GOOSEBERRY RELISH
5 lbs. gooseberries
2 cups mild vinegar
1 large orange, juice and grated rind.
2 tablespoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon ground cloves
1 teaspoon salt
8 cups sugar
Method: Wash the gooseberries and remove the stems and tails. Boil them gently with the vinegar until the skins burst open, then add the orange juice and grated rind, the spices and the sugar.
Cook gently until the sugar is dissolved, then add the vinegar until the relish is thick and clear. Stir often for the seeds from the berries are apt to settle and scorch. It takes from 1 1/2 to 2 hours to cook to the desired consistency generally. Pour into hot, sterile glasses and cover with a thick layer of paraffin.
Of course, the spices can be altered to suit your own taste, but go easy on the ground cloves, for that is a flavor which develops on standing and too much will make the relish bitter.

URGES CONSERVATION OF FOREST LANDS
(By The Canadian Press)
DUCHESS, Que., Aug. 3.—Plans for the consolidation of the valuable Canadian forestry industry through conservation of rich timber resources on which the industry is founded were discussed today as nearly 200 of the Dominion's leading lumber experts gathered here for the summer meeting of the woodlands section of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association.
The three-day convention opened at Duchesnay Forestry School operated by the provincial government in the heart of an "experimental forest," 20 miles north of Quebec, where the latest methods in conservation are on trial.
The keynote of the meeting—a consolidation through conservation—was sounded by Hon. John S. Bourque, Quebec lands and forests minister, when he welcomed the forestry technicians.

NEW SOUTH WALES GOVERNMENT RESIGNS
SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 3.—(CP)—By a margin of two votes Premier Bertram Stevens was defeated in the New South Wales Legislative Assembly today and promptly handed his resignation to Governor Lord Wakehurst.
Overriding the Premier, who staked his tenure of office on the outcome, the assembly approved a motion calling for adoption of a financial policy by a vote of 43 to 41. Six members were absent.
The motion was submitted by E. S. Spooner, former public works minister who resigned from the Government two weeks ago in protest against what he called the Premier's efforts to curtail the expenditures of his department.
At the request of Lord Wakehurst, Mr. Stevens agreed to continue in office for a few days.

Pickup And Delivery Service Slated Soon For The Maritimes

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 3.—(CP)—The Canadian National Railways Canadian Pacific Railway and the Dominion and Atlantic Railway will establish a pickup and delivery service at principal points within New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island where traffic volume warrants this service, as soon as necessary arrangements and tariff publication can be effected, according to a communication received by Rand H. Matheson, manager, Transportation Commission of the Maritime Board of Trade, from Montreal this evening.

The railways advised the complete details of the basis to apply will be forthcoming as soon as possible, but it is expected that the arrangement will be along lines recommended by the Maritime Transportation Commission at a joint conference held with the railways at Saint John and corresponding to the basis in effect in other parts of Canada.

Earlier this summer the railways suggested a plan of agreed charges as applying to pickup and delivery service for application in the Maritimes which involved individual contracts as between shippers and railways before the pickup and delivery service could be obtained.

The proposition was not generally acceptable to shippers throughout the Maritimes and as a result the meeting in Saint John was held to consider the proposal and if possible to obtain a more satisfactory basis with the end in view of service that would tend to fit conditions and circumstances which exist in the Maritime Provinces.

The Railway announcement of their decision to establish a pickup and delivery service within the Maritimes culminates negotiations which had been carried on for a considerable time.

Pickup and delivery service is one basis of rail and truck coordination and is a complete service now demanded because of changes in marketing and distribution.

TIGNISH MAN FOUND DEAD

Sudden Death Of John A. Hackett Early Wednesday.

Mr. John A. Hackett, a well-known resident of Tignish, was found dead in his room on Wednesday morning by workmen who became alarmed when he did not put in an appearance as usual.

Mr. Hackett was bookkeeper for Mr. C. F. Morrissey, who has a large fish packing plant at the Tignish Run. Mr. Hackett had been in conversation with some of the other employees before retiring the night before about nine-thirty and appeared in his usual health.

In the morning about 7:30 when found he was lying on the floor in his clothes. Dr. J. A. Johnson was called, also Henry Doyle, the Coroner, and Mr. Watson of the R.C.M.P. Dr. Johnson was of the opinion that the deceased had not been dead very long, probably about five hours.

The deceased had been in failing health since a severe illness in March and Dr. Johnson expressed the opinion that heart trouble or acute indigestion was the cause of death. There were no marks of violence on the body and after consultation with other doctors and police the Coroner considered an inquest was unnecessary.

The deceased was the son of the late Edward Hackett, of Tignish who was a representative of the Federal House in the late nineties for the Conservative Party. He ran a large hotel in Tignish for some years and was manager for J. H. Myrick and Co. for about 25 years and was most highly esteemed.

The late Mr. Hackett was about 60 years of age. His wife predeceased him about 15 years ago. He leaves to mourn three sons and three daughters; also a sister, Mrs. Fitzgerald, Ottawa, and two brothers, Howard and Mark in Ontario. Some of his family were expected to arrive last night for the funeral.
