Morning Stock Letter

(Received over Pittfield and Co's Private Wire)
NEW YORK, June 16—Latest advices from Washington of the Tax Bill are that the Senate Committee was more optimistic last night concerning the ability of the two Houses to get together. It is very probable that a compromise will be reached and that Congress will adjourn by Saturday. We would look on the first thing this morning to see whether the selling of yesterday afternoon follows through. However, we are still of the opinion that subject to a minor setback the market will do better. Fair implement stocks act about as well as any group.

TORONTO, June 16—Armitfield Gold—The company is at present mining at the rate of about 190 tons daily and before the end of the month it is expected a rate of 200 tons will be reached. Armitfield's main shaft has been sunk from 550 to 1000 feet and program of deep development just getting underway. If as it is expected results are satisfactory on this work a substantial mill step up is planned.

Gold Eagle—Drifting on the No 1 shear, northwest on the 500 foot level at Gold Eagle Mines, this week exposed ore assaying 8.5 oz. or \$297.50 a ton, according to word received from the property by Charles St. Paul, Vice president, according to the wire assays were made only over a five foot section of the shear. In addition to the developments on the No. 1 shear on the 500 foot level, ore running 2.6 ounces per ton has been encountered 339 feet south east of the shaft on the 50 foot level and on the Gold Eagle vein. Widths at this point are about 48 inches.

Big Demand For Canada Car Issues

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
MONTREAL, June 16—Revival of interest in Canada Car shares gave color to an otherwise dull stock market picture today.

The main list, with the exception of a few metals and utilities, moved forward in fits and starts with price changes generally narrow. Construction was firm throughout the session and banks quiet.

Observers were unable to explain brisk demand for Canada Car issues. All offerings of the preferred were readily absorbed and the price touched 16 ending at the finish to 15 7/8, up 5/8. The common gained 1-4 at 7 1/4.

Buyers continued to favor construction issues and advances of about 1-2 point each were posted for Dominion Bridge, Canada Cement and Steel of Canada. Hamilton Bridge lost 5-8.

Late demands for International Nickel sent the price to 48, up 1-4, after an early spell of idleness. The price of Smelters finally cracked under selling pressure and the close was 1-2 lower. Hollinger also slipped 1-2.

Distillers Seagrams came out in quantity around the final hour and touched 23 for a gain of 3-8. Canadian Industrial Alcohol stiffened slightly but National and Associated Breweries both suffered minor recessions.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, June 16—Medium to good quality calves were 50 cents lower in early dealings on Montreal livestock markets today. Other sections remained steady.

Receipts: Cattle, 269, calves, 909, sheep and lambs, 242; hogs, 418.

Cows moved slowly at \$2.50 to \$4 for butchers and \$2 to \$2.25 for canners and cutters. Steers were unchanged.

Medium to medium good calves brought \$5 to \$5.50 with fair kinds from \$4.75 to \$5, and common drinkers as low as \$3.75. Bulk of sales were made between \$4.50 and \$5.

Spring lambs sold in mixed lots at \$8 to \$10, while sheep ranged from \$2.50 to \$3.75 with the bulk at \$3.50.

Bacon's brought \$9.35 fed and watered. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium. Butchers, hewies and lights were \$8.50. Extra heavies \$9.35. Sows ranged from \$5 to \$6.25.

TORONTO, June 16—Gold shares found the going a bit rough today and they lumbered along to a lower close while other groups on the Toronto mining section followed at a distance, showing only a minor loss in the index. A drop of 14.78 was registered by the average index for the golds.

Senior golds were slow and quite firm until the last hour when Lake Shore weakened 1-4. McIntyre 5-8, Dome 1-2, Hollinger 1-2, Wright Hargreaves 10 and Teck Hughes 5. The last two changed hands in considerable volume.

The late decline carried Buffalo Ankerite down 10 cents, Little Long Lac 15 cents and McLeod-Cockshut and McKennie dropped 10 each. Losses of 3 to 5 cents were registered for Lava Gap, McWaters, Braslone, Central Patricia, Castle, Coniarum, God's Lake, Pamour, Perron, Premier, Reno, Siscoe and Ventures.

Two issues, Beattie and San Antonio opposed the trend, closing 15 to 17 cents higher.
