst. The vessel is a complete wreck, but Mr. Curran, who was here this morning, hopes to secure some of the fish, which he will endeavor to do with the assistance of some kind friends here, to take either to Sydney or the Island. By God's mercy not one of the crew has been injured.—Halifax Express, Oct. 21.
