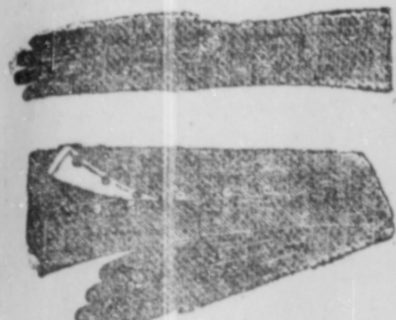

Local and Other Items.

THE STANLEY.—The Stanley got to Pictou this morning about half-past eleven.

FIRST EASTER BEEF.—Messrs. Saunders & Newsom this morning purchased a very fine ox from Mr. Matthew Smith, proprietor of the Pleasant View House, Hampton, weighing 1936 pounds.

LEAGUE OF THE CROSS.—The funeral of Master Christopher Gallant took place this forenoon, and was largely attended. The funeral was under the auspices of the League of the Cross, and was attended by the members of that organization with their band. The pall-bearers were members of the League. The service at the church and at the grave were taken by Father Johnston.

LECTURE ON IRELAND.—There was a large audience in the lecture room of Zion church last evening to hear Rev. T. F. Fullerton's lecture on Ireland. The lecture was similar to that given in St. James' Hall some time ago, and was exceedingly interesting from beginning to end. Many beautiful views were thrown upon the canvas in connection with the lecture. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Rev. Mr. Fullerton for his able discourse, and to Messrs. Morrison and Henderson for their skillful management of the views.

POLICE COURT.—Six cases occupied the attention of His Honor this morning. Peter Macdonald, Queen Street, was convicted of a breach of the Liquor Regulation Act and was fined \$100 or two months imprisonment. George Rodd, for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$4 or 20 days. John Donovan and Daniel McMillan, the younger, for being drunk, disorderly and fighting on Lower Queen Street on the 11th instant, were fined respectively \$10 or 60 days and \$90 or 90 days. For a similar offence on the 14th inst., McMillan was fined \$90 or 90 days; and a charge against John Gormley was dismissed.

THE MAIL SERVICE.—In the Summerside department the Guardian appears the following:—

"A lady informed The Guardian correspondent yesterday that two letters mailed to her on the 19th inst in New York—one containing a sum of money—had not arrived in Summerside. Similar complaints about the mails are heard almost daily, and there is no disguising the fact that there is something radically wrong with the mail service. American and western mail often arrive here from a week to ten days late."

The other end of the Guardian is evidently of the opinion that the service is the best that "has been."

CONCERT AT EMERALD.—The concert at Emerald, postponed from St. Patrick's, was given last evening, and proved a success from every point of view. The hall was crowded, and the performers acquitted themselves well. In the unavoidable absence of Rev. Dr. Doyle Mr. P. J. Trainor, of Charlottetown, delivered the address on the occasion, and the effort is highly spoken of. The other entertainers were C. Rogers, W. F. Clark, George Larkin, Miss Flo. McKenzie, Wm. A. THE CASTLEMAN.—The steamer Delta which returned to Halifax on Monday from saving the cargo of the steamer Castilian, ashore at Gannet Ledge, says the steamer rests comfortably and there is a strong likelihood she may be floated. Land pirates have charge now. Some eight hundred men were on board on Friday, smashing and destroying everything and loading dories and smacks with cargo, furniture and fittings. They defied the customs officers and the ship's officers.
