**S'ide Town Magistrate And Recorder Resigns Post**

The Town of Summerside will have to look for a new Magistrate and Recorder at the end of the present month.

The twin appointments have become necessary following yesterday's announcement by E. H. Strong, Q.C., that he intended to resign from both offices effective February 28. The veteran Summerside lawyer has served the Town in each capacity for the past 26 years.

Fourth appointee as magistrate in the Towns history since 1874, Mr. Strong will continue his present law practice which he established in the Western Capital in 1912.

Mr. Strong, who possesses a vast knowledge of the history of Summerside and Prince County, said that the previous magistrates since that time, have been James W. Howe (1874-1885); Neil MacQuarrie (1886-1915); J. Edward Wyatt (1916-1932). Mr. Strong has served as magistrate and town recorder for the past 26 years, since 1932.

Previous to his judiciary appointment he had served as a member of the Summerside Town Council for seven years.

Always possessing a keen in-

terest in Municipal, Provincial, and Federal affairs, Mr. Strong, a native of Central Bedeque, has also represented the electors of the Fifth District of Prince County as Progressive Conservative member of the Prince Edward Island Legislative Assembly.

**Prince Co. To Welcome Oil Drillers' Families**

An air of unprecedented excitement prevails in Western Prince Edward Island as Summerside and surrounding areas prepare to welcome 26 families arriving this evening from Edmonton, Alberta.

Travelling on four railway cars, with an additional 14 cars of autos and personal property, the migration eastward in search of oil will precede the arrival of 24 Railway cars expected on Sunday with the oil drilling rig.

Their arrival, coincidental with Valentine Day, follows what last evening threatened to be the worst and only large snow storm

so far this present winter. Regardless of the weather, Mayor W. A. Currie and members of the Summerside Town Council will be on hand to welcome the western group when their special train from Borden, following the regular boat train, arrives at the Summerside C. N. R. Station.

In addition to the civic welcoming committee, a large number of local residents are expected to be at the station to witness one of the most interesting and unusual railway events to happen in this area since Prince Edward Island became the first all-dieselized Province in regard to railway locomotives.

When the party arrives they will be assigned to housing accommodation in Summerside and surrounding areas that has been obtained for them by Mr. Vaughan Groom, Summerside, who represents the Imperial Oil com-

pany in arranging accommodation for the 26 families and two single men arriving tonight and for geologists who will arrive later. Yesterday, Mr. Gordon Glashen of the Imperial Oil Travelling reservation department from Edmonton, Alberta was working with Mr. Groom and Mr. B. Graham Rogers, Prince Edward Island director of transportation in arranging final details in preparation for tonight's new guests in this area.

The train load of drilling equipment arriving this week end will be taken directly to Wellington where the drilling rig will be erected in the St. Raphael district and the drilling tests conducted.

An office in trailers will be set up at the drill site and the actual drilling work when started, will continue without interruption until oil is found or the company decides to abandon the project.

**S'ide Receives \$11,128 Cheque**

The town of Summerside yesterday received a cheque from the Federal Government in the amount of \$11,128.36, representing a refund on the sales tax paid by the town during the past two years, in the purchase of fuel oil used by the Summerside Electric Light Department in generating electricity.

Previously the town had received a cheque of \$4,413.16 from Maritime Electric Company, representing a refund as the result of a fuel clause in their electrical energy purchase contract with that company. The two refunds total \$15,541.52.

**Welfare Agencies Seek Govt. Aid For Board Of Children**

The regular meeting of the Prince County Catholic Welfare Agency was held on Wednesday evening with the President Dr. Hubert MacNeill presiding. There was a general discussion on the idea that community or parish organizations might undertake to pay the board of one ward of the agency. These children have been removed from broken homes, are children of unmarried mothers, or for some other reason have been taken by the agency as wards and the cost of boarding them in foster homes is a considerable expense. The executive director reported that several groups are already doing this work.

Mr. Henry Wedge was appointed to represent the agency on a delegation composed of representatives of the Catholic and Protestant Agencies in Charlottetown to request the Provincial Government to pay these board bills. A similar request was previously turned down by the executive Council but it is thought that with the extra revenue to be received from the Federal Government that this help should be received. The alternative is to make the children wards of the Government and then the Government must voluntary agencies are willing to do.

The Executive Director reported receipts for the month at \$973.71, and expenses \$869.06. Of these receipts \$375.36 represented donations and \$306.05 were payments from parishes on the annual campaign.

It was pointed out that sever-

al parishes have not responded yet and several have made only partial payments on their quota. The Executive Director gave a comprehensive report on the work done during the month.

Mr. Smith declined the nomination and it was left to the executive to contact a president. Hymn 306 was sung followed by benediction by Mr. Hobson.

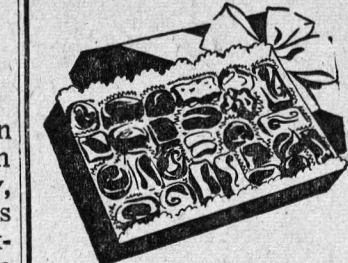

**Florida Warned Of New Freeze**

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A bright sun wiped patches of snow off the face of the deep south Thursday but Florida, plagued by cold all winter, was warned to expect another freeze this morning.

Fresh winds pushed cold, drying air into the area and small-craft warnings were up from Tampa, on the Florida Gulf coast southward through the Florida Keys and north to Cape Hatteras, N.C.

The snow reached from marlino and other Texas panhandle points to Savannah, Ga., and Cross City, Fla.

Snow that fell on the Mardi Gras celebration in New Orleans melted rapidly as the mercury climbed from a low of 27 degrees.

Two inches of snow — heaviest fall in 70 years — covered some sections of South Georgia. Snow stretched across north Florida, from Pensacola to Jacksonville. The southern edge of the snow belt was at Cross City, Fla., more than 100 miles southeast of Tallahassee.
