Local Women Return Today

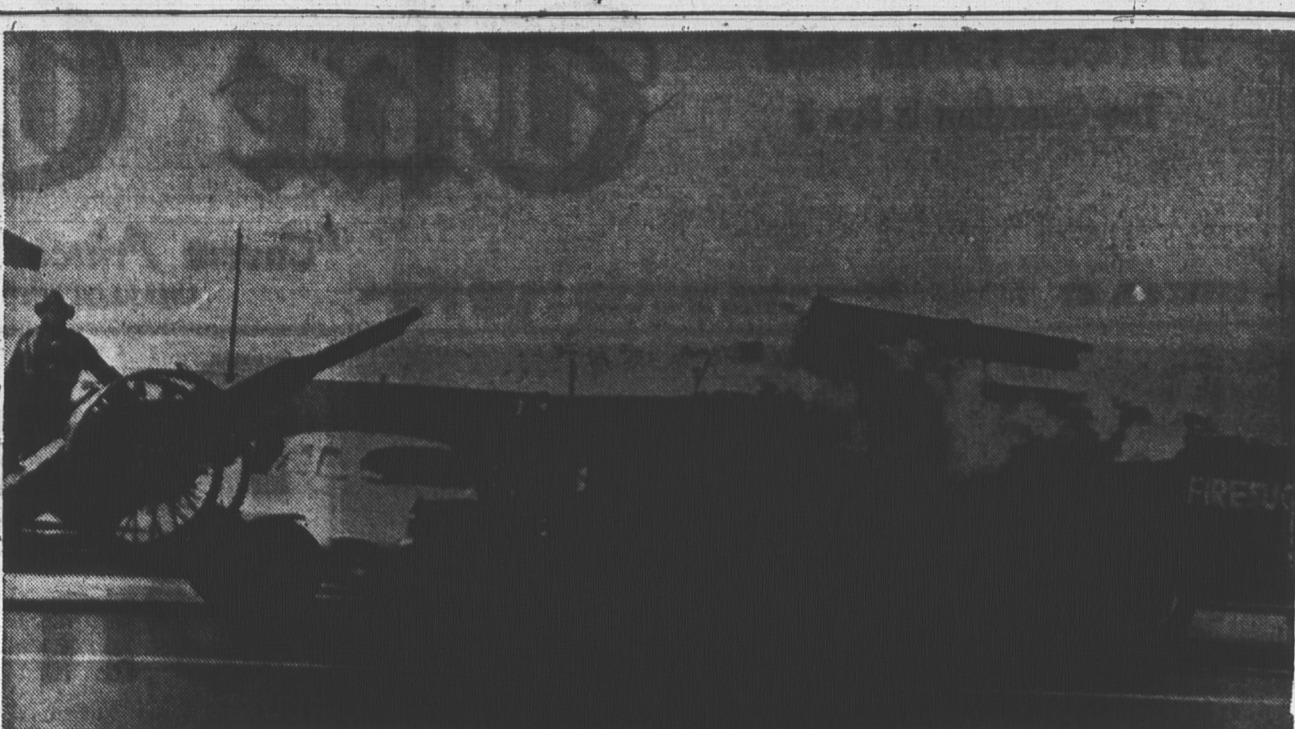

Duo Piano Team Will Appear Here

The duo piano team of Jeffrey and Ronald Marlow will be the guest artists in the first Community Concert of the 1966-67 season, being held in Thursday evening at Confederation Centre Theatre.

This team of twin brothers has been termed by critics as "a brilliant two piano team, full of youthful spirits and all the technical equipment needed for a precise and demanding art."

The Marlows, who are still in their early twenties, will be playing 50 concerts throughout North America during the coming season. Protoges of the famed duo piano team of Pierre Loboschus and Genia Nemenoff,

the Marlows made their debut as youngsters of eleven, appearing on the Milton Berle show. The same year they made an appearance with the Philadelphia Orchestra.

They have appeared on television as guests of Arthur Godfrey, Garry Moore, Steve Allen and Sam Levenson and have also been seen on the "Tonight" show and the "Mike Douglas Show."

On the concert stage they have played with the Pittsburgh and New Haven Symphony Orchestras and with the New York Philharmonic.

Following their graduation from Temple University in Philadelphia, the two young men toured for three seasons, traveling thousands of miles and appearing before tens of thousands of people.

Both spent some months in the Army with the special services branch.

They travel by car with a trailer hauling two specially built Baldwin pianos.

Both men married in the summer of 1965 and have apartments in the same building. To accommodate their practicing, one apartment has two pianos and the other has one; that way the brothers can practice individually or together. In their spare time both enjoy fishing, photography and all spectator sports.

Their concert on Thursday will feature works by Bach, Brahms, Glinka and Handel. The selection from Bach will be "Eurydice" from the "Magnificat".

Of all the contemporary composers the Marlows prefer Francis Poulenc (1899-1963) and will be doing Poulenc's Sonata for Two Pianos in the Thursday concert.

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5 Delegates To Attend Conference

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City Resident Assessed \$25
