NATIONS CAN BE GOOD SAMARITANS

Interest, deep and wide, has been awakened by the recent discussions of the Colombo Plan. Particularly do they claim the attention of the Christian.
Undoubtedly our religion makes in itself a claim on all who have Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan, to mention only one of His teachings on the subject, inasmuch that when my neighbor is needy and helpless, I owe him whatever I can do to meet his need, race, creed, condition or attitude toward myself.

A recent editorial in one of our weeklies ridiculed the shallowness of certain pleas to send our surplus grain to feed the hungry in other lands. We have not space to discuss the arguments on both sides, except to note that the only condition on which that can be done is one that enables the producer to go on producing. Deny that, and the helper can no longer help—even himself.

The significant feature of the Colombo Plan is that the nations as nations are accepting responsibility for giving practical aid to needy peoples of the world. They recognize that this is the only way to preserve the freedoms out of which our prosperity has grown. Now there are three ways in which it is being done. The first is to send food to the hungry. There are difficulties in doing this, but the nations with plenty must find ways of overcoming them. A great preacher once paid a pastoral visit to a needy home, and when he spoke of religion, the woman cried: "Oh, Doctor, if you were as hungry as I am you could think of nothing else."

It taught him a lesson which he was quick to act on, and governments need to learn the same thing.
TEACH THEM
The next way is to teach backward races our skills and inspire them to use them. Feed them today, and they will be hungry tomorrow, unless in the meantime you teach them how to provide more adequately for their own need.

The third way is to change the people themselves, and to give them the faith that makes them masters of their environment. Look at the nations of Europe and see how the differences in their faith account for the differences in their economic condition.
The faith that accepts Christ's idea of the worth of the individual, that inspires him to think and act for himself, and lays on him the responsibility for dealing with the issues before him makes him "more than conqueror" over all the forces around him.

The measures proposed by the nations for teaching backward races have been used by missionaries for a hundred years. The late Dr. John Buchanan was missionary to the Bhils in India, a tribe despised by their neighbors as "monkey people". He taught them new methods of agriculture.

he led them in making bricks and in building; he aimed at lifting the whole social life of the people; and he made everything that he led them in doing the means of interpreting Christ to them.
Personal transformations followed, some of the most dramatic in missionary history, and the influence of his work reached out to the whole tribe.
The same principle was worked out more extensively by Frank Dickenson of West China, and, as the fruit of his ideas and toil, hundreds of families were provided with milk and food of a quality never before known among them.
Still more extensive were the enterprises of Dr. Higginbotham of the American Presbyterian Mission in India who founded the Allahabad Institute, one side of which is given over to teaching of scientific agriculture and the other side to sending out trained young men into the areas round about to bring the knowledge and skill thus acquired to their own people.
Even more striking are the effects of such methods in Africa, where the differences between Christian villages and those still in paganism are evident to every observer. What medical missionaries are doing for the people served is one of the great triumphs of the followers of "the Great Physician."

We have mentioned just an example or two of the outstanding missionary ideals. Work of this character is being done by the churches on a world-wide scale. The nations cannot do this type of work as nations. But they can learn from Christian missions the laws they must obey and the methods they must use.
