It was noon Monday as club members gathered for the weekly luncheon, when a man entered and took his seat at the table. The same man had done the same thing 30 years ago and was the only chapter member still living as the Rotary Club of Charlottetown held its 50th year.

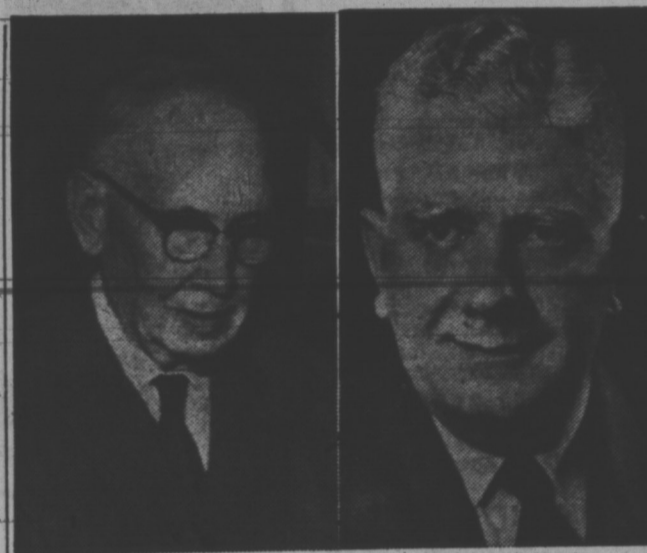
Dr. J.A. (Art) Clark, former and long-retired superintendent of the Experimental Farm, was the man who once again took his seat as the club members met this week.

Later in the proceedings, he was honored when District Governor Fred C. Morrison, New Glasgow, N.S., who was paying his first official visit to the club, presented him with a Rotary long-service pin. Dr. Clark, with 49 years membership, is a past president of the local club and himself a former district governor.

At the same time two other long-service pins were presented to two other past presidents. They were Neil MacLean with 30 years and Dr. Heath MacIntyre with 38 years.

Club president Capt. Claud Hunter presided at the special function and later recalled that within the next twelve months there will be 24 local Rotarians celebrating their membership of 30 years. Total membership is approximately 100.

In a brief address, District Governor Morrison expressed his pleasure that his official visit coincided with the start of Charlottetown Rotary's 50th year. He noted the growth of the local club and related it to the growth of Rotary everywhere, as he recalled the words of a former

United States President, Warren Harding, who once said "If I could plant Rotary in every community in every land, I could guarantee the peace and tranquility of the world".

Mr. Morrison brought with him to the local club the personal greetings of newly-elected Rotarian International president Richard Evans, Salt Lake City, Utah, and told Monday's gathering of the 10-point plan the new president had for his term. It involves several ways in which both the growth and spirit of Rotary can be fostered here and in other lands.

It was decided that the day of Prayer Services be on a County basis. It was suggested that some churches that do not have prayer services be encouraged to form a group and hold a service or services in one central church. Those participating would list their services along with the city. Owing to the opening night of the Week of Prayer services being on a holiday, it was agreed that the services this year be for four nights only. Rev. Donald Quigg, Secretary of the New Brunswick and Prince

Edward Island districts of the Bible Society, is to be invited to speak at one service while the other speakers will be the local ministers.

It was agreed that the day of meeting be changed from the third Tuesday of the month to the first Monday of the month in order to get a larger attendance at the meetings.

Charlottetown, showed a film entitled "Men in Scarlet" this gave a brief history of the force and also showed what training a recruit is given before he proceeds to a detachment. Following the showing of the film many questions were asked and answered by Const. Nolan.

There were 250 head of cattle sold at the weekly livestock auction this week at the Exhibition Grounds. The demand was good, bidding was brisk and prices were even with the previous

week, in some cases they were stronger. Top to medium standard steers sold at \$32.75, commercial steers brought \$18.50 to \$20.00; common and commercial heifers sold at \$19.50 to \$21.00. Heifery cows (young) sold at \$19.00 to \$21.00, good cows at \$16.00 to \$18.50, medium cows brought \$15.00 to \$16.00.

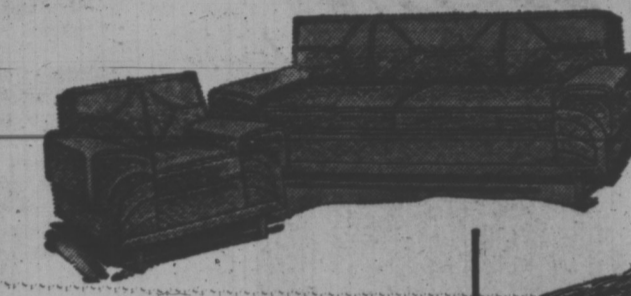

Canners and cutters sold at \$12.00 to \$14.75 and shelly canners (very thin) sold at \$10.75 to \$11.50. Bob calves sold from \$11.00 to \$22.00 each.

Grass calves brought \$13.00 to \$19.75 per hundredweight. Drinkers at \$17.00 to \$23.00. Heavy, fat calves sold at \$23.00 to \$34.50. A number of feeder animals sold. Dairy type feeders sold at \$15.00 to \$18.50, beef and beef-cross feeders at \$17.00 to \$22.50 and bulls sold at \$17.50 to \$21.00. In all cases the prices are per hundred pounds, except the bob calves, animals up to a week or 10 days of age. Dairy cows sold from \$150 for Jersey heifer freshened three days previously, to \$310 for a Holstein cow due to freshen in three weeks time. Buyers came from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, as well as local buyers from Summerside and Charlottetown. A number of Island farmers also bought some of the feeder cattle. 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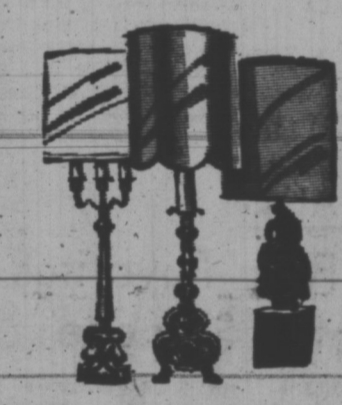
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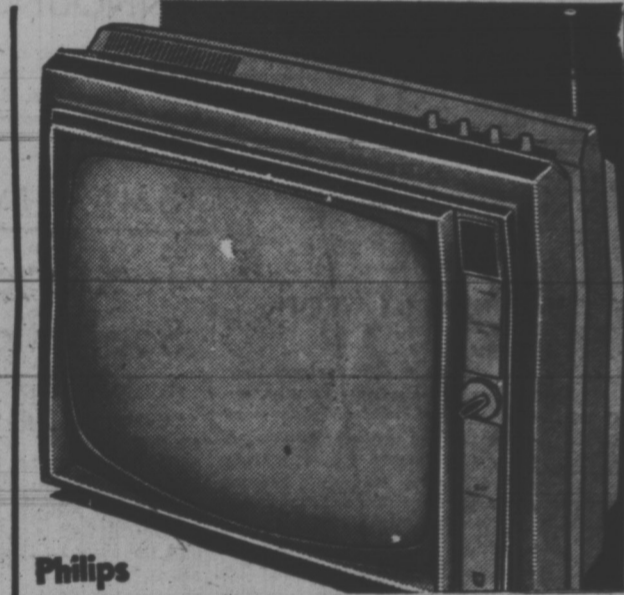
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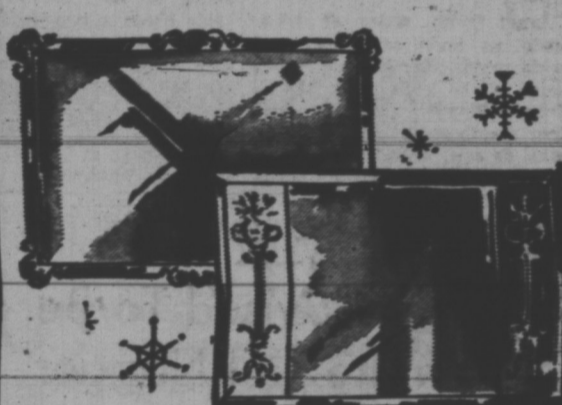
