FRANCE GETTING READY FOR WAR

Great Activity at Toulon and Elsewhere

A WAR WITH ENGLAND BEING OFFICIALLY PREACHED.

Say they will sweep English Ships out of the Mediterranean.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER)

LONDON, England Feb. 15.—The Toulon correspondent of the Daily Mail, in remarking upon the extraordinary activity at the arsenal there, and generally observable in the French naval works, says:

"It is believed that Mr. Loekroy, the Minister of Marine, expects war with Great Britain within two years, and it is notorious that a war with England is being preached in official circles in Paris." Troops are being poured into Tunis, Corsica, and Algeria, and war material is being sent to all the colonies.

The French officers openly boast that they will sweep the British fleet out of the Mediterranean.

Where Bicycles are Taxed.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—Now that a tax of \$2 has been placed on bicycles it is possible to form some idea of the number of machines in Belgium. Official statistics show that 100,000 bicycles have been declared by their owners, whereby the state has benefited to the extent of about \$200,000. There is no doubt, however, that a considerable number of bicycles have not been declared, and thereby the tax has been avoided.

SIR WILLIAM CONWAY HOME.

Collected Valuable Geographical Data in the Andes.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 11.—Sir William Conway has arrived at Liverpool after eight months exploration in the Andes Mountains. The principal object of his exploration was the Cordillera, a chain running a hundred miles through Bolivia. Some important new geographical data, together with maps and views, have been collected, and Sir William has established the fact that Soraca is the highest South American peak, exceeding Aconcagua by over 1,000 feet.

Sir Philip Conway was the first to ascend to the summit of the peak, which is capped by a snow cone 400 feet deep. The chain contains glaciers of immense thickness, and the scenery, Sir William says, is the grandest in existence.

IMPENETRABLE QUIRASS.

Mauser Bullet Fails to Pierce a New Invention.

PARIS, Feb. 13.—Remarkable experiments with a new cuirass constructed by a French inventor named Thread, have been made at Asnières, four miles from Paris. The essential portion of the cuirass is a sheet of metal, the composition of which is a secret. The plate is fitted with an inner and an outer lining, the nature of which also is a secret. The weight of the cuirass is about 7 pound 14 ounces. A mauser rifle of six millimetres calibre was employed in the test at a distance of 70 yards. The shot struck the cuirass in the center. The front of the cuirass was found to be torn, but the indentation of the metal plate was very slight, while the back lining was intact. In a word, the report of the experiment says, the impenetrability of the cuirass was proved to be perfect.

Explorations in Iceland.

Mr. T. Thoroddsen has completed the exploration of Iceland, to which he has given up his vacations for the past fifteen years. He will now write a full account of the results of his labors, which will be published with his map of Iceland. The New York Sun of recent date published a resume of his labors. For years his articles on Iceland have been in great demand, and he is regarded as an authority on the inner parts of Iceland. In the fifteen years which he has spent exploring Iceland he has visited every nook and corner, found hundreds of lava fields and glaciers, and traced all the indentations of the coast line, and in valleys scooped out of tough basalt has discovered deep lakes, one of the lakes being 100 feet above the sea level, and its bottom is 275 feet below the level of the ocean. In the fifteen years he has travelled over 8,000 miles among the sandy level wastes. It is not surprising that the exploration of inner Iceland has been left so long, as the field was so small and far away that explorers thought they might win greater laurels in other parts of the world in which the public was more deeply interested. Travel in Iceland is particularly difficult, owing to the fact that large areas of lava-strewn land are destitute of verdure and Mr. Thoroddsen has often been compelled to carry fodder for his horse for many days at a time. There are no roads, and the summer season, which is the only time when travel is possible, is short. He has discovered scores of crater lakes scattered all through the interior. Many craters that help to cover the surface of Iceland with lava have become the receptacles for the drainage of the mountains. We are all familiar with photographs of the moon showing the parched expanse of rock pitted deeply with great numbers of craters. The Iceland explorer thinks that the country around Vana Jokull would be a terrestrial counterpart of the surface of the moon were it not for the atmosphere and the water of greenish tints that fills two-thirds of the yawning cavities.

THE WAR IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Will Continue as Long as Americans Remain.

HALIFAX, Feb. 15.—J. Funa, a member of the Filipino Junta, is here and will sail in a few days for Liverpool. He says that war will certainly go on while the Americans remain in the Philippines.

THE CRAZE FOR TRUSTS.

Combines in Steam Engines, Prints, Candy, and Bananas.

From New York comes the news that negotiations are going on for a combination of all the large steam-engine building companies of the United States into a new corporation, to be capitalized at \$25,000,000. The Corliss Steam Engine Company's plant at Providence, one of the largest engine works in the world, has already been secured.

From Boston it is reported that negotiations are in progress for a consolidation of all the print works of the United States into a single company, with a capitalization of \$200,000,000.

From Chicago the statement is telegraphed that an immense candy trust, which is to take in all the large manufacturers and wholesalers in Chicago, is being organized. The plans of the combine are said to contemplate increased prices, and the abandonment of advertising and expensive boxes.

Lastly, from Cleveland, a despatch states that a banana trust is about to be formed by the American Fruit Company, of New York, the Boston Fruit Company, of Boston, the Quaker Fruit Company, of Philadelphia, and the Buckman Fruit Company, of Baltimore. The combine will control three-fourths of the bananas handled in this country. The Fruit Despatch Company is the name of the Company.

Great Britain Buying Warships.

LIMA, via Galveston, Texas, Feb. 11.—Great Britain, it is reported here today, has offered to purchase the Chilean and Argentine warships. Senor Carlos Martinez, Chilean minister of the interior, has demanded of the Bolivian minister, Dr. Mane, a guarantee of the immunity that he lives and property of Chileans in Bolivia during the hostilities between President Alonzo of Bolivia, and the federalists or insurgents.

Four Billion Marks Subscribed.

BERLIN, Feb. 11.—The subscriptions to the imperial and Prussian loans of 70,000,000 marks and 125,000,000 marks, respectively, totals up roundly 4,000,000,000 marks.

The Food and Endurance of Arab Porters.

Arab carriers bear great loads upon their backs, and go at a trotting pace from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m. During the month of Ramadan, the Koran forbids the taking of food between sunrise and sunset, and this law is said to be held sacred and rarely violated. Not only do these porters continue their arduous physical exertion during the twelve laboring hours of the day without taking any food during that period, but the French inspectors who are in charge of the gangs told our informant that they could work better during the month of the fast than at any other time of the year, because their energy was not needed for digestion. At eventide, these Arabs have a moderate meal of wheatmeal porridge, mixed with large proportions of butter (it is to be had cheap) or olive-oil. Their expenditure for food is not more than six or seven cents a day, and the only luxury which they permit themselves is a cup of strong black coffee and a cigarette. The idler exists on one cent's worth of bread with a little olive oil, which he buys for an additional five cents.—The Vegetarian Messenger.
