LORD COLERIDGE is visiting the White Mountains of Vermont. He will be unable to visit New Brunswick. WE are pleased to learn that ex-Mayor Dawson has been re-appointed a member of the City School Board. THE Baptist Convention, at Halifax, has adjourned until the third Saturday in August, 1884, to meet at Moncton. J. UNSWORTH, Esq., Mechanical Superintendent of the P. E. I. Railway, and family, returned home last evening. THE U. S. corvette "Vandalia" is at Montreal, and will stay a week before returning via Quebec and P. E. Island. PRESIDENT TREP, of the Methodist Conference, has secured the services of Mr. J. R. Ellis, of Charlottetown, to supply the Salisbury Circuit during the absence of the pastor, Rev. R. Wilson.—Moncton Times. MR. McMILLAN'S new vessel is about ready for launching and Mr. Vezurley's will be ready in three or four weeks. In both yards the lumber is ready for another vessel, to be commenced without delay.—Pioneer. FRANCIS COYLE and Francis Began were examined before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon charged with attempting to rob a sailor named William Jamson. They were remanded to jail for further testimony. MISS MARY MURRAY, daughter of the late John Murray, Chatham, went to her room last Friday, feeling unwell. She was heard to fall shortly after, and before a doctor could be summoned was dead. Heart disease was the cause. THE FISHERY BOUNTY.—No claims for fishery bounty of 1882-3 will be received after September 1st. All claims for bounty of 1883-4 must be filed with the Marine and Fisheries department on or before December 31st. A BOY named William Fitzgibbon, who had recently been doing some extensive robberies in St. John, N. B., and who had extended his field of work to Moncton, where he was caught, has been sentenced to six years imprisonment in the penitentiary. Fitzgibbon is fourteen years old. THE barque "Claribel," McLae, master, arrived at Liverpool on the 29th inst., making the passage from Baie Verte in twenty days. This vessel sailed from Liverpool on the 9th of July for Baie Verte, where she loaded a cargo of deals for Liverpool, making the round voyage in the unprecedented short time of fifty-one days, including eleven days taken in loading at Baie Verte. The "Claribel" will take in freight at Liverpool for this port, following the good barque "William Owen."

The meal sold at from \$3.25 to \$3.50 per 100 lbs. Mr. J. B. Stewart, of Lot 48, sold a quantity of flour ground from this season's growth of wheat. It sold at \$3 per 100 lbs. THE Summerside Journal says Henry Longworth and Charles Haszard, Esqrs., the Commissioners appointed by the Advisory Board to select stock for the Dominion Exhibition, passed through here on an inspecting tour on Monday last. Wm. T. Hunt, Henry C. Craswell, Montague Gardiner and George Compton are owners of some of the stock which will likely be selected. A CONTRAST.—Young Fitzgibbon, who turns out to be an orphan aged 14, arrested at Moncton a few days ago and who pleaded guilty to burglary at St. John, has just been sentenced to six years in the penitentiary at Dorchester. The poor orphan lad, under sentence of six years for robbing two stores of a few small articles, will meet with Sarah Smith, a criminal of the vilest kind, who has just commenced to serve a term of four years for killing a man.—Moncton Times. DROWNED.—Yesterday morning Mr George Bell and son, and a man named Doucet, were working on board the wrecked ship "Marco Polo" at Cavendish Cape. The storm became so strong that they thought the hull would be broken to pieces by it. They therefore decided to come ashore. They launched a boat but it upset before they came any distance. Mr. Bell and his son clung to the boat, but Doucet was washed off and drowned. The deceased was a native of Rustico. He leaves a wife and four children. THE steamer "Carroll," Capt. 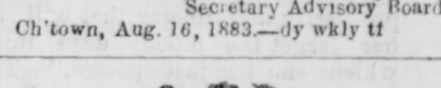
