**JOHN BERTRAM WARREN**

John Bertram Warren of Cornwall, P. E. I., died at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Tuesday, January 13th, 1953, in his 75th year. He had not enjoyed good health for the past few years.

Mr. Warren was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robinson Warren of North River. While a young man he left for the Pacific Coast where he worked for several years, returning to Cornwall about twenty-five years ago. He married Miss Katherine MacDonald of Cornwall and settled on the MacDonald homestead where he resided until his death.

Being of a genial disposition, Mr. Warren was highly esteemed by his relatives and friends. He possessed musical talent and ability and with his fine tenor voice frequently assisted in choirs and quartets singing at North River and adjacent communities; a service which was much appreciated.

Surviving him are his widow, who attended him with unstinted devotion, and six nieces in Los Angeles, California.

The funeral service was held at the Cutcliffe Funeral Home in Charlottetown on Friday, January 16th, and was largely attended. Rev. H. Barber of North River Baptist Church conducted the service, assisted by Rev. A. S. Weir of Cornwall United Church.
