Dr. T.A. Laidlaw Is Reappointed

Dr. T.A. Laidlaw was re-appointed chief of staff for 1967 of the Prince Edward Island Hospital at the regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees held on December 20th.

Colonel W.S. Hunt will replace Hon. G.L. Bennett who resigned from the board following his appointment to the cabinet of the Provincial Government.

The board accepted the offer of the services of a consultant from the firm of Agnew-Peckham Associates for further study of space requirements for a combined hospital unit.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says a large area of snow, freezing rain, and rain covered much of the Eastern United States and Ontario Wednesday evening, and was moving steadily toward the Atlantic provinces. Snow is forecast to reach western portions of New Brunswick and southwestern Nova Scotia about noon, spreading eastward through all three Maritime provinces during the afternoon and evening. In most places, the snow is forecast to become mixed with freezing rain after a short time. Near the Atlantic coast, strong southeasterly winds are expected to bring milder air which will permit the precipitation to change to rain.

With the storm passing to the northeast Friday, gradual clearing accompanied by colder temperatures is predicted.

Regional forecasts:
Prince Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick, Eastern Ontario: cloudy with snow beginning late in the afternoon and becoming mixed with freezing rain in the evening; a little milder, winds light, increasing in the afternoon to easterly 20; low-high at Charlottetown 15 and 32. Moncton 10 and 32. Outlook for Friday: Variable cloudiness with snow-furries; colder.

High tide today at Charlottetown 12:40 p.m. and 11:37 p.m. At Rustico at 5:41 p.m. Summer-tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 7:34 a.m. and sets at 4:55 p.m.

Souris Economy In Good Shape

Both heading and highlighting the entire economic activity of the Town of Souris, during 1966 was the rapidly expanding fishing industry, said Mayor T.A. Leard as he gave a review of the town's business during the year now ending.

He particularly noted the success of the lobster season and the fact the canned product, as well as the fresh frozen was now being shipped to many world markets. Mayor Leard also expressed pleasure at the start of a new industry in the late fall when the processing of frozen crab meat was begun.

AID TO ECONOMY
A great aid to the economy, he noted, was the fact the port enjoyed both larger catches and a longer season which is expected to carry on for some time yet and keep the filleting plants going beyond the normal closing time. He noted both plants have been kept busy and perhaps some of the activity is due to the fact four new steel trawlers, built in Picou were added to the fishing fleet in Souris.

The Mayor also remarked on the work being done on the new landing wharf under construction west of the Eastern Fisheries Wharf which is expected to be ready for use in June.

Part of the great boost in the port's economy was credited by Mayor Leard to the large number of ships which entered Souris during the year. He recalled that the first of the fleet came in January to load pulp for Europe and since then there has been a steady flow of traffic in potatoes and other produce going by ship to Canadian and United States markets.

TOURIST INDUSTRY
Touching briefly on the tourist industry, Mayor Leard gave credit to the increased number of sailings of the "Gaspé" to the Magdalen Islands for the greater number of tourists attracted to the eastern part of the Island this year.

He also briefly reviewed other highlights of 1966, including the Fisheries Exhibition and Regatta in July, which he termed "the social event of the waterfront" as it witnessed the crowning of Susan Dixon, as Sea Queen. Another event of note, was the visit to the harbor of
