## 100 Register For UF Session

Some 100 delegates registered yesterday for a two-day Atlantic Regional Conference of the Community Funds and Councils of Canada being held at the Confederation Centre here. Guest speaker at the noon luncheon, Dr. Rudolf Cules, assistant professor of sociology, St. Francis Xavier University, spoke on "the contribution of research to community welfare". Three panel discussions during the session were headed by Byron Lawrence, executive director, Fredericton area United Appeal; H. Edward Newell, executive director, Halifax-Dartmouth Area Welfare Council; and G.R. Howard, campaign chairman, Greater Moncton Community Chest.

Panel members were P.K. Wilton, Gordon H. Thompson, W.J. Nugent, Bernadine Colquhoun, Eric Smit, Laton A. Smith, Catherine Gale, H. Dawe and Sinclair Cutcliffe.

## All-Weather TCH Work Underway

Work is underway on the Trans Canada Highway between Hazelbrook and Mount Albion in preparation for making it an all-weather road. Operations began Wednesday and ditching was proceeding rapidly yesterday. Warren Maritimes Ltd. has the contract for Charlottetown to Mt. Albion crossing. Their tender was for \$314,740 for 7.1 miles.

Another section, from Mt. Albion crossing to Vernon, 6.4 miles, will be done by Matheson and MacMillan for \$337,830. Work has not started on that job but surveying appears to be about completed.

The plan, which could provide assistance, if necessary, to those already receiving old age security, would "fill in the gaps left by the Canada Pension Plan." FOR NON-WORKERS

While the Canada Pension Plan is a plan for workers, and is based on their contributions as a percentage of their earnings, the assistance plan would aid those generally not workers, who are in need.

Outlining the birth of the program, Miss LaMarsh said all 10 provincial ministers of welfare "were in fairly close agreement about the sort of thing they wanted the federal government to do."

She said when she had been in office less than a year she concluded that a general assistance program to streamline the various welfare and assistance plans already in operation, was necessary.

The provincial delegates approved the program following "a long and detailed discussion" last May.

"The next step of course was to convince my colleagues in the cabinet and officials in other government departments that we were likely to be involved in such legislation, that we were heading in the right direction."

TOOK MUCH WORK  
All the departmental work took place while the Canada Pension Plan was being developed and "I can assure you that the lights burned in offices in our department in Ottawa many times late into the night."

Detailed work with the provinces was in progress and "in the not too distant future it will mean presentation to Parliament of a resolution and a bill spelling out the plan."  
Miss LaMarsh also described briefly the newly formed national council of welfare, which she said would be "a very significant factor in the development of Canadian welfare programs."

## Students At Tignish Urged To Walk More

TIGNISH — Poor road conditions causing bus breakdowns came in for comment at the annual meeting of the Tignish Regional High School held in the school auditorium Tuesday evening.

Everett Broderick, chairman of trustees, presided.

Sister Saint Mary Arnold, school principal, in her report said there was an increase in students of 32 over the previous year. The principal invited the ratepayers to a fashion show in the school Thursday evening, June 3, of work carried on by the home economics class.

Poor road conditions in some areas and a breakdown in buses kept them off the road for some time which had a serious effect on the students' work, said the principal, and the results can be seen now.

The principal thought students should make more of an effort to walk short distances, when buses were unable to travel close to where they live. The ones who make an effort, she said, will be the ones who will make a success in college and later in life.

Keeping taxes paid up and taking a more important part in the business of the regional high school, and attending school meetings was thought a must for every ratepayer. If there is to be success in its operation.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the secretary, Mrs. Roy Gallant, along with the minutes of a school meeting held by secretaries and trustees on Feb. 11.

A letter was also read from the trustees association of P.E.I. concerning larger units of administration dealt with by the ratepayers in a resolution regarding their choice of larger units of administration for the regional area.

## Honorary Degrees Presented

FREDERICTON (CP) — Dr. Colin B. Mackay, president of the University of New Brunswick, said Thursday students are showing an increasing concern over injustices in society.

Dr. Mackay, addressing graduating exercises at UNB here, said: "we are confident that they (the students) will be able to make an impact for good on our ever-shrinking globe as it moves swiftly into the final decades of the 20th century."

Dr. Mackay welcomed those attending the exercises, including Prime Minister Eric E. Williams of Trinidad and Tobago who delivered the encyclical address and received an honorary doctor of laws degree from the university.

He spoke of the close ties between the Atlantic provinces and the British West Indies and said the Atlantic Provinces have traded with the British West Indies since colonial times.

Receiving honorary degrees with Prime Minister Williams were Mr. Justice Louis-MCC-Ritchie of the New Brunswick Supreme Court and publisher Lord Thomson of Fleet, who received honorary doctor of civil laws degrees; Dr. F. J. Toole, former vice-president of UNB and retiring chemistry professor, and Dr. William S. Hoar, head of the zoology department at the University of British Columbia, honorary doctor of science degrees; and Dr. William Lewis Morton, head of the history department at the University of Manitoba and noted Canadian historian, an honorary degree of doctor of letters.

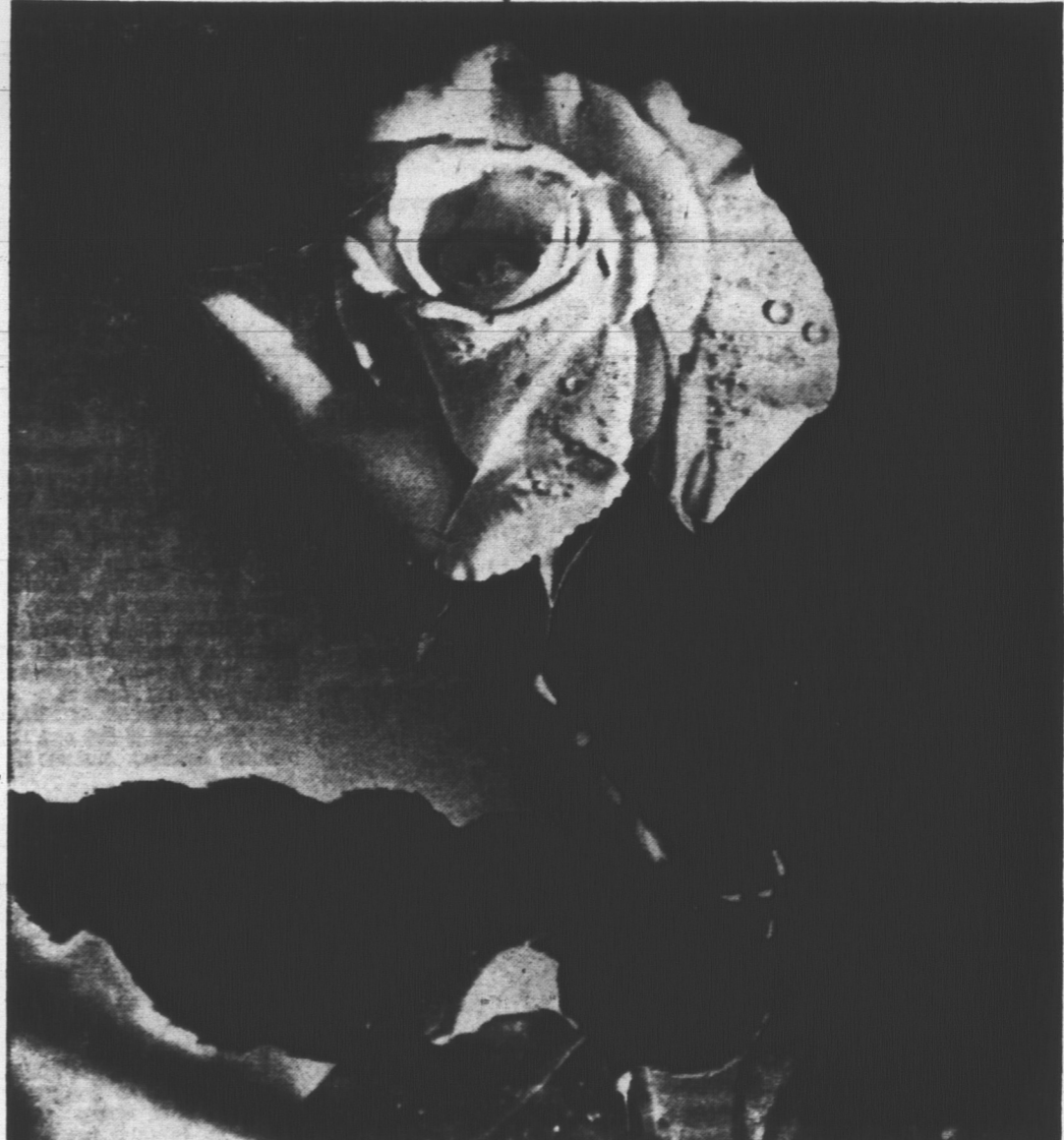
