Dollar Devaluation Expected To Result In P.E.I. Benefits

"I expect positive benefits to result as a result of the dollar devaluation," said Health MacQuarrie in addressing a Conservative meeting held in New London hall on Saturday night. The former member for Queens observed that Great Britain, West Germany and Japan had all devalued their currency, "with subsequent resultant prosperity."

"In fact," Mr. MacQuarrie stated, "the so-called economic brain child of the Liberal party, Walter Gordon, recommended this very same step in 1960". The Queens candidate touched on a number of other subjects, among them the Prime Minister's proposed abolition of Clovis to insure that no party in the future will have the means to "railroad legislation".

Lack Of Agricultural Plan Scored By Queens Liberals

"In the past five years 1,100 farms have been vacated in this county," Ira Lewis, Queens Liberal candidate said at New London Friday night. The reason for this shift from the farm is because of the low income that one can realize in farming, he said. He pointed out that farm income did not compare anywhere near favorably with income enjoyed by people in other professions. "Farmers do not mind the extra hours required of them if they can sell their produce for a reasonable profit," Mr. Lewis continued. A good farmer will take preventative measures to see that his stock or crops do not develop diseases, and had the Tory government taken the same attitude and looked ahead for markets "that would take care of our increased production than we would not be in the mess that we are now."

"On the other hand a Liberal government at the helm with its policy of friendly, business like approach to other countries will develop the trade needed to increase the farm income. Free trade is also a deterrent to us," said Mr. Lewis. Allison Gillis taking up Mr. Lewis' remarks said that "the reason we are not getting any answers from the government members, although they are spending thousands of dollars in newspaper and on TV and radio, is simple — they don't have an answer, they don't have a plan.
