**THIS FARMING INDUSTRY**

**Tobacco Field Day Plan To Extend Acreage Here**

The planning of a tobacco field day by the provincial agriculture department is the prelude, apparently, to a stepped-up promotional program that could produce the 1,000 acres of tobacco and something more than \$500,000 in new farm revenue to this province that was predicted for me recently by the provincial agricultural council.

The field day is being planned for the second week in September, I am told and details of time and place will be announced later. For the most part, I understand, the main effort is aimed at interesting new growers; and that is necessary if the optimistic tobacco outlook is going to become a reality.

There have been some really frightening results from this year's lack of moisture—a Breadalbane farmer told me yesterday he came to town with the idea of ordering some equipment to put water on his pasture—and I keep getting that "terrible pastures" comment from more people as the days pass. My Breadalbane friend told me "My pasture is bare, I've been feeding hay now for more than a week."

**BEST TOBACCO**  
But tobacco right now is showing a promise of the best crop since the new agricultural industry got underway here. That "best" tag is applied "at this season of the year." How it will stand up the rest of the way if it keeps dry, is something else.

Incidentally I never did see so many people happy about getting wet as I saw yesterday during a walk uptown. The proprietor of a business said the same thing. Normally people would come in here saying "Isn't it an awfully nasty day?" Yesterday the wetter the people were the happier they were. Visitors from other provinces had this extra comment "I hope they're getting this rain back home."

Back to tobacco again, I'm told that one Island grower, Len Vaerwyck, expects to average 1,500 pounds tobacco leaf per acre this year, and that would be something close to 300 pounds

more than we've ever done before. According to the best information I can get, a little more than 1200 pounds has been the best production in the past. We're still fairly low on acreage with something like 415 acres this year, according to Doug Fitzpatrick. But there are signs of new interest. Bob Hardy of Alberton has 13 to 14 acres at Kildare South which adds to the Alberton area production.

**LARGEST PRODUCER**  
Largest producer in the province is Douglas Roloson, who started growing tobacco at Ocean View, and this year has added the former experimental farm at Greenfield. The Roloson acreage runs close to 75, I am told.

The Vaerwyck acreage is approximately 40 and he has associated with him his son-in-law, Mark Vanneste, and I hope that name is spelled correctly. Their farm is at Grandview. This column was written prior to the start of a meeting in Birch Court last evening called to discuss problems, some of which were probably partially answered by the tremendous rain which hit here yesterday. If that rain was general throughout the island, it will have answered many of the drought problems that were causing grave concern before the skies opened early yesterday.

Recently I spoke of the tremendous strawberry crop which the Island reported this year. One federal inspector suggested we have more berries this year than we had in 1964.

And this happy result is in spite of the fact that some of our top agricultural spokesmen had predicted near disaster for the berry crop unless rain came heavy and fast, which it did not do.

**MOISTURE THEORY**  
I suggested, I believe, that agricultural observers were at a loss to account for the big berry crop; also for the fact the pastures had held up so well for so long. And here we are judging pastures on the dairy production which had exceeded last year's up to a couple of weeks ago. Pastures are pretty awful now, farmers tell me. The rain should help, though.

**Gemini 5 Will Probe Hurricanes**

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) During this month's Gemini-5 flight, astronauts Gordon Cooper and Charles Conrad are to join the U.S. weather bureau and four Tiros weather satellites in an effort to gain a clearer picture of the birth and movement of hurricanes, typhoons and other storm systems.

Cooper, an air force lieutenant-colonel, and Conrad, a navy lieutenant commander, are scheduled to start their eight-day orbital trip Aug. 19. That's about the time the hurricane season normally begins in the Atlantic, Caribbean and Gulf of Mexico.

Norman Foster, head of the Gemini experiments office for NASA's manned spacecraft center, said Cooper and Conrad will carry two cameras to photograph cloud patterns. The pictures could help in the development of cameras and instruments for advanced meteorological satellites.

Part of the experiment will involve taking pictures at the same time that weather bureau planes make readings while flying beneath Gemini 5's orbital path. Four Tiros weather satellites are operating and Foster said they will be used to help pinpoint cloud areas to be photographed.
