Mrs. Mary Butcher, aged 104, has just died at Atlantic Highlands, N. J.
A fine bed of salt has been struck at a depth of 1,540 feet at Sarnia, Ont.
Canadian horses won one first, three seconds and a third at Buffalo on Friday last.
There is now a total of \$1,500,000 in gold on the way or ready to start from Europe to New York.
The schooner Pannonia, bound for San Francisco, was wrecked near the Hawaiian Islands, and twelve persons, all on board, were drowned.

The races at Bangor finished on Saturday. They were hotly contested and were witnessed by a large number of people. The free-for-all pacing race in which J. Fred. Watson's (St. John) Ganymede and C. P. Drake's Bayard Wilkes each took heats the previous day was finished, the latter taking the fifth heat and race in 2:23. Ganymede gets second money. The free-for-all heat was won by J. J. Bowen's Jean Val Jean in three straight heats; best time, 2:19. F. K. Hayden's (Leviaton) Emma E. was second. Hortense, owned by H. L. Williams, of Hartland, took first money in the 2:34 class. Her best mile was done in 2:23. John M. got second place. Grovet Cleveland won the 2:37 race, making one mile in 2:29. Lady Rockville came in second. Sea King did not start and Frank Nelson was shut out in the first heat. Flora B. won the three-minute race for trotters and pacers in three straight heats. Her fastest mile was finished in 2:31. Leonard came in second each time.
The races at Amherst begin to-morrow. A number of horsemen left the city this morning to be present. There will be forty-six starters in the six races. A grand time is expected.

Fishery Bulletin.
(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.)
QUEBEC, Sept. 8.-Cod fishing fair and hauls very good at Seven Islands. Cod fishing good and bait very plentiful at Pasbebiac, but no fishing elsewhere owing to bad weather.
New Brunswick-Caraquette bankers returning from last week's fishing with an average of 20 quintals per boat report good appearance of both codfish and bait. A few mackerel are being taken, but no cod at Escaumie.
P. E. Island.-Hake and cod plentiful and mackerel fair off East Point, but very few fish of any kind reported elsewhere.
Cape Breton.-Hake good, maddock fair, but cod poor at Port Hood. Some small mackerel showing to-day in North Sydney harbor. About one quintal of cod per boat at Louisburg. Fair catches of cod and herring, and mackerel large reported taking hooks freely at Arichat, but no fish of any kind taken to-day at St. Peter's.
Nova Scotia.-Cod fishing good off Lunenburg, herring fair and a few cod, haddock and mackerel at Yarmouth. Bait squid plentiful off East Point P. E. I. Herring bait plentiful at Tanook.
